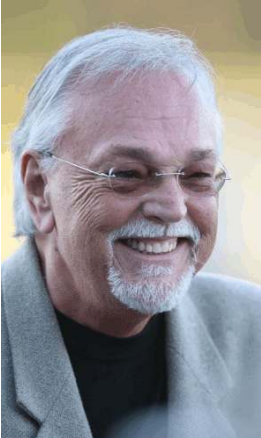

'MO IS BETTER IN SAN GABRIEL

B.J. Wright's **Jeranimo** (Congaree), upset winner of the GII Strub S. on the main track earlier in the year, was the beneficiary of a savvy Rafael Bejarano ride and skimmed the rail to victory in Monday's GII San Gabriel S. at Santa Anita. The four-year-old colt defeated the old warrior **Proudinsky (Ger)** (Silvano {Ger}), with heavily favored **The Usual Q.T.** (Unusual Heat), making his first start since finishing third to Goldikova (Ire) (Anabaa) in the GI Breeders' Cup Mile, coming home a flat third. "When I saw the number one [Proudinsky] getting [out], I just stayed on the rail because I knew he was going to have a lot of horse at the end, too," said Bejarano. "I got the opportunity and my horse came running." **Cont. 2**

WAR PASS DEAD AT FIVE

Champion and multiple Grade I winner **War Pass** (Cherokee Run--Vue, by Mr. Prospector) died Dec. 24 at William S. Farish's Lane's End Farm near Versailles, Kentucky. Preliminary necropsy results are inconclusive.

The five-year-old stallion arrived in the U.S. just the evening before in good order after standing his second Southern Hemisphere season at Widden Stud in Australia. According to a press release, on the morning of his death, War Pass showed no signs

of illness or injury. He was turned out in his paddock and died several hours later. "We are very saddened to lose such a promising stallion," said Farish. "His first foals arrived this year and were extremely well received. He will be buried in the Lane's End cemetery." Bred in Kentucky by Cherry Valley Farm, War Pass, a half-brother to Grade I winner Oath, sold for \$180,000 as a Keeneland September yearling. As an undefeated two-year-old of 2007, War Pass beat Pyro (Pulpit) in the GI Champagne S. at Belmont before romping by 4 3/4 lengths over that foe in a sloppy renewal of the GI Bessemer Trust Breeders' Cup Juvenile at Monmouth. He was awarded a 113 Beyer for the win and was later named champion juvenile male. War Pass improved to five-for-five with an easy allowance win at Gulfstream in February of 2008 before suffering his first lost in the GIII Tampa Bay Derby. He rebounded with a good runner-up finish to Tale of Ekati (Tale of the Cat) in the GI Wood Memorial S. at Aqueduct before injury prompted his retirement. Raced by Robert V. LaPenta and trained by Nick Zito, War Pass won five of seven lifetime starts and earned \$1,583,400. He stood his first season at Lane's End for a fee of \$30,000. He was slated to stand the 2011 season for \$15,000.

'Mo is Better...

Jeranimo was an 11-1 shot when he upset Misremembered (Candy Ride {Arg}) in the GII Strub S. over Santa Anita's main track last February. He ran fourth to that foe, beaten six lengths, in the GI Santa Anita H. in March, then was given a breather. He returned with a fifth-place try in the six-furlong Oakland S. over Golden Gate's Tapeta surface Oct. 23, an effort that tightened him up for a smart victory in his first try on the grass in a two-turn, stakes-caliber allowance at Hollywood Park Nov. 27. Looking to go two-for-two on the sod, Jeranimo saved ground in fifth as Violin Sacre (Stravinsky) led through sensible fractions. As the challengers fanned out turning for home, Jeranimo and partner Rafael Bejarano dove through an opening on the rail, assumed command and lengthened clear impressively. "My horse rushed a little bit at the break," said Bejarano. "After that, I tried to stay behind and get in the bridle and he started to relax." Bejarano added, "I ran the last time with this horse, too, and he won so easy on the turf that I thought he would run the same race today. This horse is really improving."

