YORK TO HOST ST LEGER

York will take on the role of substitute again next year after announcing it will stage the 2006 G1 St Leger as fellow Yorkshire track Doncaster undergoes a

£55-million redevelopment. The Ladbrokes-sponsored event will be the highlight of a two-day Festival, which will be shortened from four days for the first time next September. "Our course is run for the good of racing and we're excited to be

staging this showpiece festival," Chief Executive William Derby told *Racing Post*. "We're proud of our role in Yorkshire racing and understand the St Leger is a highlight of the season for fans in the county, so we're delighted the fixture is staying within its boundaries. We're delighted and honored by this decision, which promises another great racing summer for people in York and the surrounding region. There has been a lot of excitement and positive comment in the area since the move became a possibility." York also has announced Ladbrokes as the new sponsor of the G2 Great Voltigeur S., a traditional prep for the St Leger, the world's oldest Classic.

HIGH FLY TO LIVE OAK STUD

G1 Florida Derby winner **High Fly** (Atticus--Verbasle, by Slewpy), bred and raced by Charlotte Weber's Live Oak Stud, will stand at the Ocala, Florida, farm next year.

The three-year-old, who also captured the Aventura S. and GII Fountain of Youth S. at the Gulfstream meet, was sidelined after finishing 10th in both the G1 Kentucky Derby and G1 Preakness. He came back to be

second in the GII Jerome H. in September, but was forced to miss the G1 Breeders' Cup Sprint due to a condylar fracture of the right front fetlock, and was subsequently retired. The chestnut won five of his nine starts, earning \$927,300. His stud fee will be \$5,000.

WRITERS UP

WHAT'S WRONG WITH THE MODERN THOROUGHBRED?

Here's my opinion as to why the modern Thoroughbred is so brittle: they are pampered, soft, their trainers don't run them enough and they give them too much time in between races.

Now that you are done laughing and/or calling me a crazy fool, please be considerate enough to let me set forth my argument. Perhaps it will even make some sense to you.

The brittleness of the modern horse is a problem that is getting worse all the time, and one for which racing seems to have no solutions. It's a reason why so many tracks have so many small fields that are unappetizing to bettors, and a reason why racing is losing its appeal with the general public. The sport has no stars anymore because a true star has to have lasting appeal. That can't be accomplished with a seven or eight-race career that is merely an audition for the breeding industry.

It is widely assumed that horses, especially good horses, can't race more than five or six times a year and routinely need six or seven weeks between races because the breed is so fragile these days it cannot stand anything more punishing. It's why some even believe that the Triple Crown needs to be changed, so that it is not so demanding on a horse. (These people, by the way, are out of their minds, but that's a subject for another day).

The theory dismisses the chance that there is the possibility of a chicken-and-egg scenario here. Which came first: wimpy horses or wimpy horse trainers?

Did horses hold up much better 20, 30, 40 years ago because the breed was, in general, tougher and more durable, or because trainers made them tougher and more durable?

Turn back the clock to the forties and horses were machines. You had horses like Citation, who made 20 starts as a three-year-old. Trainer Ben Jones was apparently so concerned about what was then a four-week layoff between the Preakness and Belmont that he prepped for the Belmont with a win in the Jersey Derby. Then there was 1947 Horse of the Year Armed, who raced 81 times. That's nothing compared to 1949 sprint champion Delegate, who made 134 career starts and was still racing as a 10-year-old. Back then, horses used to routinely accomplish feats unheard of today.

Now, we have horses--Smarty Jones (nine career starts), Ghostzapper (11 career starts) and Afleet Alex (12 career starts) who show signs of brilliance only to burn out. Could that be because not enough was demanded of them? Could that be because every trainer wants to be known for his or her patience?

(In fairness to Afleet Alex, he appeared to be a throwback horse who would have had many good days and races ahead of him before his career was possibly ended by the freakish incident in the Preakness.)

The exact opposite should be true of the modern horse. Today, we have a better understanding of nutrition, improved veterinary care, better methods to deal with injuries and minor infirmities. Horses should be getting sturdier and running more often than ever. It makes absolutely no sense that the breed could have crumbled like it has in such a relatively short period of time.

I don't know the first thing about training, but something tells me that a horse has to be mentally and physically battle tested in order to hold up. It's something we see every year in the Kentucky Derby, where under-prepared colts never get the job done. This requires a high degree of fitness and the type of experience that can only come from racing. That cannot be possible when so little is asked of them on the racetrack, in the morning or in the afternoons. Most top trainers (Bob Baffert being one prime exception) like a training routine that consists of a bunch of slow breezes every nine or 10 days or so. And, no matter who the trainer is, the horses spend 23 hours a day holed up in a little stall, hardly an ideal environment to create a well-honed athlete.

Imagine taking an NFL running back, playing him four games a season with four weeks off between every game. And, instead of the running back working his tail off every day in practice, he spends 60 minutes on the field, jogging for about half that time. There's no way that running back could be fit enough or durable enough to then take the beating he receives in actual games. He'd never last through the season.

Still, conventional wisdom is that horses have to be treated with kid gloves. It's a theory that was propagated by the likes of Neil Drysdale and Bobby Frankel. Now everyone follows the crowd. The best way to win? Don't run. As contradictory as that may sound, that is how it's done these days. That's unfortunate and bad for the game. It may also be counter productive.

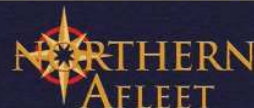

AAEP Recommends Banning Steroids for Sales Horses:

The American Association of Equine Practitioners' Task Force on Medication, chaired by Dr. Larry Bramlage, has issued a report recommending that anabolic steroids, as well as stimulants, muscle relaxants and diuretics, be banned in horses sold at public auction. The report outlines which medications should be allowed at therapeutic levels and which should only be allowed at trace levels, and also calls for sales companies to serve as the "principle enforcers" of the recommendations.
