KEENELAND'S RECORD-SETTING MEET

Keeneland's 16-day 1994 spring meeting was a huge success, establishing new records in both attendance and handle. Despite the fact that the meet was one-day shorter than 1993's 17-day spring season, records were set for both total handle of \$45,255,789, including ITW, OTB and commingled wagering, and total attendance of 303,798. The record-setting average daily attendance of 18,987 represented a 13.4 percent increase from 1993, while the average daily mutuel handle of \$2,828,487, up 23.3 percent from last year, was also a new high. On-track, the average daily attendance of 13,446 was 17.1 percent greater than in '93, and the on-track average daily mutuel handle of \$1,330,573 was up 20.2 percent from last year. The meet's leading rider was Mike Smith with 22 victories. D. Wayne Lukas and Neil J. Howard shared the training title with seven wins each.

SAM HOUSTON REACHES SIMULCASTING AGREEMENT; POSTS OPENING DAY

FIGURES Sam Houston Race Park could begin simulcasting its signal to race tracks in Texas and across the country as soon as this Thurs. night since an agreement was reached Mon. by SHRP and the Texas Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association. The signed agreement, which came after nearly seven hours of negotiations, clears the way for the Texas Racing Commission to approve a fully developed simulcasting program. The total on-track handle for Sam Houston's three-day opening weekend, April 29 through May 1, was \$3,133,514, averaging out to \$1,040,000 for each race day. Total attendance for the three days was 36,856, averaging out to 12,380 per day.

We equipped him with blinkers for that race and he just kept cocking his head back. They had an adverse effect. He's a good horse, but just a cut below Twining."

KENTUCKY DERBY POST-POSITION DRAW

TO BE TELECAST LIVE NewSport, Prime SportsChannel Networks 24-hour sports news network, will provide live coverage of the post-position draws of the 1994 Kentucky Derby and Belmont Stakes. NewSport will carry the Kentucky Derby post-position draw live from Churchill Downs Thurs., May 5 at approximately 10:15 a.m. EST. The Belmont Stakes draw Thurs., June 9 will also be televised live beginning at 10:30 a.m. EST. The post-race press conferences for each Triple Crown event will also be covered live by NewSport, which is available to seven million subscribers.

HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES TO BE ANNOUNCED TODAY

The 1994 inductees to Thoroughbred Racing's Hall of Fame will be announced this morning at 11:30 in the Churchill Downs press box. The jockey, trainer and horses named will enter the Hall of Fame in Saratoga Springs, New York August 8th.

FASIG-TIPTON SALES RESULTS The Fasig-Tipton Kentucky Two-Year-Olds in Training and Horses of Racing Age Sale took place Mon., May 2 at Newtown Paddocks in Lexington, Ky. There were 57 two-year-olds sold for a gross of \$876,700 and an average of \$15,381, up less than one percent from 1993. The highest-priced two-year-old was a filly by Lord At War (ARG)--Eternal Snow (IRE) (African Sky{GB}), who was purchased for \$65,000 by David T. Greathouse, agent. There were also 14 horses of racing age sold for a total of \$202,700 and an average of \$14,479, down 16 percent from last year. The top-priced horse of racing age was **Westabout**, a four-year-old filly by Gone West--Stepping High (No Robbery). The filly, who was purchased by Evangelos Poulos for \$67,000, has a race record of 10-3-1-2 and \$55,161 to date.

IT'S NOT ALL BLACK AND WHITE AT

ARLINGTON ANYMORE When the first race runs at Arlington opening day, May 8, fans will notice a colorful difference when they try to follow their selections around the track. In all races except stakes, horses will be equipped with saddle cloths that correspond to their numbers on the official programs. The spectrum runs from red for number one to lime green for 12. Black cloths with white numbers were previously used. Traditional Arlington green towels with white letters and numbers will still be worn in the season's 46 stakes races. "The system will help bring uniformity to racing," said Racing Secretary Frank Gabriel Jr. "It was very well accepted at Hollywood Park, and we plan to use those same colors. I think it will add to the enjoyment of Arlington fans at the track, and those watching our programs on television at other locations."

Kandaly (Alydar): The Louisiana Derby winner worked five-eighths yesterday at Churchill Downs in 1:01, galloping out the six furlongs in 1:14 1/5. "He couldn't have done any better," said Willie Martinez, who substituted for jockey Craig Perret aboard Kandaly for the work. "He started out slow, but he picked it up down the lane. I never had to ask him. When he switched leads he took off." Because stablemate Clev Er Irish has a cold and is on antibiotics, trainer Louie Roussel had Kandaly scoped Tues. "Doc (Patrick Moloney) says he's perfect," Roussel said afterward. "I thought it was a good work. He went :37 1/5 for three-eighths and then came home in :23 4/5, which is good work."

Meadow Flight (Meadowlake): The Flamingo Stakes winner galloped 1 1/2-miles Tues. morning. Trainer Jim Ryerson has the colt scheduled to work Wed. morning around 9 a.m. with Derby rider Shane Sellers getting aboard for the first time. Ryerson was asked about the keys to success for Meadow Flight Sat. "I would like to see us break well," Ryerson said. "He has some natural speed, so I'd like to be third or fourth going into the first turn with somebody pressuring Holy Bull. If we can get to that point, I'll be happy."

