CHURCHILL DOWNS EXPANDS KENTUCKY DERBY WAGERING FIELD TO 14

For the first time since the implementation of pari-mutuel wagering in 1908, Churchill Downs will increase the number of wagering interests in the Kentucky Derby from 12 to 14. Churchill's infield and paddock tote boards will be modified to display odds for 14 wagering interests. There will still be the possibility of a mutuel field if the Derby draws more than 14 starters. "The expansion of Kentucky Derby wagering interests to 14 is a move that will benefit fans on racing's biggest day," said Dan Parkerson, Churchill Downs senior vice president and general manager. The Derby joins the Belmont S. as two of the three legs of the \$5 million Visa Triple Crown Challenge to offer 14 wagering interests. The Derby has averaged 12.3 entrants in its previous 123 runnings. The 1998 Kentucky Derby will be held Saturday, May 2.

VIRGINIA DERBY TO DEBUT AT COLONIAL DOWNS

Colonial Downs Chairman, President and Chief Executive Officer Jeffrey P. Jacobs announced plans yesterday to inaugurate the first ever "Virginia Derby," a three-year-old, 1 1/4-mile turf race which will be run during the upcoming Aug. 26-Oct. 12 Thoroughbred season at the New Kent, Virginia racetrack. The race will carry a purse of at least \$200,000. "The Virginia Derby will be one of the richest three-year-old turf races in North America and will be the obvious highlight of our seven week Thoroughbred meet," stated Jacobs. "Our intent is to work in conjunction with the Virginia Tourism Corporation to attract a crowd of 20,000 people to Colonial Downs for Derby Day, Virginia style!" The final purse of the event, between \$200,000 and \$500,000, will be determined by the amount of sponsor partnerships obtained as well as final discussions with the Virginia Thoroughbred Association and the Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association. The Virginia Derby will be held the weekend of Oct. 3-4, with the exact date to be determined subject to conclusion of negotiations with television networks. "A main consideration in hosting a race of this caliber is to gain valuable television coverage for Colonial Downs and the state of Virginia," Jacobs added.

SMITH OUT THREE TO SIX MONTHS

Two-time Eclipse Award-winning jockey Mike Smith will be out of action from three to six months as a result of a spill at Gulfstream this past Saturday, Florida Derby day. Smith, who originally expected to miss six weeks with what he thought was just a broken collarbone, learned Tuesday that he had suffered more extensive injuries as well. "It turns out I broke my shoulder in three places," said Smith. "I went to a specialist down (in Florida) and I have another visit this afternoon. Plus, I will probably go see another specialist in New York next week." Smith said the most optimistic projections would see him back in the saddle in June. "Hopefully, this will be the three months instead of the six," said Smith. "They can't put a cast on it. I've just got to stay still."

FASIG-TIPTON TEXAS NUMBERS UP

At Tuesday's final session of the Fasig-Tipton Texas Two-Year-Olds in Training Sale at Lone Star Park, top price was paid for hip number 379, a colt by Caller I.D.--Well Aloft (Well Decorated). Consigned by Bethe Deal, L. Gene Reed, agent, the dark bay two-year-old brought a final bid of \$62,000 from Jack Garey. During Tuesday's session, 136 horses sold for a total of \$1,762,600 and an average of \$12,960. Overall at the two-day sale, 248 horses sold for an aggregate of \$3,286,400. At last year's sale, 152 horses sold for \$2,347,300. The 1998 average of \$13,252 decreased 14.2 percent from last year's figure of \$15,443.

DRIVE-THROUGH WAGERING AT KEENELAND

A new drive-through wagering system will be in place at Keeneland beginning opening day of the spring meet, April 3, and will be available each day of the upcoming spring Keeneland meeting. Four booths located inside the traditional Keeneland entrance on Versailles Road will house tellers available to take bets from patrons from 8 a.m. to 11 a.m. Drive-through betting will be expanded this year due to the overwhelming response to a test conducted during last year's Kentucky Derby simulcast. "We offered drive-through service for the first time on Kentucky Derby Day last spring and it was a tremendous success," said Keeneland's project manager John Howard. "It was so successful that we really weren't prepared for the turnout. Due to that, we have developed an entirely new system that we feel will be convenient and timely for customers. It will be easy to access and easy to get back on the major roads."



◆ FOREIGN ◆

Local News, Dubai:

Silver Charm (Silver Buck), who arrived in Dubai Sunday, cantered 12 furlongs Tuesday in preparation for the \$4 million Dubai World Cup March 28, according to the *Associated Press*. "He went a good canter, a mile and a half, and he was on the bridle the whole way," assistant trainer Eoin Harty told *AP*. "He came back from the track bouncing." Hall of Fame jockey Gary Stevens is expected to ride Silver Charm in the World Cup.

