GRINDSTONE RETIRED Grindstone (Unbridled), who gave trainer D. Wayne Lukas his sixth straight Triple Crown victory by winning last Saturday's Kentucky Derby, has sustained a bone chip in his right knee and has been retired, owner/breeder William T. Young announced Thursday. The three-year-old colt showed discomfort coming off the Churchill Downs track Thursday morning, his first trip to the track since winning the Derby. Radiographs were taken, and a chip on the right knee was discovered. "This is in the best interest of the health of the horse," Young said. "This injury is not life-threatening to Grindstone; it's simply the right thing to do. We are so thankful for the Derby win. He will make a great sire." The injury is a triangular shaped chip on the inner corner of the knee, according to Young's veterinarian, Dr. Robert W. Copelan. "The fragment comprises a significant area of the articular surface of the radial carpal bone and would compromise his ability to return to the same level of racing performance," Copelan said. Grindstone underwent arthroscopic surgery on the same knee in August, 1995. He becomes the first horse since Spend a Buck in 1985 to miss the Preakness after winning the Derby. Grindstone's racing career ends with three wins and two seconds in just six career starts, for earnings of \$1,224,510. Along with his nose victory in the 122nd Run for the Roses, he won the GIII Louisiana Derby and was second by a neck in the GI Arkansas Derby. Out of the Grade I Spinaway S. winner Buzz My Bell (Drone), Grindstone will begin his career as a stallion at Young's Overbrook Farm in Lexington, Kentucky next year.

SOUL OF THE MATTER HEADED STRAIGHT TO HOLLYWOOD GOLD CUP Burt Bacharach's Soul of the Matter (Private Terms) will skip the GI Californian S. June 2 and will go straight into the \$1 million Hollywood Gold Cup June 30, trainer Richard Mandella said yesterday. Soul of the Matter hasn't raced since finishing second to Cigar in the March 27 Dubai World Cup. The two are expected to meet again in the Hollywood Gold Cup.

FULL-CARD SIMULCASTING TO BECOME A REALITY IN OKLAHOMA The Oklahoma State Legislature passed a bill Wednesday that will help ensure the further success of the horse racing industry in the state. Oklahoma's House of Representatives passed Senate Bill 1167 by the landslide margin of 71-25. The bill would allow the state's racing facilities--Remington Park, Blue Ribbon Downs and Fair Meadows--to import full-program signals from other tracks in North America. The bill was approved by the Senate earlier this week and is on its way to the desk of Governor Frank Keating, who has said he will sign it. Simulcasting could begin in time for Remington Park's Quarter Horse meet, which begins May 17. "I'm delighted that after all the ups and downs, we finally came to the agreement," Remington Park Chief Operating Officer Patrick K. Jaynes said. "We can start to compete on a level field with Texas and Arkansas and our horses will get the kind of purses to make it profitable to race here instead of other places." Jaynes estimated that full-card simulcasting will allow Remington Park to increase purses by as much as 20 to 25 percent. The new law would also allow Oklahoma tracks to be open for business when there is no live racing. Under the legislation, a state track can have up to six full-card simulcasts on a live racing day, and two can be shown while an Oklahoma track is conducting a race. Also, each track can simulcast six full-card, out-of-state races on days when no racing is conducted. But that number is limited to 50 percent of the number of live race days allotted each track.

ALEX GREAVES: FIRST LADY AT EPSOM

Jockey Alex Greaves is set to make history by becoming the first woman to ride in the Epsom Derby. Greaves partnered **Portugese Lil (GB)** (Master Willie {GB}) into eighth place in last Sunday's 1000 Guineas at Newmarket and will definitely keep the ride in Britain's premier classic June 8. Connections of the filly, still a maiden but beaten only about 13 lengths last weekend, had been expected to target a 10-furlong contest before the big race against top-class colts, but that idea has been shelved. David Nicholls, the Thirsk-based trainer of Portugese Lil, said, "There was a little race at Beverley that we'd been talking about. But I think that is very unlikely now. It looks as if it's straight to Epsom." Nicholls, also Greaves's husband, added, "Alex is absolutely delighted by the prospect. She is really looking forward to breaking new ground in the Derby."

BLUE DUSTER AIMING FOR ROYAL ASCOT

Blue Duster (Danzig), last season's European champion juvenile filly, appears to have lost her chance of Classic glory. Sheikh Mohammed's four-time winner was scratched from last weekend's English 1000 Guineas after suffering a minor back problem and is now expected to miss her original alternative target, the Irish equivalent May 25. But Blue Duster's connections have not given up hope that the heroine of last season's G1 Shadwell Stud Cheveley Park S. can again make her mark at the highest level, and have targeted a clash with 1000 Guineas winner **Bosra Sham** (Woodman) in Royal Ascot's G1 Coronation S. June 19 as her comeback race for 1996. Trainer David Loder said, "We're perfectly happy with her. We've never really had to stop with her, she just wasn't quite right, but she's fine now and the plan is to have her ready to run at Royal Ascot."

PRIVATE RACING IN AUSTRALIA? Rumors are circulating in Australia that a privately-owned racing circuit is being set up which could rival existing Australian Racing Clubs. The circuit is believed to involve the construction of a number of 2000-meter (1 1/4-mile) dirt racetracks, with prize money being at a minimum of \$50,000 (Australian) per race. Racing on the circuit is intended for pay television, with the revenue from the racing to come from betting, with a view to attracting serious bettors from Asia and other areas. It is rumored that many leading owners, trainers and jockeys have already been approached to support the project and have signed confidentiality agreements not to divulge details of the project. Apparently upset by the prospect, the Victoria Racing Club in Melbourne has issued a statement, saying, "Victoria Racing Club does not support proprietary racing. We believe that all profits from racing should be paid to the real owners of the racing industry--the owners of racehorses and the trainers and jockeys and others that they engage--in the form of prize money."

