NUMBERS SOAR AT FTKOCT

Led by the participation of trainer Mark Casse, yesterday's second session of Fasig-Tipton's October Fall Yearling Sale achieved massive year-over-year gains as the Thoroughbred market continues to show signs of

vigor and strength. In total, 273 horses sold Tuesday for \$10,025,400, bumping up the average to \$36,723 (up 36.8%) from 2012. The median jumped 28.6% to \$18,000, while the buy-back rate came in at a strong 15.47%. "We started strong, and we finished strong, and it was pretty strong in between," said Fasig-Tipton President Boyd Browning, Jr. "It was a very good day for selling horses." Just minutes into the session, Casse struck for the current sale topper, a \$500,000 Distorted Humor--Annasan

colt from Hill 'n' Dale Sales ([hip 384](#)). He was still around roughly 10 hours later to secure the Paul Tackett-bred and -consigned Horse Greeley half-sister to My Conquestadory (Artie Schiller) ([hip 736](#)) for \$320,000, the sale's current filly topper. In all, Casse purchased five of the top 10 lots Tuesday. "Obviously it's nice when a horse in the first 10 hips brings \$500,000, and it was nice to sell Mr. Tackett's filly for \$320,000 at the end," said Browning. "The most encouraging aspect of the sale continues to be the diversity of buyers, and the ability to find homes for the vast majority of horses, thanks to the competitive bidding at virtually every level. Today was fun, and we're excited to have another sale tomorrow. We've got another good group of horses."

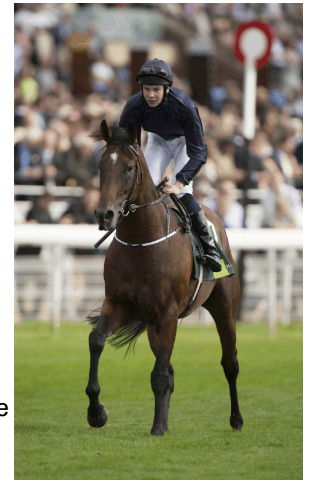

RETIREMENT LOOMS FOR ATLANTIC JEWEL

Coolmore's **Atlantic Jewel (Aus)** (Fastnet Rock {Aus}-Regard {Aus}, by Zabeel {NZ}) was found to have swelling in the lower sheath of a flexor tendon in her off-side foreleg and has been scratched from Saturday's G1 Cox Plate a short time after being assigned post position seven in an oversubscribed field of 15. The deflection means that It's A Dundeel (NZ) (High Chaparral {Ire}), who handed Atlantic Jewel her lone career defeat in the G1 Underwood S. Sept. 21, has assumed the mantle of favoritism at \$4 (3-1). cont. p3

WAR TO COOLMORE AFTER BREEDERS' CUP

Coolmore and Joe Allen's **Declaration of War** (War Front--Tempo West, by Rahy) will make his final start in the Nov. 2 G1 Breeders' Cup Classic at Santa Anita before retiring to Coolmore's Co. Tipperary base. Successful in the June 18 G1 Queen Anne S. at Royal Ascot and the Aug. 21 G1 Juddmonte International at York, the 4-year-old also hit the board in this term's G1 Eclipse S. at Sandown July 6, and G1 Sussex S. at Goodwood July 31. "Declaration of War has danced every dance this season and will have one more run in the Breeders' Cup Classic," said trainer Aidan O'Brien. "He has an unbelievable constitution and is a lot like Giant's Causeway--a big, powerful, strong traveller--so we're hopeful that he'll run well." Coolmore's Christy Grassick added, "Unbeaten as a 2-year-old in France, Declaration of War won two of Britain's highest profile Group 1s this summer and is a very imposing horse to look at. His sire War Front is probably the most sought-after stallion in America at the moment and his dam is a half-sister to star 2-year-old and American Classic winner Union Rags. He's a hugely exciting prospect."

An A\$320,000 purchase out of the 2010 Magic Millions Gold Coast Yearling Sale, Atlantic Jewel quickly stamped herself as a star, winning the G1 Schweppes Thousand Guineas in her fourth career appearance. She added the G2 Wakeful S. by seven dominating lengths, but was forced to miss the G1 Crown Oaks with a stress fracture in her back and was spelled. She returned in the Australian fall to take the G1 All-Aged S. last April, but a tendon injury to her opposite leg resulted in a 16-month absence. An impressive winner of the G1 Memsie S. first-up Aug. 31, she thrashed her peers in the G2 Stocks S. Sept. 14, but suffered a narrow defeat at the hands of It's A Dundee in the Underwood a week later.

In what is likely to be her career finale, Atlantic Jewel atoned for that defeat in no uncertain terms, streaking away by four lengths in the G1 Caulfield S. at the Sydney oval Oct. 12. "That is probably the end of her racing career," Coolmore's Michael Kirwan told *Racing Post*. "We have to get a veterinary report but she has had an injury in the past and she's now five so we probably will be retiring her. She is a bit of a freak. The fact she was able to come back after such a long layoff and win the Memsie S. over seven furlongs against all the best horses in Australia shows how good she was, that's the reality. She was the real deal, there's no doubt about that. She had unbelievable ability."

Kirwan told *Racing Post* that Atlantic Jewel is likely to be sent to the Northern Hemisphere in the coming months. "Assuming she is retired, we'll look after her and then send her to Ireland sometime around Christmas before she then joins the northern hemisphere broodmare band, at least for the time being," he told the trade daily. "The likelihood is she will visit Galileo. It's nearly November now and it's getting too late to cover this type of mare in Australia." Atlantic Jewel has amassed earnings of A\$1,587,925 in winning 10 of her 11 career starts.

Casse Lands New Sale Topper...

Yesterday's second session was just awakening when trainer Mark Casse put a jolt into the proceedings by going to \$500,000 for a Distorted Humor half-brother to Canadian champion A Bit o'Gold (Gold Fever). Casse was acting on behalf of Ernie Semersky and Dory Newell's Conquest Stable, for whom he trains the Breeders' Cup hopefuls **My Conquestadory** (Artie Schiller) and **Conquest Titan** (Birdstone).

The seventh horse into the ring on Tuesday, the colt-named Hot Humor and offered by Hill 'n' Dale Sales Agency as [hip 384](#)--was produced by the 19-year-old mare Annasan (Corporate Report), whose son A Bit o'Gold captured two legs of Canada's Triple Crown and earned over \$1.2 million. She's also the dam of Arco's Gold (Gold Fever), a stakes winner who ran second in the Prince of Wales S.; and the stakes-placed Adjalah (Gold Fever). The colt was bred in Ontario by Steven Di Iorio, who purchased Annasan for \$400,000 at the 2004 Keeneland November Sale.