Despite having an undefeated Grade II winner on the grass, trainer Michael Pender said he wasn't about to commit his charge to the green stuff for 2011. "We're going to try and look at all the invitations," said Pender. "I would ultimately love to run him here in the Big 'Cap [Mar. 5]. We ran in it last year, and it would be great to go back there and seek a little revenge. If we get some bigger invites from across the pond, we'll certainly look into that as well. No, absolutely not [are we limiting him to grass]. I think this horse can run over anything. That's how good he is." Courier-Journal's Clevenger Wins Photo Eclipse...

Edited press release The National Thoroughbred Racing Association (NTRA), *Daily Racing Form* and the National Turf Writers and Broadcasters announced yesterday that Michael Clevenger of Louisville, Kentucky, has won the 2010 Media Eclipse Award for Photography for his picture of the dramatic finish between **Blame** (Arch) and **Zenyatta** (Street Cry {Ire}) in the GI Breeders' Cup Classic at Churchill Downs Nov. 6. The photo appeared on the front page of the *Louisville Courier-Journal* Nov. 7. This is the second Eclipse Award for Clevenger, 45, a staff photographer for the *Courier-Journal* for the past 12 years. He won his first Eclipse Award in 2002 for a photo of that year's Kentucky Derby finish. "Winning the Eclipse Award is truly exciting and an honor that leaves me speechless, because I am blessed to be recognized for making images of a beautiful sport," said Clevenger. "I know how hard so many photographers work at their craft and dedicate themselves to photographing horse racing. To be up against them is humbling, and it's humbling to being even considered for an Eclipse." Clevenger's ground-level photo captures both Blame and Zenyatta, side by side battling to the wire. "With Zenyatta's tendency to run wide, the challenge was to figure out where she might be at the end" said Clevenger. "I timed the shutter release that she would run in the middle of the picture. It's difficult to know, and the horses don't tell you. It's definitely a gamble, coupled with the fact that you didn't know how dark it was going to be for the race." Honorable mention in the Photography category went to two individuals: Skip Dickstein for his photo of the 2010 Breeders' Cup Classic, which appeared in *The Blood-Horse* Nov. 9; and Barbara Livingston for her photo of Naughty New Yorker breaking from the gate between two horses at Saratoga, which ran in *Daily Racing Form* Aug. 2.

San Gorgonio Renamed For Frankel...

Santa Anita Park announced it is renaming the GII San Gorgonio H., to be run on New Year's Day, as the Robert J. Frankel Memorial H., in honor of the late Hall of Fame conditioner, who won the San Gorgonio a

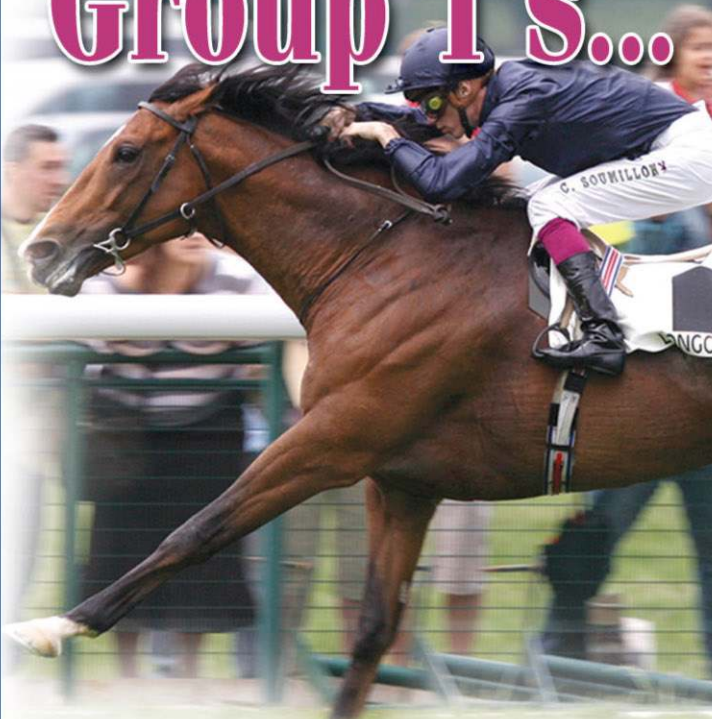
record eight times and who holds Santa Anita's all-time record of 917 wins. The race is held for older fillies and mares going nine furlongs on the turf. Frankel was the leading trainer at Santa Anita on five different occasions; 1974-75, 1976-77, 1978-79, 1980-81 and 1981-82. Frankel, who passed away at the age of 68 on Nov. 16, 2009, after battling lymphoma, ranks second behind the late Charlie Whittingham in Santa Anita stakes races won, with 146. Frankel's first San

