NY APPROVES \$25 MILLION LOAN TO NYRA

New York State legislatures on Monday approved a \$25-million loan for the New York Racing Association that will ensure racing will continue without interruption for the remainder of the year at NYRA tracks. Officials at NYRA had warned in recent days and weeks that, without a cash infusion from the state, it wouldn't have money to continue operations much after the June 5 GI Belmont S., the centerpiece piece of Belmont's spring/summer meet. NYRA even went as far as sending out 1,400 notices to employees last week, warning of a possible work stoppage or layoffs in the absence of a loan from the state.

Funding for NYRA was ensured after a series of extender loans proposed by Gov. David Paterson were passed Monday afternoon. Those loans are meant to keep the state government--still operating without a 2010 budget--up and running until a budget is passed. NYRA is required to make repayment by the end of March 2011. If it fails to repay the loan, the state will recoup its money from the future VLT operator. A winning bidder for a VLT casino at Aqueduct has not yet been selected; the State Lottery Division is supposed to make recommendations on bidders for the long-delayed project by Aug. 3.

NYRA Chairman C. Steven Duncker released a statement yesterday commenting on the loan:

The Board of Directors of the New York Racing Association, Inc. (NYRA), along with its management and dedicated employees, are grateful for the state legislatures' approval last evening of a \$25-million loan which guarantees world-class Thoroughbred racing at Belmont Park, Saratoga Race Course and Aqueduct Racetrack.

We appreciate the dedication and perseverance of Gov. David Paterson, Assembly Speaker Sheldon Silver, Senate Conference Leader John Sampson, Senate Racing Committee Chairman Eric Adams, and Assembly racing and wagering committee Chairman Gary Pretlow, and their respective staff members, which resulted in this legislation.

We also express our profound gratitude to the New York Thoroughbred Horsemen's Association, the New York Thoroughbred Breeders, our horse owners, and all of the community leaders surrounding our respective tracks for their unwavering assistance and support.

We await the State's August recommendation of the firm to develop and operate the Aqueduct VLT facility so that the revenues fundamental to our 2008 Franchise Agreement with the State can commence and NYRA can continue its leadership role in the North American thoroughbred industry.

day morning in advance of a start in the GI Belmont S. June 5. With exercise rider Derrick Smith in the irons, Stately Victor went in fractions of :11.60, :22.80, :34.20 and :46.80 before galloping out six furlongs in 1:14.20. "Time doesn't mean anything to us, it

doesn't mean anything in the race," commented trainer Mike Maker. "He's happy and he did it the way he always works, so we're pleased." Stately Victor will conclude his race preparations Tuesday with a work over the Belmont main track.

RACING Round-Up

O'BRIEN REFLECTS ON WEEKEND RUNNERS

Aidan O'Brien yesterday reflected on the Ballydoyle runners at the weekend, with Sunday's impressive G1 Tattersalls Gold Cup winner **Fame and Glory (GB)** (Montjeu {Ire}) given the option of the G1 Prince of Wales's S. Following the four-year-old's seven-length success, Epsom's G1 Coronation Cup was touted as his most likely target, but Royal Ascot's June 16 contest could be on the agenda now. "Fame and Glory won nicely in the Tattersalls Gold Cup; he will probably go next to either the Coronation Cup at Epsom or the Prince of Wales's S. at Royal Ascot," O'Brien commented. O'Brien also confirmed the G1 St James's Palace S. at Royal Ascot June 15 as the target for the G1 Irish 2000 Guineas fourth and 🏆 **"TDN Rising Star" 🏆 Steinbeck (Ire)** (Footstepsinthesand {GB}). However, in regard to the 10th-placed **Fencing Master (GB)** (Oratorio {Ire}), O'Brien added, "Fencing Master was a little disappointing in the race, we feel that he was not quite right," he said. "We are going to give him a little break and give him some time to come back to himself." Saturday's Listed Marble Hill S. winner **Samuel Morse (Ire)** (Danehill Dancer {Ire}) and third **So Stylish** (Johannesburg) were earmarked for Royal Ascot's G2 Coventry S. and G3 Albany S., while G1 Irish 1000 Guineas fourth and fifth, **Remember When (Ire)** (Danehill Dancer {Ire}) and **Lillie Langtry (Ire)** (Danehill Dancer {Ire}), are likely to be pointed at the June 4 G1 Epsom Oaks and June 18 G1 Coronation S. at Royal Ascot, respectively.