Santa Anita H. hero **Malek (Chi)** (Mocito Guapo) trotted with a pony before getting a steady canter around the Nad Al Sheba dirt track. **Behrens** (Pleasant Colony), who completes the American trio for the race, also familiarized himself with the course.

Dance Design (Ire) (Sadler's Wells) will be forced to miss the World Cup after suffering an injury to her right front fetlock joint. The filly will be sent to America to recuperate and to be readied for a fall campaign.

Local News, Australia:

Prize money for two of Australia's great races, the G1 Foster's Melbourne Cup and the G1 Foster's Caulfield Cup, has been increased for 1998. The purse for the two-mile Melbourne Cup, run in November, has been increased (in Australian dollars) by \$300,000 to \$2.5-million (\$1,665,223 U.S.), while the addition of \$500,000 to the Caulfield Cup purse makes it \$1.5-million (\$999,134 U.S.). Both races are sponsored by Carlton and United Breweries. In an effort to attract overseas runners, racing authorities in Victoria have decided that horses placed sixth through 10th in the Caulfield Cup will now receive a starter's rebate of \$40,000 (\$26,644 U.S.), while the starter's rebates for horses filling those places in the Melbourne Cup have been increased to \$60,000 (\$39,965 U.S.).

Local News, Calder:

Calder Race Course will offer free live video on its website at www.calderracecourse.com beginning with the opening of its racing season Saturday, May 23. The RealPlayer 5.0 software needed to view the races is available for free on the Calder website, as are sample videos. Audio available on the site will include changes, race calls and special announcements throughout the day. Video segments will include pre-race analysis from the paddock, horses in the paddocks, the post parade, races, replays, current odds and complete final results.

Local News, Ohio:

The city council of Canton, Ohio voted 9 to 3 Monday night to allow Northfield Park to build a \$3.5 million off-track betting facility, the state's first, according to Monday's Harness Tracks of America newsletter. Northfield will next seek the okay of the Ohio Racing Commission, which must also approve the OTB.

Local News, Aqueduct:

Aqueduct will again serve as the national hub for the Big 3-Pick 3--a \$1-minimum wager in which bettors across the country will try to pick the winners of the GII Toyota Blue Grass from Keeneland, Aqueduct's GII Wood Memorial and the GII Arkansas Derby from Oaklawn on Saturday, April 11. ESPN will offer live coverage of the Blue Grass, which will have a 5:13 p.m. post, followed by ABC's coverage of the Wood Memorial at 5:41 p.m. and the Arkansas Derby at 5:49 p.m. Takeout on the wager has been reduced from 25 to 20 percent, the lowest takeout allowed by the New York State Racing and Wagering Board for this type of bet.

Racing was canceled after the third race Wednesday at Sportsman's Park when management of the Illinois track determined inclement weather over the past few days had created unsafe racing conditions. Live racing is expected to return to Sportsman's Friday at 1 p.m.

The total purse distribution for Saturday's 10-race program at Sportsman's will be \$282,000, a record for a non-stake day at a Chicago track.

Local News, Arlington International:

Arlington International will again act as the Western Hemisphere's agent for the Dubai World Cup on March 28. The World Cup and the Duty Free Race will be simulcast to over 700 racetracks and off-track facilities throughout the Americas beginning at 10:45 a.m. EST. Arlington has licensed Turfway Park to handle the national wagering pool and has contracted Canadian, Mexican, Caribbean and South American sites to conduct separate wagering pools in their areas.

Orville N Wilbur's (Out of Place) zipped five furlongs in :59 1/5 Wednesday under Corey Nakatani in preparation for the April 4 GI Santa Anita Derby. "What we tried to do was start him in the middle of the track because we didn't want him to go too fast," said trainer Wally Dollase. "Amy (Dollase) said she timed him in :10 4/5 in the eighth of a mile around the turn and then :11 1/5 the last eighth, which is what we had in mind."

Conectis (Ire) was claimed for \$80,000 in her winning U.S. debut March 5. Well back early, the 7-1 outsider rallied wide into the stretch to overtake pacesetter Loveontheroad nearing the wire. Explaining why he claimed the filly, winning trainer Barry Abrams said, "She ran against decent colts in England and Ireland and she had nice works before her last race. I figure, if you're going to take a shot, take it the first time you see them run. Some people like to see them run once, but usually it's too late the second time." The victory was jockey Jose Valdivia's first in a race at Santa Anita with a purse of \$100,000 or more. "The filly relaxed well today," said the rider. "Basically, I was just a passenger and got lucky that I've gotten to know the filly and learn her antics the last two months."