"[Semersky] told me to buy a good Canadian-bred," smiled Casse shortly after signing the ticket in the sales pavilion. "I was the on the phone with him. He said, 'Is this one really good?' and I said, 'Yeah, this one's *really* good.' I didn't tell him what price, though, but I'm sure he'll be fine with it."

Casse admitted he was extended to land the colt. "With those horses, it's tough to know [what they'll bring], but it was getting to the point where...I wanted it to stop [laughs]."

It's safe to say that Semersky trusts Casse's judgement. Since he and Newell jumped into the Thoroughbred sales scene just this past spring, Casse has purchased for them the unbeaten My Conquestadory, recent winner of the GI Darley Alcibiades S.; Conquest Titan, winner of the Swynford S. and a solid fifth in the GI Dixiana Breeders' Futurity; the Victoria S. winner **Conquest Whiplash** (Hear No Evil); and the stakes-placed **Conquest Two Step** (Two Step Salsa). My Conquestadory is a probable for the GI BC Juvenile Fillies Turf; Conquest Titan is being pointed toward the GI BC Juvenile.

Casse said the rapid success of Conquest Stable hasn't set unrealistic expectations for Semersky. "We had a good conversation, and he said, 'Look, Mark, these horses owe us nothing,'" said Casse. "He feels like, whatever happens at this point, it is what it is. That's the way I feel, too. Especially with the filly. She's done more than I could ever ask, and whatever happens, happens. I just feel honored to train her, really. So we'll go out and have a good time. He's got a great perspective."

My Conquestadory worked a somewhat eventful five furlongs over Churchill's main track Monday in 1:01 2/5. Asked if she came out of the work okay, Casse fumbled in his pocket for a few seconds before pulling out a small piece of bark. "Yes," he said, knocking it. Casse said the Distorted Humor colt reminded him of another horse in his barn heading to the Breeders' Cup, the recent Gill Stoll Keenon Ogden Phoenix S. runner-up Laugh Track, another by the sire. "They have a lot of similarities," said Casse, who added, "You have to love the sire, and this mare's produced good horses." Casse continued to be active at the October Sale. Through the end of selling Tuesday, he signed for six horses for \$1,105,000 in addition to yesterday's toppers on behalf of Conquest. "I've had a lot of luck at this sale," Casse said. "I bought a filly named Kimchi [Langfuhr] out of this sale, and she won the [Woodbine] Oaks. Let's hope it continues."

Tackett Sells My Conquestadory Half for \$320k...

Longtime breeder Paul Tackett rang up one of the feel-good transactions of the yearling sales season yesterday at October when he sold a Horse Greeley half-sister to recent GI Darley Alcibiades S. winner My Conquestadory (Artie Schiller) for \$320,000. That's the top price paid for a filly at October. The connections who campaign that star juvenile, Ernie Semersky and Dory Newell's Conquest Stable and trainer Mark Casse, landed the Horse Greeley miss, who sold from Tackett's one-horse consignment as [hip 736](#).

Both fillies were produced by the stakes-placed 7-year-old Golden Artemis (Malibu Moon).

"I had no idea what she'd bring, and [Ernie] didn't even tell me what to bid on her," said Casse. "We may be happy, we may not be, but we own her. Her sister's done so much for us, and we had to give it a try. Plus Mr. Tackett and his family are so nice, and Ernie thinks so much of them. I think [buying this filly] was a nice gesture, a 'job well done.' That's the kind of guy Ernie is."

Casse said he sees similarities between the two fillies. "Of course, My Conquestadory is bigger right now, but I can see the same neck and back," he said. "Hopefully, she runs as fast. Or even *almost* as fast--that'd be good."

Tackett's involvement with the family dates back to Jan. 22, 2010, when he came out on top in a multiple-claim shake for Golden Artemis for \$8,000 at Charles Town. Two years earlier, the filly had been a smart juvenile in New York, winning her first start in maiden special company in June of 2008 and placing in both the Astoria S. and Lucky Lavender S.

"She had been a nice mare in New York with [trainer] Kiaran McLaughlin, and I was attracted to her being so quick," said Tackett. "It's also a nice Hobeau family, and I'm friends with Allen Jerkens, and he trained about four or five generations of that family. And I like Malibu Moon--I thought he'd make a really good broodmare sire."

Tackett bred Golden Artemis to Artie Schiller, and got My Conquestadory, whom he sold for \$70,000 at last year's Keeneland September Sale. Casse later

purchased her from Eisaman Equine for \$240,000 at the OBS March Sale. The Horse Greeley filly was Golden Artemis's second foal. "This filly isn't as mature as the other one at this time last year, but she's almost a May foal, and she does everything right and has a lot of quality," said Tackett, who admitted he didn't quite know what to expect coming into the October Sale. "I didn't really have a figure in my mind, but I knew she was a nice filly. I'm thrilled

to death with how she sold, and I'm really thrilled that Mark and his owners got her. They've really done so well with the other filly, and it's nice they came back to buy this one." There could be more fireworks for Tackett in the near future. Golden Artemis, who's carrying a full-sibling to My Conquestadory, has been entered at Fasig-Tipton's November Sale, where she's set to go under the hammer as [hip 210](#). Her weanling filly by Desert Party is cataloged as [hip 211](#). "I feel like at my age, I can't afford to own the mare," laughed Tackett. The popular horseman, who fielded congratulations and high-fives from several people after the sale, won't be without any connection to the family, however. Shortly after My Conquestadory made a winning debut in Woodbine's GII Summer S. in mid-September, he privately purchased a half-sister to Golden Artemis named Joonbi (Pollard's Vision). "A fellow had Joonbi at Finger Lakes--he had claimed here," said Tackett. "I called him, and he wasn't sure he wanted to sell her, but I called a few times and he said he'd price her, and I bought her. I thought I'd sell the dam, and that would at least gives me a connection to the family. And Joonbi was a pretty nice racemare. She won almost \$200,000. Eskendereya Filly Goes for \$245,000...

