Hurtle Myrtle (Aus) (Dane Shadow {Aus}), who registered a career-best in the G1 Myer Classic at Flemington last October, realized a final bid of A\$1 million (*US\$990,000*) to top Tuesday's final select session of the Magic Millions National Broodmare Sale at the Gold Coast complex. An A\$55,000 yearling purchase, Hurtle Myrtle also won the G2 Sapphire S. at Randwick and the G2 Dane Ripper S. at Eagle Farm in 2011. Consigned by Kitchwin Hills, which also offered her as a yearling, the 5-year-old mare was purchased by former top trainer and now leading bloodstock agent Bill Mitchell on behalf of the Maloney Family's Segenhoe Stud. "She's an outstanding-looking mare who has loads of ability and we purchased her as a racing and breeding prospect," Mitchell said. "We'll see what she tells us as to whether she races on. We'd be happy to race her on for another season like we've done with Sister Madly (Aus) [who topped last year's sale at \$1 million]. 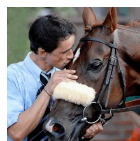

'IMPROVED' TO SHOW AT CHANTILLY

Iraj Parvizi's **Most Improved (Ire)** (Lawman {Fr}) is set to make his seasonal reappearance in Sunday's G1 Prix du Jockey-Club at Chantilly, trainer Brian Meehan announced yesterday. Third in the G1 Dewhurst S. in October, the well-touted colt was forced to miss the 2000 Guineas after being found to be lame on the morning of his scheduled return in the G3 Craven S. at Newmarket in April.

"His preparation for the 2000 Guineas was interrupted so he could not make the Classic, but he is now back in very good form and working well," read a statement on the trainer's website. "The French Derby was always on the agenda as a possible post-Guineas target, and it makes even more sense as he is French-bred and eligible for owners' premiums. He will be ridden by Kieren Fallon." "We started with the Met Mile and worked back to the beginning of the year, and now we'll start with the Breeders' Cup and work

back," said Romans. "There's nothing to say he won't go a mile and an eighth. The [GI] Whitney [H. at Saratoga Aug. 4] is out there. So is the [GI] Woodward [at Saratoga Sept. 1]. There are some interesting things to think about."

The Met Mile was a Breeders' Cup Challenge "Win and You're In" race for the GI BC Dirt Mile, which will be run at Santa Anita Nov. 3. Shackleford was second to Caleb's Posse (Posse) in last year's renewal at Churchill Downs.

"I think [the Met Mile] was one of the most important wins of my career," said Romans. "It's a prestigious race for a stallion, and with his body of work, to put that on his resume puts him over the top. He should make a great stallion. He's so sound, never had any issues. He's got speed and endurance. It's just a tough combination."

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ALL CLASSICS, ALL WEEKENDS

This coming weekend we have a Classic a day for three days: the G1 Epsom Oaks will be run Friday, with Coolmore's G1 English 1000 Guineas third Maybe

(Galileo) slightly favored, at 5-2 on Betfair at this writing, over Lady Lloyd-Webber's The Fugue, by Dansili out of Twyla Tharp, by Sadler's Wells, who is 3-1. The Fugue ran fourth in the 1000 Guineas in only her second career start, then moved up to 10 1/2 furlongs and dominated the G3 Musidora at York. The 11-2 third choice is Highclere's Vow (by Motivator, a grandson of Sadler's Wells by Montjeu), erratic but ultimately

convincing winner of the Listed Lingfield Oaks Trial in only her second start; Maybe, on the