'King' on Target for Royal Ascot...

Kinsale King (Yankee Victor), last seen winning the G1 Dubai Golden Shaheen at Meydan in March, remains on target for a tilt at the June 19 G1 Golden Jubilee S. at Royal Ascot. The five-year-old worked five furlongs at Hollywood Park Monday in 1:00.80. "He worked fantastic, awesome," reported trainer Carl O'Callaghan. The trip to Dubai did not take too much out of the speedy dark bay. "He was a little bit tired when he got back, but nothing worse for the wear. He had three weeks swimming and he was turned out in a big dirt paddock with a pony and he was happy. Now he's back and kicking his heels up." Kinsale King will begin his trek to Ascot next week. "We leave here [California] June 2, go to Todd Pletcher's barn in New York and I stay with him five days," O'Callaghan added. "Then I leave with Todd's horse on June 7. We're excited and we're ready to go."

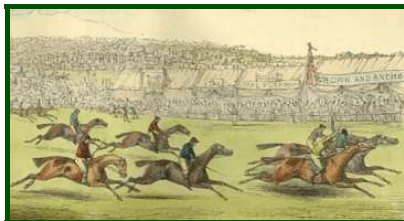

Pletcher's multiple stakes winner **West Ocean** (Elusive Quality) is expected to run in the June 15 G1 King's Stand S. The Golden Jubilee will be Kinsale King's first start on the grass, but the surface change doesn't worry his trainer. "I had a talk with him, told him he was born on it, we had a few Guinnesses about it and he agreed with me," O'Callaghan quipped. "He said, 'Let's get it on.'" Kinsale King has won four straight for O'Callaghan, including the Dec. 6 Gill Vernon O. Underwood S. and Jan. 23 GII Palos Verdes H. He worked three furlongs over the Hollywood turf Apr. 29 in :35.40. "He's worked on the grass and he handled it just fine," the trainer said. "You just hope that it doesn't come up too hard over there. I don't think he'd like a firm, firm turf. He needs it a little bit softer." O'Callaghan does have some last minute shopping to do before his trip. High on the list is the Royal Ascot requisite top hat. "I haven't gotten a top hat yet, but I'm getting suited up," he confirmed, before pondering, "I wonder if I should get a green one? Or should I get a yellow one that says Kinsale King on it?"

CUT IS DERBY-BOUND

★ **"TDN Rising Star"** ★ **Coordinated Cut (Ire)** (Montjeu {Ire}) is being aimed at the June 5 G1 Epsom Derby, trainer Michael Bell announced yesterday. Third in the G2 Dante S. at York May 13, Lawrie Inman's color-bearer will go to Epsom on Thursday for a sighter ahead of the blue riband. "I think I may have left him a bit short of work before the Dante, as he blew very hard after the race for slightly longer than normal--a good 15-20 minutes," Bell said. "We made the decision to make it a test of stamina and take it up early in the straight at York, and that could have backfired, as I think he was a little bit lost in the last furlong, having been out in front. Ridden slightly differently at Epsom, and with a keener edge fitness-wise, hopefully, we can eke out a bit of improvement. We are taking him there on Thursday to have a look at the track and give him a feel of the surroundings. He's a good-mover who is very well-balanced, so I can't see him having a problem with Epsom's undulations."

Peslier on the Pimpernel...

Olivier Peslier has been called up for the ride on **Elusive Pimpernel** (Elusive Quality) in the G1 Prix du Jockey-Club (French Derby) at Chantilly June 6. Partnered by regular jockey Eddie Ahern when fifth in Newmarket's G1 2000 Guineas May 1, Windflower Overseas Holdings's homebred is due for a change of rider, according to trainer John Dunlop. "Olivier has ridden winners for me in England and France, and has a great deal of experience of Chantilly," Dunlop told the *Daily Mail*. "I think the step up [in trip] is definitely what Elusive Pimpernel wants."