Not content to let his big brother Mark hog all the headlines, Justin Casse got into the action late into Tuesday's session, seeing off a challenger out back to purchase [hip 713](#), a Florida-bred Eskendereya half-sister to the graded winners Icy Atlantic (Stormy Atlantic) and Wild Promises (Wild Event), for \$245,000. Craig and Holly Bendoroff's Denali Stud consigned the Mar. 2-foal, who was bred by Bridlewood Farm. The filly was produced by 18-year-old Frosty Promise (Frosty the Snowman), whose page includes Grade I winners Jolie's Halo, Southern Image and Turbo Compressor. Casse was buying for an undisclosed client. "She's a filly with plenty of residual value, and is from a nice

Bridlewood family," said Casse just after receiving congratulations from Bridlewood's farm manager George Isaacs. "We thought she was one of the top fillies of the last two days, and obviously we had to pay for that. But she fell in the range we thought--somewhere between \$200-\$250,000." The filly is from the first crop of Giant's Causeway's GI Wood Memorial S. winner Eskendereya, who stands at Taylor Made. Heading into Tuesday's session, Eskendereya had 45 yearlings sell this year for an average of \$127,755. "What I've seen of the Eskendereyas I've really liked," Casse continued. "I've been the underbidder on several, so it's nice to finally land one. The ones I've seen have been nice strong, scopey horses who cover a lot of ground." The filly was Casse's sixth purchase of the sale. "It's been very competitive," he commented. "I think going in, all the 2-year-old pinhookers knew what they were getting themselves into. The 2-year-old sales drive the market as a whole. Good 2-year-old sales make for good yearling sales, which makes for good bloodstock sales. It all starts at the beginning of the year, and everyone this year was prepared to step up. The \$40-\$50,000 horses a few years ago are bringing \$70-\$75,000 horses."

Stoneway Steps Up...

James L. Stone's Stoneway Farm, which campaigns this year's top juvenile filly **Stonetastic** (Mizzen Mast), has been active at October, acquiring four yearlings for \$451,000. Included was yesterday's third top-priced filly, a daughter of Smart Strike--Dangerous Diva (Deputy Minister) ([hip 598](#)) who sold for \$210,000.

Stoneway also bought a daughter of Bernardini--Chagall (Successful Appeal) ([hip 510](#)) for \$145,000.

Stone sat with his racing manager and longtime partner Terri Burch when securing the former, a handsome filly who was consigned by Eaton Sales on behalf of breeder Grousemont Farm. The chestnut, bred on the same cross as Horse of the Year Curlin, is the second foal from Dangerous Diva, a daughter of the stakes-winning Grade II performer Go to the Ink (Crafty Prospector) who was raced by Grousemont's Ty Scheumann. "We really liked her," said Burch. "We came over earlier in the week and had four horses on our list, and she was second among the ones we wanted. The Bernardini was our first choice. We had priced the Smart Strike at around \$200,000, so we had to stretch a little bit for her, but it wasn't too far out of our comfort zone."

A Kentucky native, Stone, 70, is the owner and president of the Louisville-based trucking company Mercer Transportation. He acquired the 270-acre Stoneway Farm, located in La Grange, Kentucky, in 1998, with the idea of breeding commercially. Horses bred by Stoneway include the Grade I winner Irish Smoke (Smoke Glacken), GSW Caminadora (More Than Ready) and MGSW Spring Venture (Spring at Last), who Stone sold as a juvenile-in-training before buying back into later on.

A few years ago, Stoneway changed its strategy. "When the market crashed, we started racing a lot of our homebreds and buying yearlings," explained Burch. "We were up to 45 head in training last year, but I've been whittling that down, and we have 25 in training now. Plus, we have a few lay-ups on the farm, as well as 12 broodmares."

At last month's Keeneland September auction, Stoneway purchased two horses, a Majesticperfection filly from the family of GISW Sweet Talker (Stormin Fever) for \$155,000; and a Candy Ride (Arg) filly from a half to Horse of the Year Peaks and Valleys (Mt. Livermore) for \$40,000.

Stoneway's other October purchases were a \$56,000 Bob and John--Cayman Sunset filly ([hip 510](#)); and a \$40,000 Unbridled's Song--Time's Mistress colt ([hip 231](#)).

"We haven't been targeting fillies, it's just worked out that way," Burch said. "We got outbid a lot at Keeneland, but we were able to get three of the four that were on our list here, plus a couple extra we got for fun."

Stoneway uses several trainers, including David Carroll, Mark Casse, Tom Proctor, Neil Howard, Mike Salvaggio Jr., Kelly Breen, Mike Richard Kohnhorst and Eddie Johnston, and races in numerous jurisdictions, including California, Florida, Kentucky, Louisiana, Ontario and New Jersey.

Barry and Shari Eisaman in Florida typically break the majority of the Stoneway babies.

Among the horses the Eisamans broke for Stoneway last year was Stonetastic, a \$77,000 KEEESP yearling purchased who romped clear by 12 1/2 lengths in her debut going 5 1/2 furlongs at Monmouth Park Aug. 10. Sent off the 8-5 pick in the two-turn GII Pocahontas S. at Churchill Sept. 7, Stonetastic attended the pace and fought bravely to be second to Untapable (Tapit).

"Because she was geared down in her debut and basically won in a breeze, I don't think she was completely ready for the 1 1/16 miles, but she held her own and never stopped trying, and was only beaten a half-length by a very nice filly in Untapable," said Burch.

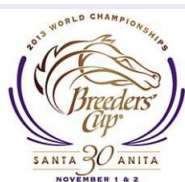

The 11th-hour defection of warm favorite Atlantic Jewel (Aus) (Fastnet Rock {Aus}) leaves a field of 14 for Saturday's Australian weight-for-age championship, the G1 Sportingbet Cox Plate at Melbourne's Moonee Valley Racecourse. With the 5-year-old heading towards retirement, New Zealander **It's a Dundee** (NZ) (High Chaparral {Ire}) looks likely to be the post-time favorite and is a deserving one at that. A four-time Group 1 winner in Australia at three, he exits a last-jump victory over Atlantic Jewel in the G1 Underwood S. Sept. 21. A foot abscess cost racing fans the opportunity for a rematch in the Sept. 28 G1 Caulfield S., won in style by Atlantic Jewel, but he's fully recovered from that

malady and is ready to stamp himself the best horse in Australasia. "He's shown how good he is. His [G1 ATC] Derby win in Sydney [last April] was spectacular," trainer Murray Baker told *Australian Associated Press*. "The thing with him is that he does it all so easily, he's easy to train, nothing worries him. He's relaxed, he's got plenty of speed and he can stay."