other hand, was 5-for-5 as a 2-year-old, including the G1 Moyglare Stud S., and was Europe's top 2-year-old filly of 2011. Rated around 10-1 shots are Coolmore's apparent second string, Kissed (Galileo), impressive winner of Navan's Listed Salsabil S. on just her second start; and Godolphin's Kailani, by Monsun out of Kazzia, winner of the 2002 G1 English 1000 Guineas and G1 Epsom Oaks. Kailani was an impressive winner of the Listed Pretty Polly S. at Newmarket's Guineas meeting, also on her second start, also on softish ground. Interestingly, when Kazzia won the Oaks in 2002, her immediate victim was Quarter Moon, a 3/4-sister to Coolmore's apparent third string, Betterbetterbetter (Galileo). The only other Oaks contender for this year listed under 20-1 on Betfair is Mr. and Mrs. David Aykroyd's Colima (by Authorized, another grandson of Sadler's Wells by Montjeu), at around 15-1; she was second to Vow at Lingfield in just her second lifetime start. So it's the experienced Maybe, running over further than a mile for the first time, challenged in the betting by five lightly raced fillies with just 11 starts among them.

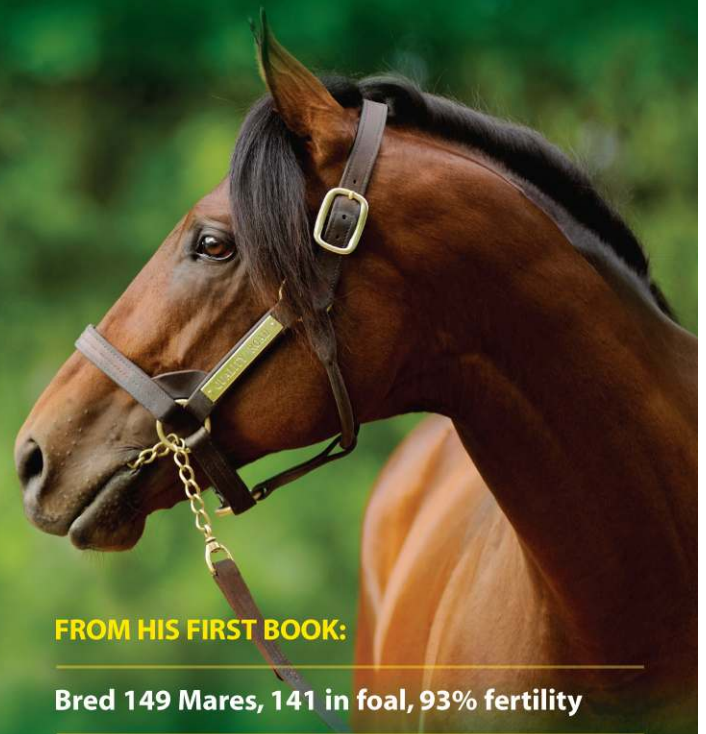
Saturday is the G1 Epsom Derby. Only 12 runners were left in at the "six-day" stage, with five of the 12 trained by Aidan O'Brien.

The red-hot favorite is Coolmore's Camelot, bidding to become Montjeu's fourth G1 Epsom Derby winner (Motivator, Authorized, Pour Moi last year), and unbeaten in his three lifetime starts--a maiden and the G1 Racing Post Trophy last year, and the Classic G1 English 2000 Guineas this term. **Cont. p7**

In a field notably lacking in depth, outside of the Ballydoyle legions, the clear second favorite, at 11-2, is Highclere's G2 Dante winner Bonfire, from the first crop of Monsun's son, Manduro. Third favorite, at around 12-1, is the unbeaten Main Sequence (Aldebaran), trained by David Lanigan for the Niarchos Family and winner of the G3 Lingfield Derby Trial (moved, like the Oaks Trial won by Vow, to the all-weather as the turf was bottomless that day). Also under 20-1, as of Tuesday afternoon, on Betfair, were Coolmore's second- and third-strings (in either order), G3 Sandown Classic Trial winner Imperial Monarch (Galileo; on heavy ground), and G3 Dee S. winner (soft ground) Astrology (Galileo); either of those are eligible to be pacesetters for Camelot; and Thought Worthy, a full-brother to 2007 G1 English St. Leger winner Lucarno (Dynaformer) trained by John Gosden for owner/breeder George Strawbridge. Thought Worthy won the Fairway S. (L) at Newmarket last time out, but the money was coming for him all day Tuesday.