"A couple of his gallop-outs before this were stronger than that, but we wanted to reel him in before the turn. I thought it all went very, very well." Weights for the Met are due today and the race will be drawn Friday. In other works, Gili Westchester S. hero **Le Grand Cru** (Dynaformer) went seven furlongs in 1:28.65. In South Florida, **You and I Forever** (A.P. Indy) went an easy half-mile in :51 at Calder.

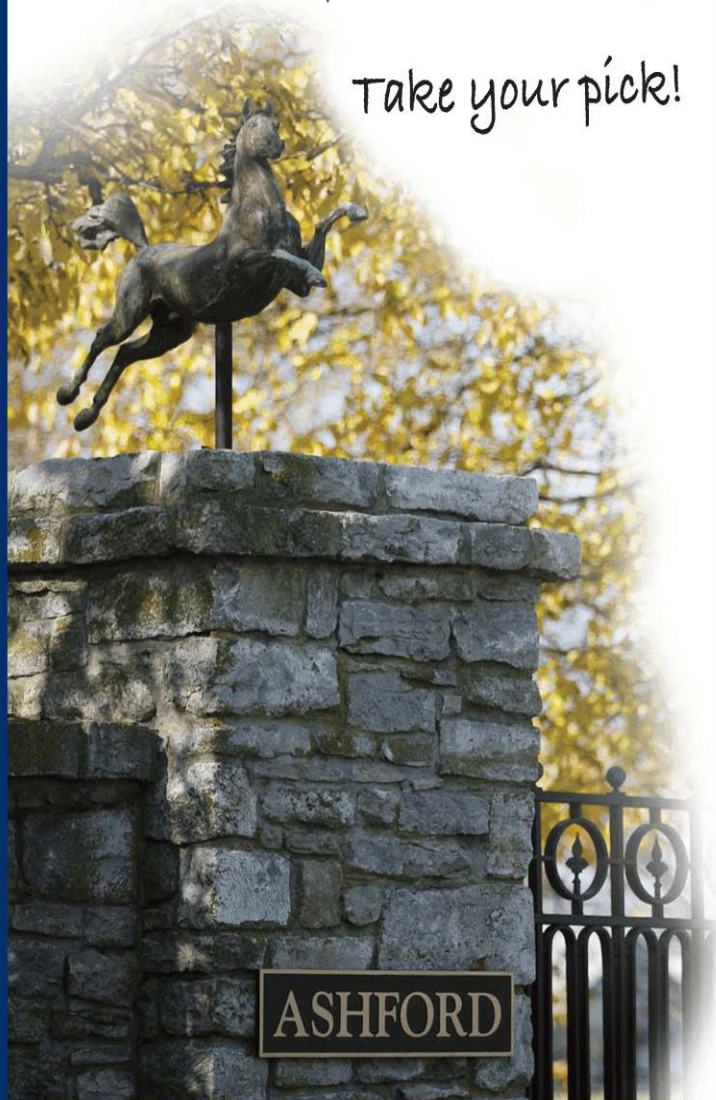

PRINCESS HAYA TACKLES TOUGH GAMELY

Princess Haya (Street Cry {Ire}), who was transferred to the west coast in April, will make her second start for trainer Carl O'Callaghan in Saturday's GI Gamely S. at Hollywood Park. The five-year-old mare captured last year's GII Canadian S. (video) and was third in the Oct. 17 GI E.P. Taylor S. for trainer Michael Matz, but the uncertain weather led the Eileen Hartis homebred to California. "They were getting frustrated with the weather on the east coast," O'Callaghan said of the switch. "Everytime she would get in, it would rain. They would take it off the grass and she didn't like the dirt. So they just wanted to try something different and they sent her to me."