Gorgonio victory came with Extra Hand in 1973. Nineteen years later, he scored again with Wandesta. Other top Frankel runners to win the race include Tates Creek ('03), Megahertz (GB) ('04), and Citronnade ('07).

Sadler's Well, Or At Least His Runners Are...

Trainer John Sadler wasn't able to attend Santa Anita's opening day card Sunday. He stayed at home, nursing an injured right knee. The 54-year-old trainer didn't miss much, except for a career day for his barn, one that saw **Switch** (Quiet American) win the GI La Brea S., ☆ **"TDN Rising Star"** ☆ **Twirling Candy** (Candy Ride {Arg}) win the GI Malibu S. and ☆ **"TDN Rising Star"** ☆ **Sidney's Candy** (Candy Ride {Arg}) win the GIII Sir Beaufort S. (which was automatically downgraded from its Grade II status when it was moved to the main track. Sadler was back on Santa Anita's backstretch yesterday, where he made his rounds with the assistance of a golf cart and a walking stick. "All of them came back well," Sadler said of the trio, each of whom was ridden by Joel Rosario. "Twirling Candy will probably go in the GII Strub [Feb. 5]; we haven't picked a race yet for Switch, but she'll probably go in the GII La Canada [Feb. 13] or possibly the GI Santa Monica [Jan. 30]," Sadler said. "Sidney has a lot of ways he can go. He can go in the GII San Fernando [on dirt Jan. 15] or the GI Kilroe Mile [on turf Mar. 5]." Sadler also offered a bulletin on his own status. "I messed up my knee and I'm probably going to need surgery on it," he said. "I'm not sure what it is. I'm going to see the orthopedic guy this afternoon."

STRIVING TO BE BEST

Michael Moreno may not have taken the most conventional route into horse racing, however, he quickly established himself as one of the leaders of the game. A

Cuban native, Moreno moved to the United States at age four and spent the next 10 years in Union City, New Jersey, before moving to Louisiana. An avid sports enthusiast from a very young age, Moreno played college baseball at

the University of Lafayette, and managed to make the most of his educational opportunities by graduating with an M.B.A. Without any prior ties to the oil and gas sector, Moreno launched his first business within that industry while still in school.

"I was in graduate school when I started my company," said Moreno. "I literally started it out of my college apartment."

Moreno steadily developed his interests in infrastructure construction, and oil exploration and production through the '90s with several key purchases, including Dynamic Industries Inc. During his tenure, the Texas and Louisiana-based business expanded into a full-service construction company, supporting over 2,000 employees and executing projects in Nigeria, Angola, Venezuela and Trinidad. In 1998, Moreno purchased Moreno Group LLC, which through the acquisition of several subsidiary companies, has evolved into one of the leading global hook-up and commissioning contractors. And it was through his business dealings that Moreno would encounter his first taste of the racing game.