We'll know by Saturday afternoon which was the better form, Camelot's G1 English 2000 Guineas win or Bonfire's win in the G2 Dante, but the form could get another test in Sunday's G1 Prix du Jockey-Club, run since 2005 at the shorter 2100 meters (10 1/2 furlongs) distance. The two favorites (again, at this writing, early in the week) there are likely to be G1 English 2000 second French Fifteen, bidding to be a second Classic winner from Turtle Bowl's first crop (last achieved by Birdstone in 2009), and G2 Dante second Ekkihaam, by the all-conquering 2012 revelation Invincible Spirit.

Last weekend featured a ton of top racing, headlined by the two Irish Guineas races, in which the Danzig sire line accounted for all six placegetters. Coolmore became interested in Oasis Dream a couple of years ago, and it paid off when two colts by him which Coolmore bought ran one-three in Saturday's G1 Irish 2000 Guineas, with last year's G1 National S. winner and G1 Dewhurst S. second, Power, winning over longshots Foxtrot Romeo (Danehill Dancer), owned by trucking boss Andrew Tinkler (that colt ran a screamer to finish second), and Coolmore's other Oasis Dream colt, Reply. Coolmore also ran fourth with Daddy Long Legs (Scat Daddy), recently returned from his flop on the dirt in the G1 Kentucky Derby. In the fillies' edition, the G1 Irish 1000 Guineas on Sunday, 12-1 longshot Samitar (Rock of Gibraltar) gave popular English handler Mick Channon his first Classic winner, with two more longshots, Ballydoyle's Ishvana (Holy Roman Emperor) second, and Betty Moran's Princess Sinead, trained by Jessie Harrington and from the first crop by Danehill Dancer's son, Jeremy, third. Homecoming Queen (also by Holy Roman Emperor), winner of England's 1000 Guineas, finished fourth.