In her first start for O'Callaghan, Princess Haya ran a respectable fifth in the May 1 GIII Wilshire H. "I knew she would need a race because it was her first race since October," the Irishman said of that effort. "I thought she ran a bang-up race. She got in a little bit of traffic trouble, but getting beat a length in that type of race is pretty good." Since the Wilshire, Princess Haya has turned in a pair of five-furlong drills over Hollywood's Cushion Track; going the distance May 11 in 1:02.1 and in 1:02 May 18. Princess Haya adds blinkers for the Gamely. "I'm going to add blinkers this time and see if my filly can lay a little bit closer than usual because she tends to drop right out of it," the trainer explained. The Gamely has attracted some top performers, including 2008 champion turf mare **Forever Together** (Belong to Me) and multiple graded stakes winner **Tuscan Evening (Ire)** (Oasis Dream {GB}). O'Callaghan acknowledged his mare has a tough assignment Saturday. "I didn't expect Forever Together to show up, but these type of races always attract good horses," he said. "And we have to run against Tuscan Evening, who is running on her home court--she's going to be tough. These Grade 1s are never easy." But he remains confident. "She's a very nice filly to be around. She's very calm, very intelligent and I expect her to run pretty good here."

FIRST STAGE OF THE LONG RIDE FOR THEIR LIVES

First Stage Trip Notes: Saint-Cloud
by Mark Cramer

(Editor's note: American ex-patriates Alan Kennedy and Mark Cramer are traveling by bicycle across France this summer during the 'real' Tour de France, visiting race-tracks along the way in order to raise awareness and money for Thoroughbred retirement. The TDN is following their journey and checking in on their blog entries from time to time. Their most recent, detailing their first prep race for the trip, appears below. The Saint-Cloud race course is on a green suburban plateau overlooking Paris from the west side. The triangular track of about a mile and a half circumference is considered flat by French standards, but you can observe the undulations when you cycle by the backstretch. **Cont. p6**

There's a 9-hole golf course in the infield. Railbirds will enjoy a grassy apron, and when the horses leave the walking ring, they gallop on a dirt corridor right in front of the rail, which leads them to a chute on the track with large shade trees. You can hear them panting, and the one or two who gallop silently might be the winning quinella.

Each race finishes off under these magnificent trees.

So Saint-Cloud is a green experience, with a view of the Eiffel Tower from higher parts of the modest grandstand, and another view of Mt. Valerien, a foresty hill where French resistance fighters found a safe haven during the occupation.

Mt. Valerien is also home to the American Military Cemetery, land granted by France to the U.S. Embassy. From a park across the road from the cemetery you have a magnificent view of much of the city of Paris, including Montmartre.

The American Cemetery and then Saint-Cloud race course were our targets for the day. If we were to make it to the races, we planned to do at least one mini-interview on race horse retirement.

We faced only two obstacles. First the weather, whose high temperature would top 85 degrees Fahrenheit, 15 degrees above normal for the season. (It's only a two day heat spell, timed ominously to make our cycling more challenging. If your region is suffering from a cool spell, send for Alan and me to bicycle and the hot weather will follow us.)

The second challenge was the hill of death, from river town of Suresnes to Mont Valerien.

We left early enough to beat the worst of the heat and had the sun mainly at our backs. The daunting hill turned out to be off limits, because Rue Cluseret was a one-way in the wrong direction. In fact, this was good news because we rode up a boulevard that reduced the incline by rising lateral to the hill, and the climb lasted about seven furlongs.

This took us to the track, but we doubled back, now on the plateau, reaching the American Military Cemetery: impeccable white crosses in neat v-shaped rows, including stars of David here and there. The white crosses lead up a hill to a memorial monument. Originally for World War I soldiers who died in or near Paris, it also has a section for unknown soldiers from World War II. (We'll dedicate today's article to Ella Dalton, Florence Beatrice Graham and Alice Hagadorn, three American nurses who died within days of each other in 1919.)

After paying our tributes, we cycled back to Saint-Cloud, where we met up with a visiting American, Jerry Patch, formerly artistic director of the Old Globe in San Diego and now director of artistic development at the Manhattan Theatre Club in New York.

Jerry was on a racetrack visiting binge, and Saint-Cloud was his fourth track on consecutive days. A former tournament tennis player, Jerry also planned to attend the French Open for an afternoon.

We asked Jerry what he envisioned as a solution that would allow former race horses to have the retirement they deserve.

"It's like your parents. You gotta take care of them," he said.

