MEYOCKS NAMED NYRA PRESIDENT & COO

Terry Meyocks was named President and Chief Operating Officer of the New York Racing Association by its Board of Trustees at its meeting Wednesday morning. Kenny Noe Jr. will remain as Chairman and Chief Executive Officer. "I'm very honored to be named President and Chief Operating Officer for the New York Racing Association," said Meyocks, who formerly served as NYRA's Vice President of Racing and, most recently, Vice President of Operations. "I would like to thank the Trustees for their show of confidence in me. I understand fully that there are many challenges to overcome, but at the same time, I feel there are tremendous opportunities for Thoroughbred breeding and racing here in New York. The New York Racing Association has been a leader in our industry and we hope to continue to play a role in that tradition of excellence." Noe Jr. added, "The NYRA Trustees made a fine selection in promoting Terry Meyocks...he has the work ethic, knowledge and desire to lead New York racing in the future. As to myself remaining as Chairman and CEO, I think one has to know when it is time to cut back on some of his daily activities. I may only devote 5 1/2 days a week now."

CELTIC ARMS, DERNIER EMPEREUR RETIRED

Gary Tanaka's **Celtic Arms** (Fr) (Comrade in Arms {GB}) has suffered a recurrence of the ligament injury that has kept him away from the races since taking the GII Pan American H. at Gulfstream in March. The French Derby winner retires with five wins in 21 starts and earnings of \$1,097,995. In addition to his '94 GI Prix Du Jockey Club triumph, the five-year-old won the G1 Prix Lupin and the G3 Prix De Conde. This year he took the GII Gulfstream Park Breeders Cup H. and, in his final race, the March 9 GII Pan American H. to give trainer Ben Cecil his first graded stakes win. Another Tanaka star, **Dernier Empereur** (Tremolino), has also now been officially retired. The six-year-old, twice champion in France, fractured a left front cannon bone during a routine gallop at Hollywood Park November 9 while preparing for the Japan Cup. Dernier Empereur won five graded/group stakes from ages three to six, including the G1 Dubai Champion S. in England, G2 Prix Guillaume d'Ornano in France and this year's GII Del Mar Invitational H. and GII Carleton F. Burke H. in Southern California. He retires with eight wins in 30 starts for earnings of \$1,141,363. Stud plans for the pair have not been finalized.

WEDNESDAY AT THE RACING SYMPOSIUM

The 23rd annual Symposium on Racing, sponsored by the University of Arizona Race Track Industry Program, opened Wednesday with a review of the ramifications the newly created Federal Gaming Commission may hold for the racing industry, and the release of impressive figures from the Horse Industry's National Economic Impact Study. Funded by a consortium of racing and breeding organizations, the study reveals that the overall economic impact of the horse industry exceeds \$112 billion. This puts the industry on a par with motion pictures and apparel manufacturing as a leading contributor to the American economy. The Federal Gaming Commission has been funded by Congress to undertake a two-year study of gambling in America. Its charter is to review existing laws that regulate gambling; examine the relationship between gambling and crime; explore the impact of gambling on businesses, families, and other institutions; study the positive economic impact of gambling; determine the extent of problem gambling; and better understand the growth and influence of gambling on the Internet. "The Federal Gaming Commission was created to focus primarily on casinos, lotteries and Internet betting," explained Jay Hickey, President of the American Horse Council. "Pari-mutuel betting really had nothing to do with this Commission being created, although it will be affected by it. Racing must unify and get our positions and answers set before the Commission comes knocking. We must put ourselves in the best possible light and protect all of our future options."

A look at how racing has prospered in Australia and Hong Kong was presented at the other major morning session on The Globalization of Racing. Moderator Hans Stahl, President, The Jockey Club, summed it up best when noting that "Far East and Australasia racing are now much more than just an exotic adjunct to our North American racing product." Satellite signals from Hong Kong, Sydney and Melbourne are now beamed into numerous tracks and simulcast outlets throughout North America, generating significant handle. Participation has grown dramatically by horses from Europe, Japan, Australia and North America in major international races throughout the world. And "shuttle stallions" jetting off to stand in two hemispheres has begun to influence the breeding markets all over the globe.

In an afternoon session on "Repackaging the Racing Product," Barry Weisbord, President, MediaVista, called for more structure to the sport and the introduction of new forms of wagering designed to attract younger audiences. Hamilton Jordan, representing the National Thoroughbred Association, and former Chief of Staff in

the Carter White House, was asked how his group proposed to help solve racing's problems through repackaging. "I think the Middle East was easier," Jordan joked, but he also insisted that creating a national organization and structure for racing, similar to the other major professional sports, is critical for future success.