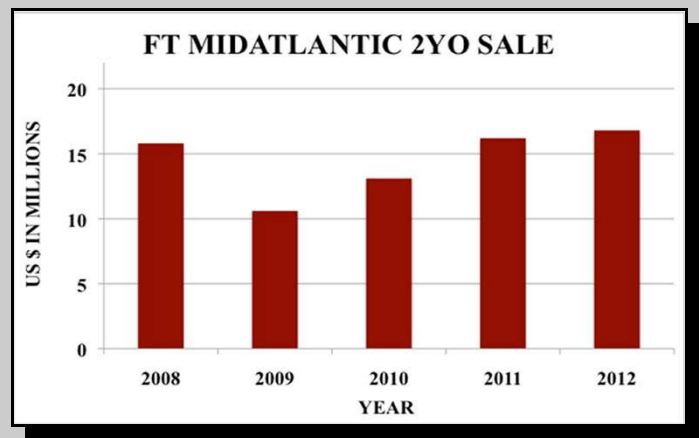

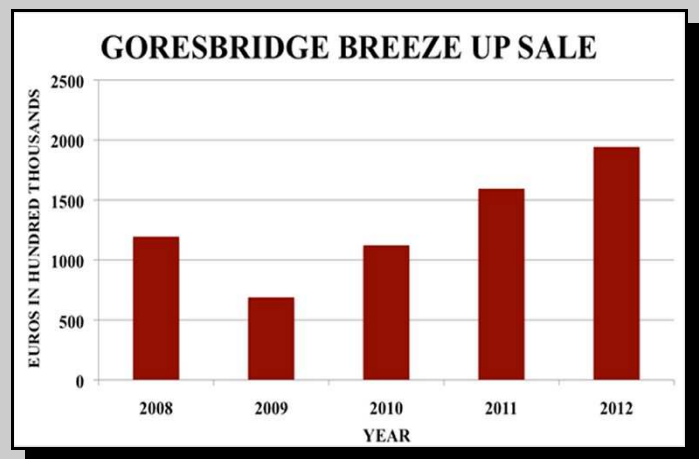

Possibly the most impressive 3-year-old seen in Ireland last weekend, though, was Moyglare Stud's Speaking of Which, runaway winner of the G3 Gallinule S. over 10 furlongs, and by--can you believe it?--Invincible Spirit again. We already knew he could get 10-furlong horses: Lawman, from his first crop, won the G1 Prix du Jockey-Club, after all, in 2007, and, as we've noted, 3-year-old Ektihaam this year ran a bang-up second in the G2 Dante. But this guy won the Gallinule by nine lengths, and trainer Dermot Weld looks like pointing him for next month's G1 Irish Derby over 12 furlongs. When I wrote about Invincible Spirit's career year last week I'd never even heard of Speaking of Which!

Monday saw the running of the German 2000 Guineas, the G2 Mehl-Mullens-Rennen. This was won in good style by Caspar Netscher, from the first crop by Dutch Art, and was his third Group 2 win, following the six-furlong Gimcrack and Mill Reef at two last year; he'd also won the G3 Greenham S. at Newbury first time out this year, but had finished only ninth in the G1 English 2000 Guineas behind Camelot and French Fifteen. German-trained Amarillo (Holy Roman Emperor) was second, with another British-trained runner, Red Duke, from Hard Spun's first crop, third.

Another 3-year-old from his sire's first crop, Vedelago, by Red Clubs (now deceased), upset older horses in Italy's G2 Premio Carlo Vittadini at a mile. This is beginning to look like a pretty useful crop of sires (click [here](#) to see current second-crop rankings from [the-racehorse.com](#)).

There were also a couple of big races for 3-year-old middle-distance fillies: Saturday's G2 Oaks d'Italia saw the Oratorio filly Cherry Collect complete a Classic double, having earlier won Italy's 1000 Guineas, the G3 Premio Regina Elena. Then, on Sunday, the Aga Khan's Shamardal filly, Sagawara, captured the 10-furlong G1 Prix Saint-Alary, the key prep for the G1 Prix de Diane. Rjwa (by Muhtathir and pronounced 'erjwa') was second, with longshot Forces of Darkness, from Lawman's first crop, third.

In the U.S., the weekend's big meet took place Monday, Memorial Day, at Belmont Park. Two 3-year-old fillies by Ghostzapper won graded stakes: the Baffert-owned and -trained Contested won the G1 Acorn S. at a mile on the dirt, while Darley-bred and -owned Better Lucky scored in the GII Sands Point at 1 1/16 miles on the grass. First-crop Darley sires Hard Spun (Zo Impressive) and Street Sense (Aubby K.) had the second and third, respectively, in the Acorn.

Maybe the best race of the weekend, though, was Monday's GI Met Mile at Belmont Park, in which Darby Dan's new acquisition Shackleford (Forestry) held off old foe Caleb's Posse (Posse), who had swept by him to win last year's GI Breeders' Cup Dirt Mile at Churchill Downs, with 2011 GI Cigar Mile winner To Honor And Serve (Bernardini) third, and GI Carter H. winner Jackson Bend (by Hear No Evil, a son of Carson City) off the board after chasing Shackleford. In Europe, there were two important Group 1 races for older horses on Sunday which both looked like serious preps for next month's G1 Prince of Wales's S. at Royal Ascot. The 1850-meter (9 1/4 furlongs) G1 Prix d'Ispahan isn't always a top Group 1, but it was this year: the 4-year-old filly Golden Lilac (Galileo), who won last year's G1 Prix de Diane over Goldikova's half-sister, Galikova, came with a late run, in her first start of the year, to beat the mighty Cirrus des Aigles (Even Top), winner of the G1 Sheema Classic and the G1 Prix Ganay in his previous two starts, with G1 Dubai World Cup third Planteur (Danahill Dancer), again third. At the Curragh, meanwhile, Coolmore's So You Think (High Chaparral) won his fourth European Group 1, and ninth in all, with an easy six-length score over Famous Name (Dansili), winner of 15 listed or Group 3 stakes and seven times Group 1-placed, in the G1 Tattersalls Gold Cup.