"I bought a company in 1999, and a few months after the purchase, the seller of that company, asked if he could buy back some of the assets," Moreno recalled. "I accommodated his request and gave him back some of the assets, but I refused to take payment for them. So, a few months later, he came back to me and told me, since I wouldn't take his money, he had gone to a two-year-old in training sale in Ocala, and bought three juveniles for me. He told me who my new trainer was and that I should show up at Evangeline Downs on Saturday morning to go see my horses. *That's* how I got started."

Those juveniles provided limited success in the claiming ranks for Moreno, however, an association forged soon after that introduction to the sport would impact the direction his fledgling operation would take.

"I had a Christmas party at my house, and one of my employees brought Eric [Guillot]," he explained. "For those who know Eric, he really is quite a character. Soon after meeting him, I told a friend of mine, 'He's either completely full of it, or he is just really confident in his ability to train a racehorse. So I decided to give him a shot. I've been with him ever since.'"

In tandem with Guillot, Moreno created Southern Equine Stable LLC in 2000 and the duo teamed up with Brian Cain and invested in a fourth racehorse, Show Me the Stage (Slew the Surgeon). For the partnership, the California-bred sprinter won 14 of 31 career starts, including four graded stakes before retiring with \$679,053 in earnings.

"I got hooked right away, having a classy filly like her," said Moreno.

The first horse in the Southern Equine program to put Moreno on the map on a national level was Salute the Sarge (Forest Wildcat). Owned in partnership with Walmac's Bob Trussell, the \$300,000 Barretts March juvenile purchase won his first three starts in 2007, including the GIII Hollywood Juvenile Championship and GII Best Pal S., and was runner-up in the GI Del Mar Futurity S. and GI Norfolk S. A winner of the San Miguel S. at three, the bay retired to Walmac in Kentucky with four wins and \$346,639 in earnings. Currently, the stallion stands at Red River Farms in Louisiana.

"He was a pretty talented juvenile and I still own an interest in him," said Moreno. "He was our first, significant graded stakes horse."

After that initial taste of graded success, the operation realized its first Grade I stakes victory during the 2009 season with Santa Teresita (Lemon Drop Kid) in the GI Santa Maria H. before adding another at that level in September in the GI Debutante S. with homebred Mi Sueno (Pulpit). The former is in foal to European champion Sea the Stars (Ire), while the latter--who is a daughter of GISW Madcap Escapade (Hennessy)--is expecting a filly by Medaglia d'Oro.

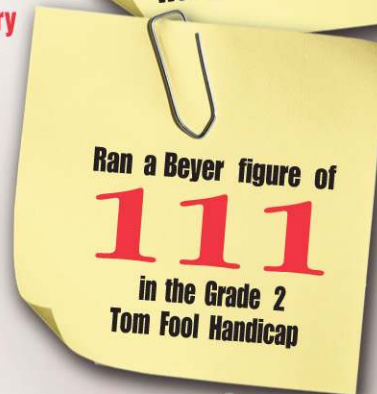
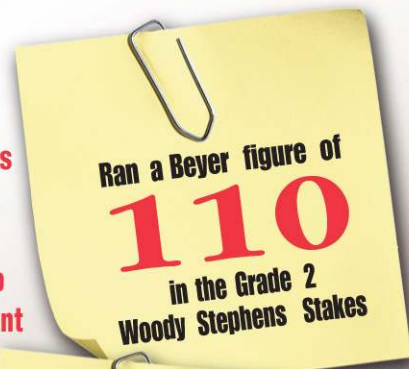

“She would have been the favorite for the Breeders’ Cup [Juvenile Fillies in 2009], but she got hurt right before that, so that was a big disappointment for us,” Moreno said of Mi Sueno. “We thought we had something extremely special in her. It’s unfortunate, because we never got to see her run as a three-year-old, but she



would have made a lot of news had she stayed sound. I get a little emotional when I talk about her, because she just had so much ability. In my opinion, she would have been the best of her class.”

