MORE MILLION-DOLLAR MARES AT

KEENELAND Osamu Yasuda paid a top price of \$2.7 million for Maplejinsky (Nijinsky II), the dam of Sky Beauty, during Monday's session of Keeneland's November Breeding Stock Sale. Drew Nardiello's Chesapeake Farm, agent, consigned the nine-year-old broodmare, who is in foal to A. P. Indy. The dam of Breeders' Cup Juvenile winner Timber Country brought the second highest price of the day. John Magnier paid \$2.4 million for Fall Aspen (Pretense), an 18-year-old in foal to Danzig. John J. Greely's Wintergreen Farm, agent, sold the broodmare, who has produced six stakes winners in addition to Timber Country. A total of 290 horses sold Monday for \$39,260,500. The average, \$135,381, was up nearly 21 percent over last year's figure for the second session of the sale. The Breeding Stock Sale continues through November 15.

RECORD HANDLE AT OAK TREE The Oak Tree Racing Association completed its 26th meeting at Santa Anita Monday with a record daily average handle of \$8,782,071. Boosted by the introduction of full-card simulcasting from Bay Meadows and an expanding satellite network, Oak Tree surpassed the previous record of \$8,232,297 set last year, when the 10th Breeders' Cup was held at Santa Anita. Total handle for the 27-day meet was \$237,115,928, down 3.1 percent from the 31-day meet in 1993. The total on-track attendance of 376,942 was down 24.6 percent from last year, while the daily average of 13,961 was down 13.4 percent.

FASIG-TIPTON MIXED SALE POSTS MAJOR GAINS The Fasig-Tipton Fall Mixed Sale, held Sunday evening in Lexington, showed significant increases over 1993 in both gross and average. A total of 102 hips were sold this year for a gross of \$5,564,000, up 59 percent over the '93 sale, when 82 horses went for a total of \$2,284,100. The '94 average, \$54,549, was up 49 percent over the average of \$27,855 a year ago. The sales topper was Rose's Cantina (Naskra), a MGISW with career earnings of \$723,139; believed in foal to Deputy Minister, the mare, who was consigned by Foxfield, went for a bid of \$550,000 to Calumet Farm.

Savinio had picked up checks in each of his nine starts this year but was looking for his first win since taking a Hollywood allowance in April. Stretching out after finishing second in back-to-back allowance races at a mile, the second choice in the field made his move from just off the leaders to pass pacesetter Square Cut in deep stretch and pull away under jockey Chris McCarron for his first stakes success. "He's been training great," said trainer Walter Greenman. "He's starting to relax now, and that makes a big difference. It really makes me feel good to see him put it all together and run like he did today." Said his rider, "He rated kindly. He was going strong the whole way." The favorite, Sir Mark Sykes, made up some ground late to just miss second. "He was just a little flat in his finish," said jockey Corey Black. "I couldn't believe I couldn't get by Square Cut, the way he went early. But my horse went just even down the lane."

SHERGAR MYSTERY SOLVED? An end could be in sight to the mystery surrounding the disappearance of 1981 Epsom Derby winner **Shergar** (Great Nephew {GB}). Shergar was abducted while at stud in Ireland; no trace of the colt was ever found. Now, years later, his owners have been offered his remains for 20,000 British pounds. Irish veterinarian Stan Cosgrove, a substantial shareholder, confirmed that he has been approached. He said, "The offer does seem to be genuine." Cosgrove, like all of the shareholders, is hoping to get proof of Shergar's demise so that an insurance policy, which did not cover simple theft but would be payable on conclusive evidence of death, could finally be paid out. According to some reports, Cosgrove has offered 5,000 British pounds to an intermediary and is hoping DNA testing on the remains will satisfy the insurers.

HOLLYWOOD TO OFFER FULL-CARD

SIMULCASTING Hollywood Park will offer full-card simulcasting from Bay Meadows for the first time during the upcoming Autumn Festival meet, which begins Wednesday, November 11. Full television coverage of the races from Bay Meadows will be aired continuously on selected monitors throughout Hollywood Park. In addition, coverage will be expanded to all televisions during the actual running of the Bay Meadows races. As horses are loaded into the starting gate, all monitors will switch to the signal from Bay Meadows; as soon as all of the horses have crossed the wire, they will switch back to the post parade for the upcoming race at Hollywood, followed by the official results from Bay Meadows. "We think this approach represents a good middle ground in presenting the races from up north," said Mike Williams, Hollywood's broadcast coordinator. "This will help call attention to the northern races while not interfering with our live events."

GENUINE RISK TO THE COURT OF CHIEF

HONCHO Genuine Risk (Exclusive Native), who was retired to the breeding shed in 1982 but didn't produce her first foal until '93, will be bred next year to Chief Honcho. The 1980 Kentucky Derby winner's only offspring, a yearling colt by Rahy named Genuine Reward, will be trained by Bill Mott, who also conditioned GI-winning millionaire Chief Honcho.