Q AND A WITH THE BREEDERS' CUP CANDIDATES



On May 24, Breeders' Cup Ltd. announced the 22 candidates who will stand for election to the Breeders' Cup Board of Members and Trustees. There are 16 openings on the Board and each term is four years. Voting begins June 4. The bios of the 22 candidates will be available in documents circulated to the voters-- Breeders' Cup foal and stallion nominators--and the TDN once again will provide additional information on the candidates' viewpoints. To that end, we posed the following question to each of the candidates, and have given them 400 words or fewer in which to respond.

Q: What do you anticipate you will be able to contribute to the Breeders' Cup's initiatives and committees and what aspects of your experiences and background will make you an asset to both?

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Craig Bendoroff, Denali Stud

I have been involved in the industry for my entire professional life as a jockey, an employee at Fasig-Tipton, an employee at a bloodstock management company and, for the past 20 years, as a breeder and as owner and operator of Denali Stud. I know the industry well; both its shortcomings and its wonderful attributes. I have ideas how to overcome the former and do a better job of presenting the latter. My experience as a farm owner have taught me about running a business.



I serve on several boards, including KEEP, KTA-KTOB, and The Lexington School. I have learned that effective boards operate through committees that do work, then make recommendations, and give direction to the board and those in charge of running the entity. My intention would be to be active at the committee level.

Several years ago, I completed a three-year program at the Harvard Business School. This gave me the opportunity to study and learn how both successful and flawed companies and industries work. Although our industry has unique traits, the basics of business are the same. You must provide a good product, give your customers and constituents value, and enhance your brand.

I would take the many valuable insights from this experience and use them in my role as a member of the Breeders' Cup board.

However, as we all know, much work needs to be done before this can happen. It would be my goal to see the Breeders' Cup take a leading role with other organizations such as The Jockey Club and NTRA to implement initiatives for this to occur.

Finally, we need to ensure that the Breeders' Cup remains in a strong financial position and that it is a responsible steward of the funds it has that are derived from breeders and owners. It is imperative that the excellent Breeders' Cup brand continues to be enhanced and that the Championship days of racing are of the highest caliber for everyone involved, particularly the fans and owners who attend.

W. Elliott Walden

The contribution of a member to a board like the Breeders Cup is measured by three main factors. Firstly, you have to be committed to the overall mission of the company. The Breeders Cup mission is to be the most prestigious and popular competition in world racing. In order to make that happen, you need a medication free event and purses that will recruit our biggest stars across the globe. We need to figure out what it will take to get Black Caviar, Frankel, and our home grown stars to compete on the biggest day. That is



being true to our mission. Secondly, to contribute to a board like the Breeders Cup, you need to have a true understanding of the business at hand.

My experience of growing up on a farm like Dearborn, training horses for 22 years and growing my stable to over 100 horses, and then coming full circle back to an operation like WinStar Farm has blessed me with a wealth of opportunities. I have had the opportunity to work with the RTCA as the President of the Kentucky council and Vice-President of the National organization. I realize that it can be difficult to "influence" a board in one direction or stand up for something that is not popular. But if we had 39 board members that were committed to being "committed," then you would see innovative ideas and great things accomplished. I would be willing to make the time necessary to help in any way possible. The Breeders' Cup has done a tremendous job of changing the climate in horse racing. I would love to help continue the legacy started 28 years ago.

Like many breeders in the United States, I do not own a farm of my own and do not stand stallions, but have participated in the sport/business virtually all of my adult life. I am actively involved in almost all aspects of the industry including handicapping, mare and stallion share ownership and racing in several jurisdictions. Hopefully, this broad range of perspectives would be useful to the Breeders Cup Board. Currently, I own 13 broodmares solely or with another partner as well as five stallion shares. Most mares are based in Kentucky but several are in Louisiana and Indiana. I also have a number of horses in training around the country.