He suggested that portions of admissions, purses or the handle could solve the problem. But until this happens industry-wide, Thoroughbred retirement will continue to depend on our generosity as individual lovers of racing. **Cont. p7**

THE MULTI

The MULTI is like a superfecta box or a 4-horse quinella. In large fields of between 14 and 20 horses, you have to pick the top four, in any order. I concentrate on the Multi and rarely play other races unless I am sure that I've made a great handicapping discovery. I only need to win one of every 10 to make a profit. So my afternoon would rest on the eighth-race Multi. The public was pretty smart this afternoon, and Alan was not able to bet on two horses he liked because the odds were so low. In the long run, it is good to pass races where there is no measurable edge, but today, both of Alan's horses actually won.

The Multi costs 3 Euros and you can buy fractions of a combination by getting 5-, 6-, or 7-horse tickets instead of playing it straight with only 4 horses.

The race covered a mile and 9/16. Several of my horses were racing forwardly on a day that favored early pace. Eventually I saw four of my horses cross the finish line among the five or six top finishers. When the photo was deciphered, I had the winner, number 3, at 9.4-1, the second horse, number 7, at 8.5-1, the third horse, number 5 at 17-1. Fourth place was close, between my number 6 at 16-1 and the 15-horse at 20-1.

The 15-horse flashed in fourth and my combination had finished 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 5th among 17 horses. (No "woulda-coulda-shoulda" here; the 15-horse had an 0-for-68 trainer and I never would have used that one in my combination.) The elusive Multi that was so near and yet so far, paid off at 892-1. Alan and I will be trying to hit some of these Multis on our trip so that we can give a portion to the Thoroughbred Retirement Foundation.

Between cycling up long hills in the sun and winning a Multi, we have our work cut out for us.

The ride home was mainly downhill or flat. The total kilometers for the day, including some laps around the track and the visit to the cemetery was 36, equal to 22 1/2 miles. That's not a lot of miles but please don't blame us for living so close to Saint-Cloud. Those of you who are donating according to the number of miles should give us an extra point or two for the seven-furlong uphill climb under the midday sun.

Please remember that we are doing shorter preliminary stages to get a head start on Lance Armstrong, and introduce you to other racecourses that are closed during our long-hard trip, which coincides with the Tour de France, beginning on July 3 and ending July 25. op/ed feedback

I read Rob Whiteley's [Op-Ed piece](#) in the May 5 edition of *TDN* with great interest. He certainly gathered all the information, ideas and suggestions from the past, along with many of his own, and wrapped them up with a neat little bow. And he's right on the money. Except in one major area.

Rob states, "Motivating a critical mass of our decision makers to place the welfare of the industry above their own personal needs for power and control is very difficult. If they do nothing but preserve their own 'territory,' they will be just fine at the end of the day, even as the scope and vitality of racing diminishes and many of us disappear. Individuals with position and privilege who command most of the alphabet organizations will still have their primary wealth and their box seats on the finish line of any remaining tracks . . ."

Rob goes on to propose a National Racing Consortium composed of 21 members, with one representative from every key industry faction, and seven at-large members chosen for their acumen, industry knowledge, commitment to the welfare of the industry as a whole, and their willingness to speak up with an open mind and a cooperative spirit. And there's the problem. Rob wants to hand the reins over to the same people who have allowed the sport to deteriorate to the level it has.

He proposes to have:

- (1) One member from the Horseplayers Assoc. of North America. This group should have five spots.
- (2) One member from either the Thoroughbred Horsemen's Group (THG) or Thoroughbred Owners and Breeders (TOBA). THG, an organization that has been in operation for five minutes, has no reason to be represented. TOBA should have five spots.
- (3) A member each from Churchill, Keeneland, Magna and NYRA. No way. First of all, Magna is now being run by Magna International, an auto parts company that has proven it has little or no expertise in the area of horse racing. After Oak Tree, whose racing dates will they try to take over next? And why shouldn't every race track in North America have representation in this group?
- (4) Racing commissions or state oversight agencies from California, Florida, Kentucky and New York. Why is he leaving out New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Delaware, Louisiana and Illinois, to name just a few? From a personal point of view, the Division of Pari-Mutuel Wagering in Florida has been battling with the state's agencies, owners, breeders and trainers for decades. Why would Floridians want this organization speaking for them?

