## ARAZI UNDERGOES SURGERY IN ENGLAND

**Arazi** (Blushing Groom {Fr}), the champion two-year-old colt in France and the U.S. in 1991, underwent surgery Sunday night after he showed signs of colic. The chestnut, who caught the imagination of racing fans with his victory in the '91 Breeders' Cup Juvenile, is now standing at Dalham Hall Stud in Newmarket, England. "He was only operated on (Sunday) night so he is still under intensive care, but all indications are encouraging," said Justin Wadham, director of Dalham Hall Stud. "He was uncomfortable Sunday evening when he came in, and he was operated on at about 11:00 p.m. There was actually no surgical intervention to the intestines. They opened him up and found a displaced large intestine and a slightly twisted small intestine. The next two to three days are critical, but hopefully, in 48 hours we'll be able to say he's fine." The operation was performed at Greenwood-Ellis & Partners by Dr. Huw Neale and Dr. Andrew Edgar. Arazi entered stud in 1993, and his first foals arrived this spring; the surgery is not expected to interfere with his career as a stallion.

## MRS. JAMES BAYARD VOTED TOBA

**"OWNER OF THE MONTH"** The Thoroughbred Owners and Breeders Association "Owner of the Month" for June is Mrs. James Bayard. Mrs. Bayard has been involved in Thoroughbred racing for 44 years; she and her late husband began their breeding operation at Bohemia Manor Farm in Chesapeake City, Maryland. During the month of June, Bayard's homebred Calpha earned her fifth straight victory in the GII Reeve Schley S. The TOBA "Owner of the Month" Award is sponsored by Gainsborough Farm.

## TOP FILLIES TO MEET AT DEAUVILLE

**Kissing Cousin (Ire)** (Danehill), winner of the GI Coronation S. at Royal Ascot June 15, is set to meet **Lemon Souffle (GB)** (Salse) in the GII Prix d'Astarte at Deauville July 31. Lemon Souffle, who was highweight 2-year-old filly in Ireland and England but was injured last season, returned to peak form winning the GII Falmouth S. at Newmarket July 6.

## GII \$300,000 Frank J. De Francis Memorial Dash, Laurel, 7-16, 3yo/up, 6f

As many as 12 sprinters could spring from the starting gate Saturday in Laurel's feature race. **Cherokee Run** (Runaway Groom) is the likely favorite; the Frank Alexander trainee was second, beaten a head, in the GII Tom Fool S. last out and runner-up to Holy Bull in the Met Mile two starts back. Also heading in from New York is the Mike Hushion entry of **Boom Towner** (Obligato) and **Chief Desire** (Chief Steward). "They ran one-two in the Bold Ruler; Chief Desire won that race by a half-length, but I can't pick which one is better," said Hushion. Boom Towner won the Decathlon S. at Monmouth and then was third in the GIII Finger Lakes Budweiser Breeders' Cup H.; Chief Desire was second to fellow Dash runner **Blushing Julian** (Mt. Livermore) in the GII General George S. at Laurel earlier this year and won the Bold Ruler and Sporting Plate H. **Fu Man Slew** (Slew's Royalty) was scheduled to fly in from California yesterday. The three-year-old worked for the race at Hollywood Sunday, going a bullet five furlongs in :59 2/5; he is three for five lifetime and looks for his first stakes win. **Individual Style** (Something Lucky), a two-time SW in California this year, has already arrived at Laurel. Trainer Mark Hennig will send out **Demaloot Demashoot** (Bold Ruckus), winner of the '94 GIII Count Fleet Sprint H., while Bobby Frankel has engaged Robbie Davis to ride the three-year-old **You And I** (Kris S.), winner of four of seven lifetime, including the GIII Riva Ridge S. at Belmont in June. Also expected for the race are **Lazy Luke** (Pancho Villa), 7x SW **Secret Odds** (Secreto), who set the pace in last year's edition of the event before tiring to finish seventh, and **Smart Alec** (Smarten); **Never Wavering** (Wavering Monarch), whose three wins in '94 include the Aristides Breeders' Cup H., would be a supplemental entry.