Although I would be considered a small owner/breeder by most standards, I have been actively involved in many of the organizational aspects important to thoroughbred racing. I have served as President of the Kentucky Thoroughbred Association/Kentucky Thoroughbred Owners and Breeders on two separate occasions and have been involved in contract negotiations with racetracks as well as involvement with various regulatory initiatives within the state. I currently serve as the Chair of the American Graded Stakes Committee of TOBA and as Chair of the Kentucky Thoroughbred Development Fund Advisory Committee to the Kentucky Horse Racing Commission. I am also a member of the Jockey Club.

For my day job, I am a practicing surgeon in Louisville. If elected to the Breeders' Cup Board, I would try to bring the perspective of years of loving all aspects of the Thoroughbred business to that group.

I have a few core beliefs about the Breeders' Cup that I think are important to maintain. I believe it is ideal to have rotating venues rather than a permanent site for the annual event.

The boost to racing in a particular region seems immense if business details can be properly negotiated for the Breeders' Cup. I believe "internationalism" is critical to continue to embrace as the BC continues to grow its worldwide importance and influence.



I have personal concerns that the American breeding industry has become too provincial and needs to look beyond our borders to recapture some of the prominence our country had a decade or two ago in global breeding. The Breeders' Cup, in my opinion, is our best opportunity to focus those efforts. Most of all, I would hope to use the various experiences I have gained to benefit the Thoroughbred industry.

RCI PREZ: PENA CASE A 'GAME CHANGER'

Edited Press Release

Ed Martin, president of the Racing Commissions International, weighed in yesterday on the case being brought against Standardbred trainer Lou Pena by the New York State Racing and Wagering Board, calling it a "game changer with wide ramifications for racing, regardless of breed."

"This is a new chapter, make no mistake about it," he said, noting that New York's reliance on veterinary records as evidence of an illegal administration rather than a laboratory finding is a new regulatory strategy that he predicted other regulatory agencies would emulate going forward.

Martin also said the case "diminishes" the role of the RMTTC (Racing Medication and Testing Consortium) in recommending penalties by the imposition of fines substantially greater than those the RMTTC recommends for Class 3 and 4 medication violations.

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“While RCI and many regulators have adopted recommendations from the RMTC in this area, we question the adequacy of their suggested penalties and are currently working with The Jockey Club and others to toughen sanctions, improve deterrence, and weed-out repeat offenders,” he said.

In the Pena case, Martin noted that New York imposed sanctions 10 times what the RMTC recommends, and that it was, “certainly justified given the magnitude of the number of violations found.”

According to the New York Board ruling, Pena, who is currently awaiting a hearing, amassed drug violations in 675 races between January 2010 and April 2012, largely for Class 3 or Class 4 substances. Martin noted that commissions maintain total authority and discretion to determine penalties consistent with their governing statutes.

Last month in a speech at the RCI Convention in Oklahoma City, Martin suggested that racing commissions may need expanded jurisdiction over veterinarians and additional resources to review veterinary records and assess the appropriateness of the treatments being given horses in training.

“In light of the very legitimate equine welfare concerns that exist, it is prudent for lawmakers to reassess whether their racing commissions have the proper jurisdictional tools, authority and resources necessary to protect our horses, drivers and riders as well as the betting public,” Martin said.

Martin also said that, while the Pena case demonstrated a cross jurisdictional cooperation between New York and New Jersey, the time has come for passage of the RCI proposed Interstate Racing Regulatory Compact to institutionalize multi-jurisdictional cooperation, facilitate investigations and achieve a greater degree of uniformity.

(The RCI's release noted that Martin's comments do not represent the views of the New York State Racing and Wagering Board, or any of its members, who reserve public comment while specific charges are pending before their agency and do not want, even remotely, to suggest a predisposition concerning the final outcome before Pena has had an opportunity for a full hearing. Martin's comments are solely intended to assess the impact of the charges should they be upheld and should not be considered a recommendation to the New York State Racing on the merits of the case.)