(5) One member each from the American Horse Council, NTRA, Breeders' Cup and The Jockey Club. First, let's have five from each. Second, the NTRA appears to be more interested in statistics concerning how many tractors it has sold than in solving the real problems in racing.

(6) One member from the HBPA. Like most of the other groups, this one should also be boosted to five since five heads are better than one.

Finally, Rob's at-large group of seven shouldn't be identified by a panel from *The Blood-Horse*, *DRF*, *Paulick Report*, *TDN* and *Thoroughbred Times*, they should be taken from those publications. And not just seven. How about 30 media members such as Andy Beyer, Steven Crist, Bill Christine, Bill Finley, Ray Paulick, Ray Kerrison, John Pricci, John Peisen, Paul Moran, Billy Reed, Mary Jean Wall, Nick Kling, Jennie Rees, Jay Hovdey, Steve Davidowitz, Mark Simon, Eric Mitchell, Evan Hammonds, Randy Moss, Gary West, Stacy Bearnse, Jay Privman, Barry Weisbord, Jay Siegel, Ed Fontaine, Dick Jerardi, Dave Joseph, Tom Law and many others. I promise you this group will be able to supply more pertinent information than many of the groups in the first six categories.

Of course, the main problem with Rob's plan is that there's nobody to take the bull by the horns and act on it. Most will say what a good idea it is, and that's as far as it will go. Because in thoroughbred racing, we have myriad followers, and not one effective leader.

WALDROP: NTRA MAKING EARLY PROGRESS TOWARDS BALANCED BUDGET

Officials at the National Thoroughbred Racing Association have released their 2009 Annual Report, and the organization's President and Chief Executive Officer Alex M. Waldrop says the NTRA has "accelerated its efforts to operate on a balanced budget," and expects that goal to be achieved in 2010, a year earlier than established by the NTRA's finance committee in 2007, when membership dues were reduced by 50 percent. Though total operating revenues of \$9.18 million were down 45.2 percent from the \$16.75 million in 2008, total expenditures decreased by 47.5 percent, suggesting a balanced budget is attainable sooner than later. Revenues from television broadcasts took the biggest hit, decreasing to just over \$200,000 from \$3.6 million the previous year. Membership dues were also off by just over 18 percent. With total operating expenses in 2009 of \$12.5 million, operating revenues were \$3.3 million under expenses. The corresponding figure from 2008 was nearly \$7.1 million under revenues. The NTRA's Safety and Integrity Alliance began accrediting tracks in 2009, and generated expenses of over a half-million dollars while accounting for no revenue. A total of \$638,376 was spent on the SIA in 2009, but it was responsible for \$328,200 in revenue. To access the 2009 annual report, click [here](#).

"I'd like to get him two turns, so we can head to Saratoga with some experience at it," trainer Jimmy Jerkens told *Daily Racing Form*. A debut winner over the Aqueduct inner track last December, the Gainesway colorbearer was second and fifth in a pair of Gulfstream Park allowance contests over the winter. His 7 3/4-length victory Saturday earned him a 107 Beyer Speed Figure. "I'd have been disappointed if he didn't run something like that," Jerkens continued. "Once he broke with the field, I thought something disastrous would have to happen for him not to win." RISING STAR REDUX

Not one but two runners earned **"TDN Rising Star"** status Sunday at Belmont Park after posting impressive maiden victories. In the day's second race, the three-year-old filly **Flawless** (Mr. Greeley--Oyster

Baby, by Wild Again), a Peter Blum homebred, aired by 13 1/4 lengths in her unveiling going seven furlongs ([video](#)). The final time of the race, 1:23 3/5, wasn't particularly fast, but she earned a solid 89 Beyer (93 BRIS), and there were several other factors that

made the effort noteworthy. Not the least of which is that the filly hails from a Bill Mott barn not known for getting them cranked at first asking.

Heading into Sunday, Mott was hitting at a tepid seven percent with debut runners (from 319 starters). Mott was even quoted after the race saying the filly was "only half ready" for the start. Flawless was no secret at the windows, either, going postward the crowd's even-money pick under Kent Desormeaux, who had his mount geared down in the final stages.