Though her father T.J. Smith was a seven-time Cox Plate winner, Gai Waterhouse is still in search of her first win in the event and will have solid claims with **Fiorente** (Ire) (Monsun {Ger}). Runner-up to **Green Moon** (Ire) (Montjeu {Ire}) in last year's G1 Melbourne Cup, Fiorente came from well back to be fourth, beaten 3/4 of a length, behind **Happy Trails** (Aus) (Good Journey) and **Puissance de Lune** (Ire) (Shamardal) in Flemington's G1 Turnbull S. Oct. 5. Fiorente is trading around 7-2 third choice in ante-post wagering, but Waterhouse believes the race goes through It's a Dundee. "He's the one to beat," Waterhouse told *AAP*. "He's a very masculine, big strong colt, I'm very impressed with the horse. Murray's a lucky man to be training him."

"We weren't expecting that he would make that much money, but he is a very nice type who walked well. If he turns out to be good, we will campaign him back here." Moments earlier, Anthony Stroud Bloodstock paid €90,000 for La Motteraye's well-connected daughter of the promising Juddmonte sire Champs Elysees (GB). Hip 198 is out of a half to the 2007 G2 Prix de Pomone winner and G1 Prix Royal Oak runner-up Macleya (Ger) (Winged Love {Ire}) and the smart 3-year-old Fabre trainee Montclair (Ire) (Montjeu {Ire}).

Campaigned by Repole Stables, Overanalyze--a half-brother to Grade I winner Meadow Breeze (Meadowlake)--realized \$380,000 at the 2011 Keeneland September sale, earning the distinction as the highest priced Dixie Union yearling that year. In addition to the Arkansas Derby, the Todd Pletcher pupil annexed the GII Futurity S. and GII Remsen S. In his final race, he was fifth in the Aug. 24 GI King Bishop S. at Saratoga. A winner of four of 11 starts, he retires with \$1,046,381 in earnings. "Overanalyze is by a good sire, was an expensive yearling, a multiple graded-winning 2-year-old and a Grade I winner at three," said the 3-year-old's trainer Todd Pletcher. "What more can you say? He has every chance to be a quality sire." "Overanalyze's Arkansas Derby win was as impressive of a Derby prep as there was all season," Repole said. "I love this horse's attributes. WinStar has committed to breeding 10 mares to him, and I told them I'd match that with 10 of my own mares." Overanalyze is part of WinStar's 'Dream Big program,' which gives breeders the opportunity to earn a lifetime breeding right in the Grade I winner by breeding and producing two live foals on stands and nurses contracts in the first two years of his stallion career. "Overanalyze has a very similar profile as [GI Belmont S. winner] Union Rags, so we believe he presents tremendous value through our Dream Big program," said Walden. "We've had success with our breeding rights programs with stallions like Spring At Last and Hold Me Back, and we think Overanalyze is going to be very popular as well."



“HE DID IT HIS WAY”

Luck plays a powerful role in all aspects of the Thoroughbred business. But after reading your hyperlink to Bill Finley’s *ESPN* piece, “The Year of the Kitten,” ([click for story](#)) it is quite apparent to me that to a great degree, Ken Ramsey has created much of his own luck. In the history of American breeding and horseracing, Ramsey has accomplished a unique achievement. Today’s stallion farms typically spread much of the risk of ownership of unproven stallions to investors and/or mare owners. But, Ramsey absorbed all of the risk and proved that he and Kitten’s Joy had the right stuff. Saving the life of Kitten’s First after a broken hip, producing Kitten’s Joy from that mare by cesarean section, managing Kitten’s Joy’s racing career to an Eclipse Award and then going “all-in” to back his unproven stallion with a very large number of his own mares makes the case that Ramsey has created his own luck. Truly, the nature and scope of his success as breeder and owner has no parallel.

Many people have stated that Ramsey has the Eclipse Award as owner already sewn-up, and that is obvious. Yet, in my opinion, his credentials for an Eclipse Award as breeder are even greater. Not only has he bred and supported his own stallion, he has created and managed the success of the “Kittens” from breeding shed and foaling barn to an awesome number of winner’s circles.

Bill Finley recounts the facts: “For the year [until the middle of October], 18 different Ramsey-owned sons or daughters of Kitten’s Joy have combined to win 24 stakes races, among them the Arlington Million, the Just a Game, the United Nations and the Sword Dancer.” And, we still have the Breeders’ Cup on the menu. It’s very enjoyable to watch Mr. Ramsey and his family have so much fun. He deserves it. His victories and overall racing accomplishments are as great as the risks he has taken along the way.

And, most importantly, he did it his way. I do hope the voters of the Eclipse awards view Ken Ramsey as the winner for Owner and Breeder in 2013. He certainly would have my vote in both categories.

In this second of a two-part interview with industry leaders regarding International Federation of Horseracing Authorities Chairman Louis Romanet's pledge to eliminate race-day drugs from Graded races worldwide, Barry Irwin talks to Jim Gagliano (President and COO of The Jockey Club), Dan Metzger (President of the Thoroughbred Owners and Breeders Association), Carl Hamilton (Chairman of The Jockey Club Information Systems) and Matt Iuliano (Executive V.P. and Executive Director of The Jockey Club). As the 30th Breeders' Cup dawns fast on the horizon, it is nothing if not apropos that the discussion revolves around strategies to bring North American racing in line with the vast majority of other jurisdictions in terms of uniform medication rules for Graded races.

Irwin: The Jockey Club is a member of the IFHA, but unlike members from European countries, our Jockey Club cannot conduct racing or impose national rules. What positive impact do you think Louis Romanet, as head of the IFHA, can have to move the ball toward eliminating race-day drugs in Graded races?

Gagliano: First of all, I think it's important to note what the IFHA is and is not. It is an organization of

independent racing authorities that come together to promote best practices and to work toward harmonization wherever they can. What IFHA is not is a regulatory authority. It does not have the power to impose rules on specific nations. All we look to do, with the executive council and the membership, is to identify a set of common principles, which are embodied within the articles of the International Agreement of racing, breeding and wagering, and try to have as many states and nations or organizations sign on to

those articles specifically. For example, there are significant parts of the articles to which the United States is not a signatory.

Barry: What do you think Chairman Romanet specifically is capable of doing to move the ball? Is it basically restricted to trying to influence as best he can?

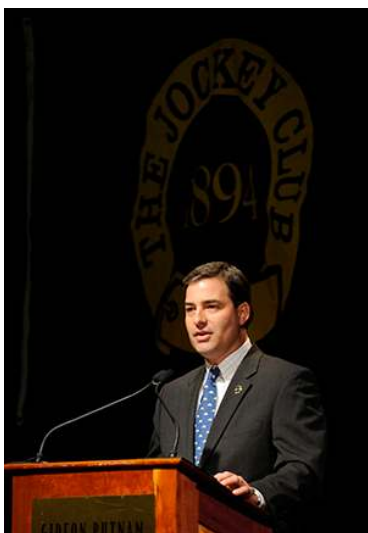
Gagliano: Yes. And, as you know, by virtue of his many years of experience in this arena and his position of authority as chairman of this international organization, Louis does have a great deal of influence. There is no question that he cares deeply about the sport of Thoroughbred racing and I hold him in the highest esteem, personally and professionally.