American to Return to France

Given the success connections have had preparing him in France for a Spring Carnival campaign in Melbourne, **American** (Dynaformer) will be sent back to trainer Alain de Royer-Dupre with an eye on the G1 Melbourne Cup in November, a race he won in 2010. “We just feel that it is best to go back to do what worked incredibly well for two years,” co-owner Colleen Bamford told *Australian Associated Press*. “Chantilly is like nowhere else I have ever seen with beautiful tracks that go through the forest for miles with six or seven horses in a group, and that absolutely suits American. This horse has given us so much and we are really looking at what is the best thing for him, to keep him happy, and give him the best chance of winning another Melbourne Cup.” David Hayes took over the training of American this season, with mixed results. His three runs resulted in a third in the G1 Australian Cup and a runner-up effort in the G1 The BMW S. prior to a last-out sixth in the G1 Queen Elizabeth S.

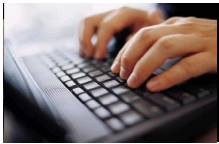

THE ELUSIVE DREAM: THE MYTH THAT FUELS THE RACING GAME

After 40 years of breeding and racing Thoroughbreds, I have arrived at some brutal conclusions; horses haven't repaid my enthusiasm or expenditure.

I can hear a crescendo of 'Tell me something new. What did you expect?'

I know horses are never what you 'expect,' they are what they want to be--or genetics determine. Nothing more or less.

The majority, according to Lester Piggott, are not all that fussed about winning. They can take it or leave it. Horses are the equivalent of what the writer Lawrence Durrell told a TV interviewer when asked the meaning of life, 'It is what you think it isn't.'

That's the conundrum, the equine mystery. 'They are what you think they aren't.'

It's true of the yearling buyer--you buy within the infectious excitement of the auction ring, but that never quite matches the reality, later on the track.

I was at a sale in 2008 where everyone was charging in, buying at boom prices when an old timer took me aside. 'These people are the ultimate optimists. And you know an optimist is a person who has no experience.'

Cynical, yes, but right now my equine passion is being tested, the love unrequited and the wallet desperately lighter.

But my story is no different to thousands of other souls bitten by the equine bug. And why should my horses be any different?

There is a philosophical argument that such is their independence of mind horses can never be truly owned, just guided by us and loved before the whip is drawn on the fields of glory.

'The Fields of Glory,' a phrase with restricted access. Only champions need apply. And they, of course, prove elusive to most owners or breeders who know only disappointment.

I read of a farmer who bred horses for 49 years. A year after his death he had his first metropolitan winner. I know all the stories from the optimists. I know this year's Kentucky Derby winner and the heroine of last year's Prix de l'arc d'Triomphe could have been bought for a total \$20,000. That only extends the myth.

In my country, Australia, just a handful of horses earn the service fee that got them. The statistics of horses that win more than one race are pitiful. So how has it come to this, such disenchantment?

Firstly, I have an admission. I was a romantic.

For years I combined a bit of breeding and racing with writing columns for Sydney newspapers about the business of racing and breeding.

I travelled, investigated and wrote what I thought was the uncomfortable truth but remained, unknown to me, a turf romantic. Five years ago, I bought a farm and got into horses in a commercial way, a lifetime dream was complete.

Now my business partner and I have 20 horses, six broodmares, eight 2- and 3-year-old fillies, two racehorses in work and four weanlings.

They have to earn their considerable keep. That's the rub. Right now I am looking out my window at two weanlings stretched across the ground, sleeping off an expensive, but scientifically balanced breakfast.


My reaction is mercantile, how can I sell them and what will they make in this selective market?

I stress in my chair thinking what has happened to the horse lover who has been carried--at my lightest 14 stone--to the top of Australia's highest mountains, across rushing rivers and along perilous paths without a false step?

Walking distractedly outside I wonder about the man who rode around the tails of cattle mobs and dreamed that one day he would breed fast racehorses? Just then my wife calls out 'John (our trainer) called and says our 2-year-old filly won her trial really well this morning.'

I run back to the house deliriously dreaming.