"Any time a horse wins as easily as she won, you can't say you expected it," Blum said yesterday. "But I thought she was a nice filly coming in and would run okay. She ran as well as I've ever seen a horse run for me. Now, I've been in this long enough to take it one race at a time."

Flawless hails from a family that has been good to Blum. The Atlanta-based businessman owns Dixie Holiday (Dixieland Band), a half-sister to Flawless's unraced dam Oyster Baby. Dixie Holiday is the dam of Holiday Runner, a graded winner on the track and herself dam of MGISW Seventh Street (Street Cry {Ire}) and GSP Reynaldotothewizard (Speightstown).

Earlier this year, Blum sold a homebred Smart Strike son of Dixie Holiday at the OBS March Sale to Donato Lanni for \$400,000 ([click to read OBS story](#)). The two-year-old is currently in training in Southern California with Bob Baffert; he registered a second four-furlong drill yesterday at Santa Anita, going the distance in :48 flat (5/48).

It was Blum's familiarity with the family that led him to Flawless's dam. He noticed the unraced Oyster Baby in the 2007 Keeneland January catalogue, carrying her first foal--Flawless.

"She was in the sale, and I asked Gerry Dilger at Dromoland Farm to have a look at her for me," said Blum, who purchased the mare for \$160,000. "He called me back, and he liked her a lot. He'll usually look at a few for me and like one or two, but he liked her a lot. She was a beautiful mare."

Cats get cats, and Flawless developed into a fine sales prospect in the estimation of the Dromoland Farm crew. Entered as a yearling at the 2008 Keeneland September Sale, she was ultimately bought back for \$285,000.

"As a commercial breeder, I take nearly all my horses to Keeneland or Fasig-Tipton, and the objective is to get them sold," explained Blum. "In this filly's case, I remember quite well that Gerry and his farm manager, Bridie Harrison, thought she was a really, really good filly. The name Flawless was not by accident. I mean, it was a combination that she was so nice, and the dam was Oyster Baby, and I was making a pearl reference. Anyway, we usually put modest reserves on the horses, and at that time, the market was stronger. Gerry told me what he valued the filly at, and the reserve was 50 percent of what he valued her at. He was almost certain she would sell. When she didn't, he was very, very happy that I wound up with her."

Blum added, "The only other horse I can remember they liked quite as much at the yearling phase as this one was an Unbridled's Song filly last year named Timeless." **Cont. p3**



More to the Story cont.

Like Flawless, Timeless was a Keeneland September buyback; Blum took her home after bidding stalled at \$385,000. The two-year-old is currently with Mott up at Saratoga after receiving her early lessons with Randy Bradshaw at Adena Springs in Florida.

There is a sad part to Flawless's story, however. Oyster Baby was euthanized last year, shortly after foaling a Corinthian filly.

"Not long before she foaled, she appeared to be sick, or appeared to have suffered a structural injury," explained Blum. "We thought there was a possibility she had a fractured pelvis. We treated her for quite some time at Dromoland, and she never got better. We took the foal off of her when the foal was born, and we went to great measures and brought in several specialists. She appeared to be doing much better for a while, but then took a turn for the worse and we sent her to Hagyard, where she was put in a sling because she was having trouble getting up. There were moments when we thought we were going to save her, but it just wasn't meant to be. Once she started to show that is was too much for her to bear, we put her down. After, we did a post-mortem exam. She didn't have a fractured pelvis--she had a walled-off abscess.

"It's sad when you lose any horse, but when you lose a mare that produced an exceptional first foal like this, it's a real letdown," Blum added.

Not surprisingly, Blum has fielded several offers from buyers inquiring about Flawless.

"But she's not for sale," he said. "I'm just not interested in selling."

He said all future races would be decided on by Mott.

"I wouldn't begin to suggest where she ought to run," said Blum. "If she's good enough, she'll prove it in time. The main thing is that she came back well."

In other Blum homebred news, the four-year-old filly Platinum (Mineshaft) returns Friday after a lengthy absence. Like Flawless, she broke her maiden impressively at Belmont as a three-year-old. She then went on to add a Saratoga allowance and an overnight stakes at the Spa in late August.