Barry: The Jockey Club has no authority to impose or alter federal or state rules for racing, but it does have the Stud Book, which could be a powerful tool in restricting registration of horses. Has The Jockey Club ever thought about using Germany's Stud Book restrictions as a template to control the use of drugs in American racing as a means of protecting the breed?

Gagliano: In Germany, as I understand it, it's not restrictions within their Stud Book but rather restrictions within their breeders awards program. The way that their breeders awards are established requires certain medication restrictions while racing in order for those horses to be eligible to receive awards or premiums. So it's really not the Stud Book regulating medication policy in Germany. Here in North America, we do reserve the right to refuse to do business with certain persons. If, for example, an individual is found to have violated a medication rule that involves a prohibited substance such as an RCI class 1 drug, our Rule 19 enables The Jockey Club to deny that person the privileges to conduct registration-related business with The Jockey Club.

Barry: An Irish member of the IRPAC (International Grading and Race Planning Advisory Committee) subcommittee of the IFHA at its most recent meeting floated the notion of a super Group 1 and the possible use of an asterisk to designate Black Type use in countries where medication is allowed in Graded races. What do you think of this idea?

Gagliano: I think that's a non-starter. That has never been discussed in any kind of committee of the IFHA or in IRPAC and I would not endorse that concept. I think that it would have negative implications on a lot of aspects of our business here [in North America] and it would not achieve what those who have proposed it would like it to do. It would be the exact opposite of harmonization.

Barry: Why do you think a fellow like Kavanagh does that? Is his motivation borne out of frustration or what else could it possibly be attributed to? What's his goal?

Gagliano: I guess you'd have to ask him what his goal is. I do know that Brian is held in high regard throughout the Thoroughbred industry. He and I both serve as vice chairmen on the IFHA executive council. We invited him to speak at The Jockey Club's Round Table Conference in August out of respect for Brian and Horse Racing Ireland.

Irwin: IRPAC and SITA set the agenda for Graded races in the world and how they are recognized in the sales catalogs. They have the authority and power to pressure North American

racing jurisdictions into eliminating drugs from Graded races. Do you think this is the best way forward for those progressive horsemen that want change sooner rather than later?

Gagliano: I'm going to say no. I don't believe that is the best way.

Hamilton: I don't believe this is the best way and I think in trying to achieve harmonization, it could have the opposite effect. We don't know how the North American sales companies would react.

Gagliano: I found Nick Nicholson's keynote address at the IFHA conference interesting as he gave a bit of a retrospective of his involvement in the IFHA. He discussed all of the gains that had been made over the years in harmonizing things such as the Stud Book. It wasn't always easy, but collaboration has brought success on many fronts. Together we stand, divided we fall. We think it's much better to work toward harmonization than to work for exclusion.

Barry: Would The Jockey Club or the American Graded Stakes Committee welcome a threat from an outside source such as IRPAC or SITA or even the IFHA on elimination of drugs in Graded races, that if not met would cause a loss of black type in sales catalogs?

Metzger: The Graded Stakes Committee proposed the elimination of race-day medication in two-year-old Graded races. Insofar as welcoming a threat, I cannot speak to that, because that would be up to Dr. David Richardson [chairman of the American Graded Stakes Committee] and the other voting members. But, if a threat did come from SITA, I think it would have to be taken seriously. I think it's more probable that SITA would encourage rather than threaten us to take some action. The sales companies are the ones with real influence on the Graded Stakes Committee. The Graded Stakes Committee derives its authority through SITA. So we would hope there would be the encouragement to do that as opposed to a threat.

If a threat did come from SITA, I think it would have to be taken seriously.

Barry: Breeders' Cup and the American Graded Stakes Committee moved to eliminate Lasix from Graded races only to step backward. Obviously there are business reasons for these decisions that reflect reluctance on the part of both entities to be engaged in costly lawsuits, among other reasons. Do you think these sputtering efforts have irreparably damaged the movement to eliminate race day drugs from Graded races?

Gagliano: I don't think we can call anything "irreparable" at this point. There have been a lot of different tactics used; some have been successful and some have not. We look at the expanse of the efforts on all levels of medication reform. This is one of them. I don't think this is the last we'll see of this issue and we certainly support it and will continue to support any efforts that help us achieve our longstanding goal of seeing horses compete only when they are free from the influence of medication.

Barry: The Jockey Club conducts the Round Table each August at Saratoga and features speakers that in great part generate comments that seek to influence racing and breeding. Influence is important, especially in America, where states' rights trump federal authority outside of the Interstate Horseracing Act. What if anything can be done to centralize authority?

Gagliano: As you know, pari-mutuel racing has long been regulated by individual states. While there have been several efforts to bind those states together - such as through a federal compact - to date, none have made much progress. At times, those of us that are involved in leadership roles in the sport bemoan the lack of central coordination. But I also think there are times when we also should take a step back and look at what has been achieved. For example, take the three initiatives that we talked about at last summer's Round Table Conference: uniform medication rules, uniform penalty structure and accredited lab standards. We're very encouraged that these reforms are starting to gel. It's quite possible that by early 2014 the majority of the states that conduct pari-mutuel racing will be operating from harmonized rules and penalties and lab standards. In this regard, you've got to give a lot of credit to the ARCI and the RMTC, as well as the NTRA, all of whom have really taken the promotion of reform as a major responsibility and have been very serious and aggressive in promoting it. On the matter of Lasix, I would note that is one issue we've always dealt with separately, and regulated differently.

The Jockey Club continues to believe that a phase-out of Lasix is imperative, and will continue to press for North American Lasix regulation to be harmonized with the rest of the world. But back to the other matter - medication rules, penalties and lab standards - it's very difficult to conceive of a bright future for the sport if these reforms are not embraced and implemented.

Iuliano: Currently, the industry's engine for regulatory reform in general, and medication and testing matters specifically, is through the combination of the RMTC and ARCI. These two groups more or less bookend the industry on medication matters with the RMTC providing the scientific and analytical bases behind substances used in racing, and the RCI crafting that science into regulations. Thus, the machine for change is already built and self-contained within the industry. Together, these two organizations can be very instrumental in coordinating the states to act in a concerted fashion to ensure uniformity of rules.