JOCKEY CLUB RELEASES 1996 FACT BOOK

The Jockey Club has released the 1996 edition of its annual statistical guide to the Thoroughbred industry, entitled "The Jockey Club Fact Book." Summarizing current breeding, racing and public auction trends throughout the previous decade, the booklet is designed as a handy reference for writers, publicists and speech makers both within and outside the Thoroughbred industry. Although the format of the 1996 Fact Book has been kept largely the same as in previous years, some information has been expanded and new statistics introduced.

CHAMPION JULIO CESAR CHAVEZ TO SPAR AT HOLLYWOOD

Six-time world champion boxer Julio Cesar Chavez makes his final Los Angeles appearance Saturday, May 25 at Hollywood Park as he spars in preparation for his 100th career fight, a June 7 WBC super lightweight title bout against Oscar De La Hoya. Chavez, 33, will spar several rounds in front of the Hollywood fans from approximately 11:15 a.m. to 12 p.m. The ring will be situated on the apron in the general admission area, close to the finish line. General admission is \$6. Chavez will have a race named in his honor May 25. Afterwards, he will decorate the winner and address his fans. The appearance will be the second by Chavez at Hollywood Park. He drew 33,009 fans when he sparred at the track in 1993. Chavez, the WBC super lightweight champion, will put his title and 97-1-1 record on the line in the June 7 match. Olympic Gold Medalist and three-time world champion De La Hoya will look to add to his perfect record of 21-0.

The Kevin Prendergast-trainee was always travelling smoothly in mid-field and then quickened to lead just over a furlong from the post. Prendergast said, "Oscar Schindler wasn't the luckiest of horses last year--he had a bad run in the Irish Derby and missed the St. Leger because of a minor foot problem--but he's just beginning to fill into his frame. He has a high cruising speed and I think his best distance would be a mile and a half. The Hardwicke S. at Royal Ascot (June 21) is likely to be among his targets now."

WINDFIELDS DISPERSAL STRIKES SAD NOTE

Count me among the many people who were surprised by last week's announcement that Windfields Farm will begin a dispersal of its breeding stock in the fall.

This isn't just any breeding farm. It's the one that produced Northern Dancer and Nijinsky II and countless others of international prominence. It's the one with the famous turquoise and gold silks. It's the one that put Canadian racing on the map.

"You go out there and you're proud to be wearing those silks; they have a lot of history to them," Canadian jockey Robert Landry said when he heard the news. "Thinking that maybe you'll never go out there riding in them again is a little saddening. I've only personally been (to the Oshawa, Ontario, Canada farm) once and never really saw the whole (1,200 acre) farm, but whenever you hear the name Windfields Farm you think of class and history."

That history goes back 60 years. Literally the day it was founded was the day of the dispersal announcement.

Windfields is only one win away from breeding its 350th stakes winner, far and away the best in the world.

"You just think (Windfields Farm) is racing," Landry added. "It's Canadian racing is what it boils down to. Whenever Windfields Farm is mentioned, people pick their heads up, so it's saddening really. The whole organization is just loaded with class from the ground up. They've treated me wonderfully over the past five or six years that I've ridden for them. You can't ask for better treatment than what they've given me."

Anyone who has ever dealt with Windfields' management can attest to Landry's comments. Farm Manager Bernard McCormack is a gentleman of the first order, always available for information and the first to congratulate a customer when a Windfields-bred wins. Mac Benson, who was hired by Windfields's founder E.P. Taylor to come to Canada from Delaware to be his private horse trainer in 1978, is equally cordial. Any reporter who has ever talked to him has received nothing but honesty.

Although he only trains a few horses for Windfields, Benson has not forgotten which

organization made him such a success. "It was the epitome of class, both in horses and in management, so it's a tremendous void to the business," Benson said. Ric Waldman, who is vice-president of Thoroughbred operations and manages the farm's stallion interests in the U.S., is cut from the same classy cloth.

Yet it is Charles Taylor, the president of Windfields, who epitomizes everything that is good about the organization. There is nary a person who will say a bad word about Taylor, who sadly is ailing, a primary reason Windfields has been forced to disperse its breeding stock.

As a former reporter, one who had covered major international stories, Taylor has understood the personality of writers. He has never backed down from a tough question and has been more than willing to put a reporter on the right track.

It is a personal hope that Taylor will be well enough to appreciate the Breeders' Cup when it comes to Woodbine October 26. Taylor has been a major player not only in bringing the event to Canada, but in getting it started. When Breeders' Cup founder John Gaines sought individuals to help him achieve his dream, he called Taylor.

It was E.P. Taylor who built Woodbine and made it into one of the greatest racetracks in the world, but it was his son who helped bring the Breeders' Cup to the Toronto track, an event that even his father could have never imagined happening. E.P. Taylor dreamed the big dream in every aspect of horse racing. Charles Taylor kept it going.

To see Windfields Farm nearing the finish line as a breeder and to have its leader in poor health is sad indeed. The farm will still continue to offer a full range of services from boarding to training to standing stallions and much more. Fortunately, Windfields won't be gone forever.