## BEATING THE HEAT

A recent Thursday afternoon found the Chicago Cubs playing the Florida Marlins at Joe Robbie Stadium. It was a rare day game during the summer; by 3:30 the temperature hit 130 degrees in right field, where Gary Sheffield was chasing down laser shots off the bat of Mark Grace. The 100 percent humidity turned players and spectators alike into bad imitations of wet mops. A breeze from the east lifted the stadium flags a couple of times, but provided no relief.

The crowd of 35,835, greased from head to toe with double-digit sun block, began leaving by the sixth inning, mumbling that this had to be a preview of Hell.

A half-mile north at Calder Race Course, it was business as usual for the horses running on the 10-race card. For the animals it was the same mind-numbing temperatures, the same high humidity the ballplayers experienced on the field. Unlike the Marlins, however, who play one or two afternoon games at home between June and late September, the races at Calder are a five-day-a-week, "the show must go on" occurrence.

How do horses handle the tropical heat of South Florida? Just about as well as we humans do--not very well at all.

After prolonged stimulation in the heat, a horse's heart will beat 40 to 50 times faster than when it's at rest. A horse's temperature may rise from a normal 99 degrees to a very dangerous 106 in the few minutes it takes to run a race.

A major problem for horses in the tropics is dehydration. An even more serious problem occurs if the horse's sweat glands shut down from being overworked--then the horse becomes a "non-sweater." In the Caribbean, this condition is called "dry coat." About two percent of all horses become non-sweaters; the only cure is to ship them north to run in a cooler climate.

Calder trainers Frank Gomez, Bill White and Marty Wolfson all agree on one thing about tending to horses in the tropics: Get them out early in the morning and get them back in the stalls before the sun starts to heat up.

Frank Gomez has been a fixture at Calder since it opened in 1971, and is the all-time leading trainer with 705 victories and the all-time leading

stakes winner with 83. If anyone has mastered the art of surviving the Florida summer, it's Gomez.

"I like to get finished and be out of here by 8:00 a.m.," says Gomez, who usually carries 28 horses. "I back off on my training schedule during the summer; it doesn't do them any good to work hard, and it may hurt them."

Veterinarian Dr. George Burch advises trainers to increase the electrolytes (sodium, potassium and salt) they give their horses. Burch said, "Horses can be given electrolytes in liquids, in the feed or intravenously. We also have to watch the thyroid gland to make sure it doesn't stop functioning. There are tablets we can give for the thyroid if it starts acting up."

Bill White led all Calder trainers last summer, and says one of the simplest but most effective things he does each year is to replace the fans. "Those 20-inch fans are good for about one summer, so each year I buy 40 fans at a cost of \$2,000. You have to keep the air circulating around each horse, so we put a fan in front of each stall. It may not sound like much, but I believe it helps keep the horses comfortable. I also like to start training at 5:30 in the morning while it's still dark. We get all the older horses out early. We can't do that with the two-year-olds because they are so unpredictable in the dark, but the older horses train well before the sun comes up.

"I also hose off each horse as soon as it comes back from a workout. A horse can lose as much as 25 pounds during a race, so we give them plenty of water after they've cooled out. Some of my horses will drink two pails of water--that's about four gallons."

Marty Wolfson, who trains Team Valor's Florida string as well as his father's Harbor View horses, says, "I like to get the training done as early in the morning as I can. We're finished an hour and a half earlier in the summer than we are in the winter. We take every horse's temperature in the morning and in the evening. If it goes above 101 degrees, we keep a close eye on them. I also don't run horses as much in the summer. I might run a horse once a month now, and maybe twice a month in the winter. They get less feed now, and I use more sweet feed and less alfalfa."

Trainer Sonny Hine, who spent two summers in Florida before returning to Monmouth Park, said he found a solution to the heat. "I taught my owner how to train his own horses so I could go north."