Gagliano: So how do we, The Jockey Club, help to promote these things? One of the ways we've done so is through the Round Table Conference. Another of the ways we have done so is through the media, with statements, press releases, white papers, even advertising. Another resource we've created, in collaboration with TOBA, was CleanHorseRacing.org, which later morphed into HorseRacingReform.org. It's our grassroots advocacy program. It has been used as a very powerful tool for owners and breeders and trainers and participants and observers to express their points of view on medication reform. It's been enormously successful. We've had thousands of people support and sign petitions in support of reform. I think Dan would agree that we need more people to get involved and to make their voices heard.

Iuliano: You've got a great chronology on that website. I think it dates all the way back to 2006 and it gives a good timeline to look at all the medication reform efforts. For that matter, it even includes the larger health, safety and welfare reform efforts that have gone on in the industry, starting with 2006 for the first welfare safety racehorse summit. So, it's a good resource for everybody to look at.

Barry: Do you think that federal legislation offers a viable way to move our industry forward or do you think we're better off just keeping the federal government where it is right now?

Gagliano: That's a tough question to answer at this point. In 2011, in a statement, we said it's undeniable that some aspects of the sport fall under the responsibility of the federal government - for example the 1978 Interstate Horseracing Act. It is also true that the states have regulated the sport for a long time, and would vigorously oppose a change in control. There has been an awful lot of progress toward reform recently, and the state commissions deserve a lot of credit for that. However, as we stated at the Round Table, if those reform efforts stall or are deemed to be inadequate, we may very well have to get behind federal legislation. If that time should come, that legislation needs to be carefully considered within the industry and cannot come from just one quarter.

Iuliano: At a recent meeting of the Massachusetts Gaming Commission, Alex Waldrop gave a very good chronology of the Interstate Horseracing Act, reminding the audience that, at its inception, the IHA was effectively a piece of federal legislation that was originally drafted by the industry and then provided to the federal government. There are certain aspects of the business that certainly belong and are currently regulated under the purview of the federal government and there are other aspects where regulation by the state is provided.

Irwin: I think it was (former RCI President) Tony Chamblin that basically constructed that part of the IHA and he's had misgivings about doing it because of how it's turned out. In that regard, do you think horsemen are being shortsighted in fighting over race-day drugs, based on Louis Romanet's contention that the future of the industry depends on attracting a younger generation and drugs simply turn them off?

Gagliano: Over the years we have conducted a lot of research and there is statistical support for the position that the use of medication in race-horses in competition makes it difficult to create and attract new generations of horse racing fans. It's hard to pick up The New York Times or any other major publication that covers sports or society and not see the taint of drugs on competition. It's not something that's going to go away, as much as some wish it would. I just want to come back and make sure I'm really clear on this statement. We have the utmost respect for those who have considered federal legislation and we have even met with and collaborated with some of them. We have also reached out to USADA by having Travis Tygart speak in 2012 at our Round Table Conference. (Barry, I know you had suggested this idea maybe a decade before). In fact, Matt Iuliano and I went out to meet with USADA in Colorado Springs last February to learn about its programs and operations.

Right now, however, we're very encouraged with the movement that we're seeing among state racing commissions and horsemen's groups such as the Thoroughbred Horsemen's Association (THA), in particular. I want to make it clear that we wholeheartedly support the current reform movement.

Irwin: I asked Chairman Romanet if he thought there would be an appetite among the international members of SITA to disallow Graded Black Type in sales catalogues for American races in which drugs were allowed if Keeneland and Fasig-Tipton supported it. His response was, "I think it would make the world totally different if Keeneland and Fasig-Tipton would support it." What do you think?

Gagliano: I don't think going to SITA addresses the core issue. And I don't think SITA is the right body to decide this matter.

WHO'S THE DADDY?

This is an exciting time of the racing season: the year-end championships. On Oct. 6, France hosted an outstanding day of racing culminating in the sensational victory by Treve (Motivator) over a good field in the G1 Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe. Last weekend, British

Champions Day saw outstanding soft-ground performances by Olympic Glory (Choisir)--like Treve, owned by racing's newest high-profile star owner, Sheikh Joaan bin Hamad al-Thani of Qatar-- in the G1 Queen Elizabeth S. at a mile; and by

Godolphin's Farhh (Pivotal), who bested the evergreen Cirrus des Aigles (Even Top) and G1 Epsom Derby winner Ruler of the World (Galileo) in an exciting three-horse finish in the G1 Champion S. In 10 days' time we have the world-class two-day Breeders' Cup meeting at Santa Anita, in which Andrew Lloyd-Webber's 4-year-old filly, The Fugue (Dansili), could be the hottest favorite of the meeting to topple the boys in the G1 Breeders' Cup Turf. It's all happening.

It's the 30th anniversary of the Breeders' Cup this year, and one of the features will be a television program highlighting some of the great moments in Breeders' Cup history: Personal Ensign nailing Winning Colors in the 1988 G1 Breeders' Cup Distaff; Sunday Silence defeating Easy Goer in the 1989 G1 Breeders' Cup Classic; Awesome Again's win in an epic 1998 edition of the Classic; Zenyatta beating the boys in the 2009 Classic, when the roof nearly came off Santa Anita. This month's racing is memorable, not simply because it's the best racing going on now, but also because we will consider today's top racing in the context of the great performances of yesteryear.

A decade turns out to be a long time in the horse racing game. For example, 10 years ago, at the end of the 2003 racing season, the Sadler's Wells sire line was a question mark; the jury was out. Though he was racking up his 13th (and 12th consecutive) British and Irish sire championship (his 14th and last would come in 2004), and his 12th (and 11th consecutive) European sire championship, the prospects for his sire line were far from secure. In an environment where speed was already king, he was more a staying sire. At the end of 2003, Sadler's Wells' standing as a sire of sires actually depended primarily on:

• **In The Wings (1986)**, from Sadler's Wells' first crop, was a Triple Group 1 winner at four in 1990, including the G1 Breeders' Cup Turf and G1 Coronation Cup.

His first crop included Singspiel (1992), who was a four-time G1 winner at four and five, including the G1 Japan Cup and the second Dubai World Cup

(in 1997, when it was still a listed Race), and ran second in the GI Breeders' Cup Turf. Singspiel was a successful sire, though if In The Wings survives as a branch of the Sadler's Wells sire line, it is actually more likely to be through Soldier Hollow (2000), a four-time Group 1 winner in Germany and Italy who raced through seven, but is now the most expensive sire in Germany (€15,000 for 2014), and is the sire of 2012 G1 German Derby winner Pastorius (2009), who will himself enter stud in Germany in 2014.