The final session on Home Wagering was a disappointment. Technical difficulties in each presentation distracted speakers representing IWN, ODS and YouBet! from what amounted to little more than sales pitches for their respective technologies and approaches to home betting.

The 1996 Symposium on Racing continues through Friday, December 13, at Loews Ventana Canyon Resort in Tucson, Arizona.

DR DEVIOUS LEAVES JAPAN FOR IRELAND In a reversal of the trend which has seen five consecutive Epsom Derby winners sold to Japan, **Dr Devious (Ire)** (Ahoonora {GB}), the 1992 Epsom hero, is returning to his native Ireland from Japan to stand the 1997 breeding season. The deal, which is subject to the vet and contract, was negotiated by Emmanuel de Seroux's Narvick International agency and the eight-year-old's destination is Coolmore Stud. "He was an exceptional Derby winner who also had the speed to win the Dewhurst as a two-year-old," said Coolmore Manager Christy Grassick. "There are very few stallions possessing the precocity, class and toughness to do this and we are thrilled that he is now available to British, Irish and European breeders." Dr Devious retired to stud in 1993 to Shadai Farm in Japan. A leading first season sire in 1996, he has covered a full book in each of his four seasons at Shadai and in 1996 alone covered a book of 113 mares. His best winners include Fine Dress, Dorotheas and Victory Bank. With the success of Ahoonora and his son Indian Ridge in Europe, the Yoshida family, which owns Shadai Farm, believes the horse's future is in Europe. They have retained a significant stake in the horse and the deal allows Shadai to have greater access to all the Coolmore stallions.

AMERICAN HORSE COUNCIL SURVEY

RESULTS The United States Horse Industry is a \$25.3 billion industry based on economic activity associated with 6.9 million horses and 7.1 million employees and other participants, according to a much-awaited, comprehensive study of the industry commissioned by the American Horse Council Foundation. Preliminary results of the year-long analysis, conducted by the Barents Group of Washington, D.C., were announced by James Hickey Jr., President of the American University of Arizona Race Track Industry Program's 1996 Symposium on Racing in Tucson, Arizona. "The study validates what we in the horse industry have long known," Hickey said. "The American horse industry is a huge and economically productive business that deserves the attention and appreciation of government, media and the public at large." The study received major funding support from The Jockey Club, the American Quarter Horse Association, the Thoroughbred Owners and Breeders Association, Keeneland Association Inc., Breeders' Cup Limited and the Kentucky Thoroughbred Association.

HARNESS RACING GOES PRIME TIME During a press conference at the University of Arizona Symposium on Racing yesterday in Tucson, Arizona, the American Championship Harness Series announced it will present a schedule of 18 prime-time programs on espn2 next year. The ACHS broadcasts will be a first--a prime-time televised series of races on which fans can wager from home through a link with the Ladbroke phone-wagering system, Call-A-Bet. ACHS programs will be offered on an almost-weekly basis, primarily Friday nights, from May 16 through November 14. All of the 18 shows will offer at least three races from up to three different locations in a one-hour format. All televised races will be live and will be simulcast to operating tracks throughout the country as well as offered through the Ladbroke hub. Customers can open accounts prior to the broadcasts by calling 1-800-LADBROKE. As in its July, 1996 test pilot, the ACHS races will again offer 'odd-even' wagering. Non-televised races will be included in the series as well. The ACHS will encompass 10 or more divisions in an eight-month season, awarding points based on performance in series races, creating standings on a weekly basis and awarding divisional honors at the end of the year.

A # will distinguish first-time stakes-winners, a @ will indicate first-time graded stakes-winners, a + will denote winners who are first-time starters and an (S) will be used for state-bred races.

EPSOM DERBY NOMINATIONS FOR 1998

RELEASED Early nominations for the 1998 Epsom Derby closed one week ago and, after processing all the pedigrees, Epsom announced yesterday that a total of 548 were received. Sheikh Mohammed and Sheikh Hamdan al Maktoum led the way with 45 entries each. Godolphin has broken new ground by entering 37 yearlings for the 1998 running. Racecourse officials have revealed that, for the first time, the Maktoum family's Dubai-based operation has made entries for the Classic in its own name. H H Aga Khan has 39 representatives, while Prince Khalid Abdullah has 20. Also featured on the entry list, which will be published in full January 2, is the yearling colt by Woodman--Danse Royale, who topped this year's Goffs' Orby Sale at \$1,975,995. He is owned by Michael Tabor and has just moved into Henry Cecil's Newmarket stables.