As for the decision to breed her to Darley’s star

stallion, Moreno added, “We thought it was a good fit from a pedigree standpoint, because she’s by Pulpit.”

Moreno is hopeful the resulting foal--which is expected in March--will follow in the footsteps of another daughter by that stallion, Southern Equine’s GI Acorn S. and GI Test S. heroine Champagne d’Oro.

“I’m starting to like [Medaglia d’Oro] a lot,” laughed the 42-year-old. “He’s been good to us. Obviously, he’s one of the better stallions in North

America. He’s a correct, good-looking horse who is throwing a lot of runners and has had a lot of success.”

The \$210,000 KESEP yearling purchase closed out her 2010 campaign with a sixth-place finish in Sunday’s seven-furlong GI La Brea S., however, Moreno expects to try a different path with the daughter of Champagne Glow (Saratoga Six) in 2011.

“We’re looking forward to her four-year-old campaign and we’re going to stretch her out,” he confirmed. “We think she is going to be very good going two turns, so we are very excited about her future.”

Building an Empire...

Coupled with the creation of Southern Equine, Moreno secured his first farm--a 200-acre farm in Sunset, Louisiana--in 2000. The property served as the launching pad for Southern Equine’s expanding operation.

“It’s been proven that, to create sustainability, the breeding end is the way to go,” offered Moreno. “Basi-

cally, we started a Louisiana-based program in 2000 and began breeding and racing our own horses. We did that for several years, and in 2004, I started to try and play at the higher end of the game. I tried to buy some really nice mares and some more expensive yearlings. We have kind of outgrown the Louisiana program over the last five years.”

Looking to take his operation to the next level, Moreno purchased Parrish Hill Farm in 2008, and after plenty of upgrades and renovations, the Kentucky nursery was officially unveiled as the Southern Equine’s flagship breeding operation.

“In my opinion, the best place to play in this business is at the high end,” Moreno explained. “That’s the safest dollar you can spend.”

Following the decision to focus on the highest quality breeding and racing stock, the Midway property became the headquarters for Southern Equine’s glittering collection of Grade I-caliber mares.

“We put quite a lot into it--new barns and fencing,” Moreno said of his newest acquisition. “[While] some mares [are kept] in the Louisiana-bred program, Kentucky is the [primary] base for our broodmare band, weanlings and yearlings.”

And with approximately 20 percent of the operation still dedicated to the Louisiana-bred market, the Sunset-based farm also acts as a breaking and training facility for the entire Southern Equine team of youngsters. Currently, Moreno has 30 mares, with additional yearlings and weanlings. In total, Southern Equine has approximately 120 horses, including horses in training with Guillot.

Ruling the Breeding Game...

Since making the decision to step up the quality of his purchases, Moreno has become well accustomed to playing at the top end of the market with high-profile purchases like 2007 Breeders’ Cup Filly & Mare Sprint heroine Maryfield (Elusive Quality), who was purchased for \$1.25 million at the 2007 Fasig-Tipton November Breeding Stock sale and Irish Cherry (Irish Open), secured by Moreno for \$2.7 million at the 2008 Keeneland January sale. A stakes winner on the track, the latter was already a known commodity by the time she was acquired by Southern Equine, having produced dual Grade I stakes winner Spun Sugar (Awesome Again) and GISW Daaher (Awesome Again). Maryfield is carrying a filly by Medaglia d’Oro and will be bred back to Bernardini, while Irish Cherry is in foal Street Cry (Ire), and will be bred back to Awesome Again. Last month, Southern Equine went to \$1.95 million at Fasig-Tipton for Careless Jewel (Tapit), winner of the GI Alabama S. The four-year-old grey is in foal to Street Cry.