• **Barathea (1990)** was second to Zafonic in the 1993 G1 English 2000 Guineas and won the Irish version; as a 4-year-old, in 1994, he won the GI Breeders' Cup Mile. He was a useful sire, but not a top-flight sire. He didn't make Sadler's Wells a sire of sires.

• **El Prado (1989)** turned out to be a real surprise package at stud in North America. Winner of the G1 National S., Ireland's most important 2-year-old race, he disappointed at three and was sold from Ballydoyle to Frank Stronach, with the Sangster family, which owned a piece of him at Ballydoyle, retaining an interest. He proved a big success, and was the second-best sire from the 1994 sire crop, behind a horse called A.P. Indy. Though El Prado was established as a very useful sire by the end of 2003, when Medaglia d'Oro had just run second in his second consecutive GI Breeders' Cup Classic and Kitten's Joy and Artie Schiller were promising 2-year-olds, not that many experts would have predicted he was about to establish a bridgehead for the Sadler's Wells sire line in North America.

• Finally, there was **Fort Wood**, like In The Wings and Barathea either bred and/or raced by Sheikh Mohammed. Fort Wood, who was out of the off-the-graph blue hen mare Fall Aspen, won the G1 Grand Prix de Paris when it was still a 10-furlong race and had become a leading sire in South Africa,

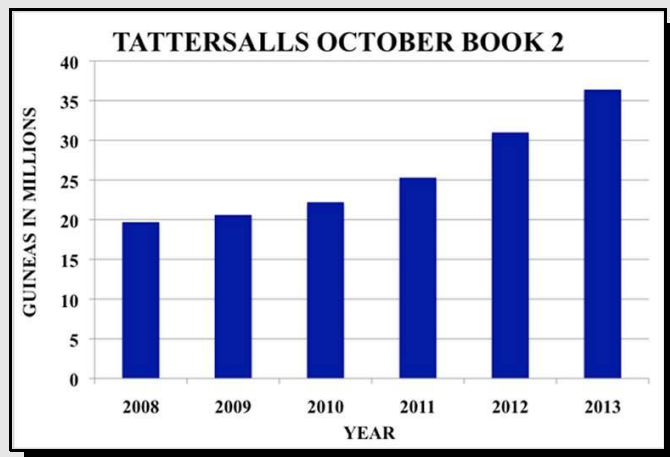
But that was it. The superstar racehorse **Montjeu** was about to have his first 2-year-olds racing in 2004, and **Galileo** was about to have his first yearlings. But the whole landscape for the Sadler's Wells sire line looked a lot different than it does now.

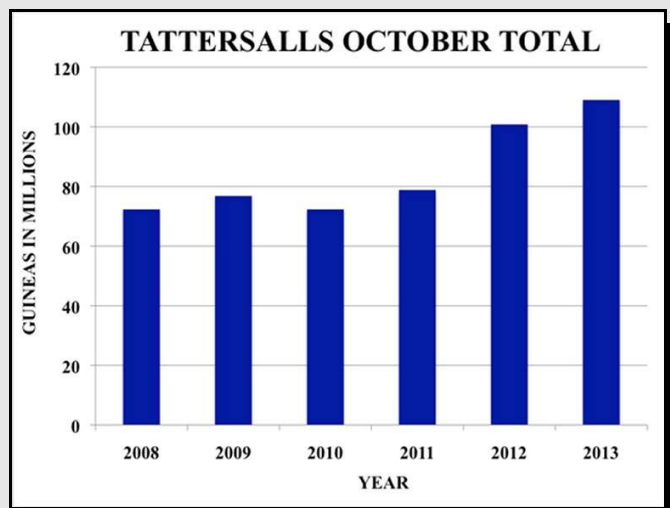

"Tattersalls' October 2 sale last week achieved a remarkable clearance rate of 79.3% from the catalogue, meaning a sky-high four of every five yearlings catalogued were sold – like Keeneland September Week 2, though a remarkable clearance rate in North America seems to be 73%. October 2 was up 25% in average, to 47,529 gns., which translates to just a hair under \$80,000. High demand at that level is great news, but studmasters need to be careful that any stud fee increases are kept to a little, not a lot." - Bill Oppenheim

Montjeu was champion sire in France the year he had his first 3-year-olds in 2005, which has actually been

his only sire championship. He has been runner-up to Galileo on a quite a few lists. What Montjeu has done is sired four G1 Epsom Derby winners in his first nine crops of 3-year-olds. The first, **Motivator**, from

Montjeu's first crop

and who won the 2005 Derby, took a while to get going himself, but last year had the impressive G1 Prix de l'Opera winner Ridasiyna and this year, of course, has the unbeaten 'Arc' winner Treve. He's a certainty to be champion sire in France this year. Montjeu's second Derby winner, **Authorized**, from his third crop, won the 2007 Derby and had his first foals in 2009, so he has first 4-year-olds 2013. He was looking pretty shaky until midway through this year, but has since had two Group 1-winning fillies from his first crop in Europe--Ambivalent won the G1 Pretty Polly S. at The Curragh this summer, and the lightly raced Seal of Approval won last weekend's G1 British Champions Day Filly & Mare S.--as well as a Group 1-winning 3-year-old in Australia. Ironically, all four Northern Hemisphere G1 winners by Montjeu's two Derby-winning sons are fillies, whereas Montjeu himself displayed a distinct colt bias.

Montjeu's other two Derby winners are Coolmore residents: **Pour Moi**, who won the 2011 Derby, has his first foals coming up to the sales this year; and **Camelot**, who won the 2012 G1 English 2000 Guineas as well as the Derby, will be settling in at Coolmore as we speak. Montjeu still

has two more full crops of 3-year-olds to come, including this year's G2 Beresford S. winner Geoffrey Chaucer, so he might yet have another Derby winner up his sleeve. Montjeu, who died at the end of March

2012, was always a 'top-five sire' in Europe, but the only horse we can actually compare the 2001 G1 Epsom and Irish Derby and 'King George' winner Galileo to is Sadler's Wells himself. Galileo is indisputably the world's number one sire. He has been champion sire, both in Britain/Ireland and Europe as a whole four times, and is odds-on to be the champion sire for the fifth time this year. He's also been leading sire of 2-year-olds twice, the years New Approach and Frankel were 2-year-olds. His celebrated cross with the Danzig line, especially Danehill, is one of the most powerful seen for a long time: Frankel, Teofilo, and Intello this year are all out of Danehill mares.