Powis Castle (Rare Brick): The Vistas Stable runner registered a sharp five-furlong workout yesterday in 1:00 2/5 for trainer Rodney Rash. The fractions went in :25 1/5 for the opening quarter and :48 4/5 for the half-mile. His final furlong was accomplished in a swift :11 3/5 seconds. "I've been training him for stamina," said Rash, "so today I wanted to put some speed back in him. It was an excellent work. Not so much the time, but it was the way he did it. He came back bouncing and that's the way you want it."

Smilin Singin Sam (Smile): The Dogwood Stable charge went five furlongs in 1:00 4/5 yesterday with Derby rider Larry Melancon up. Fractions on the work were :25, :36 4/5, :48 3/5 and out in 1:14 3/5. "I was very pleased with the work," said trainer Niall O'Callaghan. "A horse broke in about a sixteenth of a mile in front of him and they said it was Jeano, Carl Nafzger's good sprinter, and she gave him something to run at. I was happy with the work because he gets a bit lazy (working on his own)." O'Callaghan decided to work Smilin Singin Sam yesterday instead of waiting for Wed. citing an 80 percent probability of rain Tues. afternoon.

KENTUCKY OAKS DRAWS A CROWD

Although most racing fans are unaware of it, the Kentucky Oaks has bounced like a Spaldeen in recent years until it has become the third biggest gate attraction racing has if one looks at attendance figures on-track.

When 81,882 turned at the Churchill Downs on Oaks Day last year, only the Derby itself (136,817) and the Preakness (97,641) surpassed its attendance. This Friday, just like the Derby, the 1 1/8 mile Oaks will be run for the 120th time on an afternoon's card which will also be handsomely garnished by the lure of Claiborne Farm's Lure in the \$200,000 Early Times Turf Classic plus the \$200,000-added Louisville Budweiser Breeders' Cup for fillies and mares three-years old and up.

This year's 3-year-old filly crop, like its male counterpart, is loaded with talent and highly interesting stories as well. Geographically, the top performers seems to be coming at us from everywhere, and in a year in which Texas joins the racing community it seems only proper that two of the top performers come from that state in one way or another.

But remember, things change rapidly in the 3-year-old filly division. A year ago Eliza entered the Oaks at the head of the class, but when the race was over Dispute had beaten Eliza convincingly. Only now is Eliza starting back towards the racetrack. Dispute, herself had a fine year, but Hollywood Wildcat developed late and won the championship of the division.

The favorite for this year's Oaks will probably be Mike Rutherford's unbeaten (4-4) Lakeway, and her bloodlines are impeccable. She is by Triple Crown winner Seattle Slew from Milliardaire, she by Triple Crown second Alydar. All of her victories have been at Santa Anita, and the progression has been letter-perfect: six furlongs in 1:09 1/5; seven furlongs in 1:21 1/5; a mile in 1:35; 1 1/16 miles in 1:41 3/5.

Rutherford and trainer Gary Jones had considered Lakeway a possible Derby entrant, but will shoot her for the Oaks instead. If all goes well in it she will be shipped to Sam Houston for its Oaks May 28. Rutherford is a Texan.

So, too, is Two Altazano, the winner of the

Fair Grounds Oaks and the \$250,000 Fantasy at Oaklawn Park at odds of 18-1. Two Altazano is owned and was bred by Harold Goodman of Brazos T Farm some 30 miles from Houston. Two years ago Goodman had six horses. Now he has 80 and designs on the Sam Houston Oaks as well.

When 1993 concluded, the top 2-year-old fillies were considered to be Breeders' Cup winner Phone Chatter, Sardula, and Heavenly Prize, the 1-2-3 finishers in the \$1 million Juvenile Fillies. Phone Chatter, though, injured a cannon bone and will not be headed back to competition until at least Del Mar.

Sardula recently commenced her new year with a smashing 8 1/2 length victory in a stake at Santa Anita and she, too, will draw a lot of betting money in the Oaks. Her earnings, by the way are a hefty \$593,545. Heavenly Prize has been out only once in '94 and ran an excellent second to the very quick Swift And Classy.

Heavenly Prize is one of three potentially exceptional 3-year-old fillies under the shedrow of trainer Shug McGaughey. A year ago he won the Kentucky Oaks with Dispute for owner Ogden Mills (Dinny) Phipps. This year Phipps has Inside Information as a very forceful and improving filly flying his silks. She recently won the \$250,000 Ashland at Keeneland just as she pleased.

Although McGaughey normally trains homebreds, there is a filly in his barn named Lotta Dancing that cost owner Heidi Doubleday \$625,000 as a yearling. By Alydar from grass specialist Lotka, Lotta Dancing is 2-for-3.

At this time of the year it is normal to concentrate on the colts getting ready to start in the Kentucky Derby, but this year the filly crop looks as good as any in recent years. And a mere two days after the Kentucky Oaks has been run the \$150,000 Acorn starts the major races for 3-year-old fillies in New York.