"She hasn't raced since then," said Blum. "She had some issues where she needed some time off, but hopefully she'll be able to come back to where she was."

Platinum was trained by Jimmy Jerkens last year, but has since been transferred to Mott.

The Safety Dance...

Sunday's other ☆ **"TDN Rising Star"** ☆ from Belmont was the three-year-old colt **Safety Check** (Empire Maker--Safely Kept, by Horatius), another homebred, this one for Rich Santulli. The 2-1 second choice off a third at Philly Park May 8, Safety Check led every step in a seven-furlong maiden and came home an easy seven-length winner ([video](#)). He completed the distance in 1:22 4/5 and earned a 97 Beyer (97 BRIS).

Safety Check was produced by the brilliant sprint champion Safely Kept, who was campaigned in partnership by Santulli's Jayeff B Stable. Safely Kept won the GI Breeders' Cup Sprint in 1990 ([video](#)). Safety Check is her ninth foal. Alan Goldberg, who conditioned Safely Kept, has trained several of her offspring, including one of her two black-type winners, the stakes winner and graded-stakes-placed Contrast (Unbridled).

"He's kind of like that filly," Goldberg said of Safety Check. "She was by Unbridled, he's by Empire Maker [by Unbridled], so it's that same cross. I hope he'll want to go a little farther. Looking at him, he strikes you that he wants to go farther, but with the pedigree behind him, he might not. She was a big, long-striding thing, too, but she was a sprinter."

Safely Kept's other black-type winner is takes winner and graded-stakes-placed Peace Chant (War Chant).

Goldberg said he would talk to jockey Ramon Dominguez, aboard Sunday, in the next few days before deciding on a spot for the colt.

"I'll see if he thinks the horse wants to go a little farther," said Goldberg.

Goldberg originally had Safety Check in his barn last summer and had the colt working up to four furlongs in the mornings, but decided to pull the plug on a juvenile campaign to let the bay mature. By the time Safety Check was ready for the afternoon, Goldberg was confident he had a solid runner on his hands.

"I was somewhat surprised he got beat in his first start, because he had shown he could run," Goldberg admitted. "But he broke a little funny and was down on the fence, and Philly Park is not a very good place to be down on the rail--it's deep. So I was hoping for a big effort [Sunday]."

Safely Kept, who boards at Lyn Burleson's Burleson Farm in Kentucky, didn't have foals in 2008 or 2009, but on May 17, produced a full-sister to Safety Check. The 24-year-old Safely Kept will now be retired from breeding, but could well be in the news again on Friday. That's when the vote for the National Museum of Racing's Hall of Fame Class of 2010 is announced. Safely Kept was one of six finalists in the Contemporary Horse category.

BILL WATERHOUSE RETIRES Veteran bookmaker Bill Waterhouse, 88, will retire this Saturday, taking his stand for the last time at Randwick's 150th anniversary meeting. Waterhouse's son Robbie--husband of leading trainer Gai Waterhouse--and his grandson Tom will carry on the family bookmaking tradition. Waterhouse was regarded as Australia's biggest bookmaker during his halcyon days in the 1960s and 1970s.

"I don't really want to retire, I feel like I could go on, but I am 88," Waterhouse told *The Daily Telegraph*. "I've been working as a bookmaker since I was 18, so it has been my life. I still enjoy going to the races, but everything comes to an end one day."

Waterhouse, who first worked as a barrister before becoming a full-time bookmaker in 1954, worked his way to the rails and rose to become the world's biggest bookie.

"I am particularly proud that I've 'led the ring' for many decades," Waterhouse said. "Most big bookies don't last long at all. My grandson Tom and I were the top holders in Sydney the previous season. That is a good note to retire on."

Fifth-generation bookmaker Tom Waterhouse said, "The most important thing I have taken from him was he taught me how to gamble. He gave me the confidence to bet big. I've had the privilege to learn from my grandfather and father. They are both very successful, winning bookmakers, but have very different styles. My grandfather is a gambler and plays the man, so to speak. My father is a form genius and analyses the races so carefully."