REWRITING THE RECORD BOOKS

He aspired to be a sportswriter, but one sport that never made much of an impression on him was Thoroughbred racing...that was, until he had a Thoroughbred racehorse of his own.

"I had never been a racing fan. I had been to Santa Anita, Hialeah, the Fair Grounds, but racing didn't interest me that much. I followed football, baseball, basketball, track," said sportswriter wannabe turned oil magnate John Franks. "I didn't really get into it until a horse of mine won--then I found racing the most thrilling thing in the world."

Franks experiences that thrill more often than just about anybody; within a few years of his first trip to the winner's circle he was ranked among the top owners and breeders in the country. The 69-year-old Louisiana native won the Eclipse Award as leading owner in '83, '84 and '93; was the top owner in races won in '87, '88, and '89; led all owners in number of stakes wins for five years in a row, from '88-'92; and topped the money-won standings as a breeder for the first time last year. He has campaigned six millionaires--Dave's Friend, Heatherton, Homebuilder, Lively One, Stalwars and Kissin Kris--and about 150 other stakes winners. And while accumulating purse money, awards, records and memories, Franks has acquired horses by the barnload. At its peak, his Thoroughbred cavalry would have filled just about every stall on the backstretch of the Fair Grounds; over 900 Thoroughbreds depended on Franks for their room and board.

"It's time to cut the numbers down. My main enjoyment comes from racing," Franks said. "In the beginning it was more exciting to win with a homebred, but I can't honestly say that is the case any more. There are too many headaches managing the number of horses I've accumulated. My goal is to keep enough mares to supply a racing stable of 30 or 40 quality horses, or less. It wasn't cost effective to keep the numbers so high. I have to look at it as a good businessman would."

He's also looking at it as a good husband should. "I'm almost 70...my wife said 'don't leave me with all those horses.' I want it so that she can have one sale and be out of the business," Franks said.

One hundred and forty-five Franks horses went through the Fasig-Tipton sales ring in Lexington, Kentucky on the day before the Breeders' Cup. "I'm selling 80 in Arkansas--I try to put the horses where they fit--and I hope to sell another 160 next year," Franks said. "I keep up with all my horses and it's gotten to be more work than fun. I think racing will be more pleasant for me now.

"Maybe we won't make a profit, but until we sell some inventory, we won't know where we stand."

Franks knew where he stood after spending the bulk of World War II peering through a bombsight. He wanted a profession where real money could be made and sportswriting didn't fit the criteria. One business in Louisiana did--the oil business. His father had worked the oil rigs, but Franks decided to delve a little deeper by returning to college to become a geologist, earning his degree at LSU while on a track and field scholarship. He founded Franks Petroleum about 1960 and struck it big in the late '70s. In 1989 he earned the oil business' equivalent of an Eclipse Award when he was named Oil Man of the Year.

"I think my experience in the oil business has served me well in the horse business. In both businesses, we're risk takers, but we need to be able to analyze the risk intelligently if we are going to make a profit," Franks remarked. With an eye towards turning a profit, Franks set his sights on a certain kind of horse. "I like a horse with a lot of heart, one that tries all the time. I don't pay any attention to size--I've had so many good small horses--but I do look for a huge girth and high withers. If a horse has a great body and is good down to the knees, I'll put up with more crooked legs than most people will. But I'm like anyone else. I like to get into the big races."

It wasn't until his wells really started pumping petrodollars in the late '70s that Franks started to play the racing game. He bought a farm in the Louisiana countryside and on that farm there was a horse. Franks let him stay. Liked to see him run.

"A farmhand kept an old broken-down stallion and he was always trying to get some mares to breed to. He talked me into buying a few broodmares," Franks said. "I got into the business in a big way in 1981. I had had two major operations and I thought I needed some diversity in my life. Until then, it has just been the oil business."

Franks named the first foal dropped on his farm Alta's Lady for his wife Alta. Later, when the mare was bred to John's Choice, Franks' wife returned the favor by naming the resulting foal Blissful Union for their happy marriage. The aptly named filly developed an affinity for the winner's circle and became the Franks Stable's first major stakes winner.

Don't look for Blissful Union in any reduction sale: she stays on the farm. So does 19-year-old pensioner and track-record setter Dave's Friend. "He's still out in the front yard," said Franks. "I go out there and feed him butterscotch candies. He loves them. He'll eat a gallon of them if you let him."

Two sides of John Franks emerge as he talks about his horses. He'll speak of them in such business terms as profitability, risk management and return on investment. He'll also speak of them as family. He said, "When I watch a horse of mine run, it's like I'm watching a child of mine. My horses are like an extension of me."