A # will distinguish first-time stakes-winners, a @ will indicate first-time graded stakes-winners, a + will denote winners who are first-time starters, an (S) will be used for state-bred races, a (C) will be used for maiden-claiming races and an (R) will be used for other restricted races.

Danzig himself has sired five stakes winners out of Alydar mares, including Lure, Strolling Along and Japanese Champion Yamanin Paradise; Danzig Connection two; and Danehill one. We have mentioned before that Danzig may have an affinity for Raise a Native, since he has Crafty Admiral, who carries a double of the Teddy/Commando cross which is also found in Raise a Native's broodmare sire, Case Ace. Alydar brings another Teddy/Commando cross into the equation through his third dam, Real Delight.

WRITERS UP

BACKSTRETCH HEALTH CARE

When Scott Savin took over as president of the Florida Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association, health care for backside workers was one of his major goals. He, his board of directors and executive director Kent Stirling have gotten a little closer to accomplishing that objective with the help of Pastor Tom LaPointe and members of His Place Ministries in Pembroke Pines.

Said Stirling, "The FHBPA wanted a comprehensive health care program for the grooms and hot walkers, and Tom LaPointe had the people who knew how to get it done. The lessons we learned in this situation can probably be applied to other backsides around the country."

Juan Cisternas and his wife Maria helped bring the two groups together. Most mornings, Cisternas exercises horses at Calder for trainer Frank Gomez. When the afternoon rolls around, he's parking cars at Gulfstream. At night he goes home to his wife Maria and their two children.

Cisternas makes a living at the track, not a lot of money, but he and his family got by. That was until last year. Standing in front of Gulfstream's racing office, the 37-year-old Chilean-born Cisternas explained through an interpreter what happened when Maria needed medical attention. His family didn't have the money or a health care program, they were in a country where they didn't speak the language. They knew they couldn't afford to go to a hospital, and they were afraid.

That's where Terry Tarquinio came in. A recovering alcoholic, Tarquinio was volunteering his time to His Place Ministries. Through the church and its pastor, Tarquinio had turned his life around a couple of years earlier. Now he was helping LaPointe run the chaplain's office on Gulfstream's backside, and a drug and alcohol rehab program at Calder. Tarquinio heard about the medical problems the Cisternas family faced. He thought he could help.

"I went through the same kind of problem while I was recovering," said Tarquinio. He, like the Cisternas family, didn't know where to turn. Through a friend at church, Tarquinio learned about a little-known county program that was designed to help people on a limited income.

People living in Florida's Broward County are eligible for a primary health care program, available through Hollywood Memorial Hospital, if they meet certain minimum requirements. When Tarquinio was recovering, he didn't have any trouble meeting the requirements. Even though Juan Cisternas worked two jobs, his family also met the minimum.

Tarquinio said, "The requirements vary from individual to individual. A single person has to make less than \$12,000 a year, and a married person with children, like Juan, has to make less than \$18,000 a year."

Tarquinio learned all about the program and the paper work from Pat Barbour, who works at Hollywood Memorial for the Broward County Primary Medical Care program. "When I needed medical attention, Pat led me through the maze of bureaucracy to the help I needed. After you've been through it once, it's easy, or at least it's not as hard as it looks in the beginning," he explained.

When Tarquinio heard about the Cisternas family, he knew he had found his calling. "I helped Juan with the paper work to get his family enrolled," said Tarquinio, who now works full time running the medical program for the church. "If you don't speak the language, then the whole process is a lot more mysterious. Once we got the family signed up in the program Maria got the surgery she needed. She was in the hospital for a day, then she needed out-patient care, prescriptions filled, an in-house nurse the first couple of days she returned home, and it was all covered under the Primary Health Care program."

When all the bills were tallied up, the costs were between \$2,000-\$3,000. Not a lot when you think about some of the million-dollar purses being offered around the country, but an enormous amount if you're a family of four living on less than \$18,000 a year.

The Florida Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association, along with Calder and Gulfstream, are working with His Place Ministries, providing money and office space for the church to sign up members on the backside. Danna Shaver, a registered nurse from Hollywood Memorial, took an interest in the work Tarquinio started and has enlisted student nurses from the hospital to volunteer time on the backstretch caring for the workers and their families.

As the word spreads about the help the Cisternas family received, the ranks are beginning to swell. In the year since the backside medical program began, over 200 qualified families have been enrolled in the program.