In partnership with Hill 'n' Dale Farms, Southern Equine purchased the bay privately in 2006 before spending a world-record \$14 million at the 2008 Fasig-Tipton November sale to dissolve the partnership. The blue hen mare's first foal, Teeming (Storm

Cat), produced stakes winner Cascading (A.P. Indy), however, she hit legendary proportions as the dam of GI Belmont S. winners Jazil (Seeking the Gold) and Rags to Riches (A. P. Indy), who also earned a three-year-old filly championship in 2007; and GI Peter Pan S. scorer Casino Drive (Mineshaft), runner-up in the G1 February S. in Japan. The 2007 Broodmare of the Year is also responsible for Man of Iron (Giant's Causeway), winner of last year's Breeders' Cup Marathon and highweight three-year-old at 14 furlongs and over in Ireland.

"Better Than Honour was one that I purchased privately before she had all that success with Rags to Riches, Jazil and Casino Drive," he said. "Buying her has certainly given us a fighting chance."

The 14-year-old mare produced a Street Cry (Ire) filly in 2009 and another filly by that sire earlier this season, and is back in foal to the Darley stallion.

"To be honest, if we could choose the sex, I would choose all fillies with these high-end mares, because what we're trying to do is build a broodmare band."

Moreno indicated that his goal is to acquire, or retire from his own racing string, 30 high-end mares over the next three to five years.

"We're about two-thirds of the way there," confirmed Moreno. "Our operation is going to be less about numbers and more about quality. I would like to have around 30 Grade I-winning or producing mares. We have about 20 of them now."

While the primary focus remains on the breeding, purchasing and racing of high-class fillies to stock Southern Equine's burgeoning broodmare band, Moreno didn't rule out the possibility of tackling the stallion game in the future.

"We don't know yet," said Moreno, when asked if the Southern Equine operation might accommodate stallions down the road. "We're hoping we can breed a good one and then we can make that decision. With these kind of mares, we hope we'll be developing stallions here soon."

He added, "The plan could be to stand them ourselves, but more likely, probably just go to one of the bigger breeding operations, like Hill 'n' Dale. I have a good relationship with John Sikura, and if I had a stallion today, I would probably stand him there."

All In the Family...

With offices in Louisiana and Texas, Moreno, who divides his time between both states, admits there have been some challenges in finding time to watch his horses run in person.

"I've been busy these past couple of years," said Moreno, who is CEO of Moreno Group, which executes much of its business in the Gulf of Mexico. "The world has been a crazy place."

According to Moreno, his corporation was actively involved in the clean-up effort to restore the integrity of the Gulf and its coastline.

"We did a lot on behalf of BP to help in the clean-up effort," confirmed Moreno. "I've had over 1000 people working down there since June of this year. We were involved in the clean-up days after it happened--we were there first hand. It's been a very difficult and challenging event for this industry, especially for the people of Louisiana. The spill, coupled with the moratorium that followed, has been a financial burden to the area. Hopefully, we'll be able to put it behind us in 2011 and get back to the exploration of the Gulf of Mexico. There are a lot of people whose jobs depend on this industry. Obviously, we all want to see it come back to what it was before the oil spill."

And while the oil spill in the Gulf has kept Moreno very busy of late, he still tries to make time to attend the races with his wife Tiffany and seven-year-old daughter Gabrielle, especially when his horses are competing in the marquee events.

"[Gabrielle] likes the horses, but she also likes the pageantry, especially, for the big races," explained Moreno. "She likes dressing up, the crowd and being interviewed by TVG. She likes the whole experience, not just the race itself."

It seems very likely that the sportsman has passed along his passion for the game to the next generation. And according to Moreno, it's of little surprise that the horse racing industry has proven so hard to resist for many, once they have been bitten by the bug.

"There are so many aspects to it that I think are unique to this sport," said Moreno. "First, if you have a competitive bone in your body, you will fall in love with this sport, because it is such a challenging endeavor. But most importantly, the horses themselves are just majestic and beautiful animals. They have a tendency to capture your heart and your mind pretty quickly. It's amazing how attached you get to them as athletes. I've been a sports fan my whole life, but to me, this is the best sport in the world."