Galileo's first two major sons at stud are both Darley stallions, bought from owner-trainer and--in the case of Teofilo--breeder Jim Bolger. **Teofilo** was the unbeaten champion European 2-year-old of 2006, but unfortunately never made it back to the races. He's the leading North American/European third-crop (1st foals 2009, first 4-year-olds 2013) sire by progeny earnings this year.

New Approach was similarly unbeaten as a 2-year-old in 2007. Then, after losing twice at a mile to Henrythenavigator in the G1 English and G1 Irish 2000 Guineas, he bounced back to win the 2008 G1 Epsom Derby. New Approach's first crop of 3-year-olds this year includes two Classic winners: Dawn Approach, unbeaten European champion 2-year-old of 2012 and winner of this year's G1 English 2000 Guineas; and G1 Epsom Oaks winner Talent.

Galileo is the sire of probably the highest-rated horse in European history, **Frankel**, who retired to stud this

year after an unbeaten career of 14 starts for owner-breeder Prince Khalid Abdullah. The form of Frankel's wins has been advertised over and over again by horses like Excelebration, Cirrus des Aigles, and Farhh, all of whom are top

Group 1 winners as long as Frankel's not in the room. Coolmore's **Rip Van Winkle**, whose first yearlings have averaged about \$120,000 and impressed the 'judges,' had similar experiences with a certain Sea The Stars, but away from him, he was a Group 1 winner at eight and 10 furlongs and is Galileo's next major son due to have runners. Coolmore also has **Cape Blanco**, who won the G1 Irish Derby and G1 Irish Champion S. as a 3-year-old in 2010, came to the U.S. in 2011 where he won three Grade 1's in three starts and was named champion male turf horse. He stands at Ashford, Coolmore's Kentucky arm, and has his first foals coming to the sales this year.

Besides Frankel, who stood for £125,000 (near enough US\$200,000) and whose first mares will be selling in-foal for no doubt astronomical sums this year, another top-class son of Galileo who retired in 2013 is Newsells Park's MG1SW **Nathaniel**.

Winner of the G1 'King George' as a 3-year-old in 2011 and the G1 Eclipse S. at four in 2012, Nathaniel also showed incredibly consistent top-class form for owner-breeder Lady Rothschild and trainer John Gosden. He's another son of Galileo to have a real shot at being a top-class sire. The leader of the 2014 class of retiring sons of Galileo must be **Intello**, winner of the 2013 G1 Prix du Jockey-Club (French Derby) over 2100 meters, and placed in both the G1 Poule d'Essai des Poulains (French 2000 Guineas) at a mile and the 'Arc' at a mile and a half. Bred and owned by the Wertheimer Brothers, it's just been announced that he will do his first two seasons at Cheveley Park in England, then move to France for the 2016-2017 seasons at the Haras du Quesnay. On deck for 2015 we can expect this year's G1 Epsom Derby winner **Ruler of the World**, as well as a few others we don't know about yet. So the story here is that Galileo is indeed going to have some more serious chances to enhance his credentials as a sire of sires, given he has made a very good start in that department with Teofilo and New Approach.

Now we must return to El Prado, 10 years on. Dirt horse **Medaglia d'Oro** closed out his career with another second to Pleasantly Perfect (he'd been second to him in the previous year's G1 Breeders' Cup Classic) in the 2004 G1 Dubai World Cup. He retired to stud to Stonewall Farm in 2005, had his first foals in 2006, and first runners in 2008. Once Rachel Alexandra beat the boys in the 2009 G1 Preakness S., his status was assured. Within a month, his move to Darley was announced, and since then he's been a \$100,000 stallion who's enjoyed fantastic support. He was an absolutely top-class racehorse--five times he ran Beyers between 117-120--and he's making a very good sire, indeed, through hardly typical of the Sadler's Wells line, which on the whole doesn't really operate on dirt, or even very well on synthetic surfaces.

Kitten's Joy was more typical of the Sadler's Wells line in that he won the Eclipse Award as champion turf male in 2004. His first crop arrived in 2007 and, though used primarily as a private stallion for the Ramsey family to begin with, at this writing he's the leading sire in North America by progeny earnings for 2013 (just under \$10 million), including 22 black-type winners and five Grade I winners this year. One of those, Stephanie's Kitten, had been instrumental in propelling Kitten's Joy to the 2011 North American leading sire of 2-year-olds title with her win in that year's GII Breeders' Cup Juvenile Fillies' Turf. A third son of El Prado, WinStar's **Artie Schiller**, upset none other than Leroidesanimaux in the 2005 G1 Breeders' Cup Mile.

His best up until this month was the GII winner Mr. Commons, but on opening weekend at Keeneland, he had the winners of both Grade I 2-year-old races, My Conquestadory (GI Alcibiades S.) and We Miss Artie (GI Breeders' Futurity), so he goes into next weekend's Breeders' Cup with two live chances to upgrade his rating.

Following Galileo's win in the 2001 G1 Epsom Derby, **High Chaparral** followed up for Sadler's Wells by winning the 2002 version before also adding the G1 Irish Derby, and scoring the first of his two wins (the second a dead-heat with Johar) in the G1 Breeders' Cup Turf. High Chaparral has arguably been the best son of Sadler's Wells in Australasia, where he has sired **So You Think**, bought into by Coolmore and winner of 10 Group 1 races, five in each hemisphere, and now a Coolmore dual-hemisphere stallion; and It's a Dundeel, himself now a five-time Group 1 winner in Australia. High Chaparral's best horse 'up north' is the current 3-year-old Toronado, winner of the G1 Sussex S. over Dawn Approach, and a very live contender for next weekend's Breeders' Cup meeting, should he make the trip.

The last of Sadler's Wells' 23 crops was foaled in 2008, so his story as a sire is just about written: according to the *TDN* Lifetime Cumulative Earnings General Sire List (click [here](#)), Sadler's Wells has sired 1,699 runners; 1,114 winners; a record 294 black-type winners (about 13% of his more than 2,200 foals); 167 group winners, of which 73 are Group 1 winners. His almost 1,700 runners have earned more than \$133 million. Galileo is already up to ninth on the list, with 33 Group 1 winners and the earners of almost \$84 million. El Prado is 10th with the earners of more than \$79 million, and Montjeu ranks 13th with 22 Group 1 winners and the earners of more than \$75-million in 10 crops. That's \$370 million in earnings right there, so it's probably a pretty conservative guess to estimate the Sadler's Wells sire line is responsible for the earners of over half a billion dollars. And the line is still expanding, not shrinking: a recent table showed seven of Timeform's eight top-rated 3-year-olds in Europe in 2013 are by Galileo, his sons New Approach and Teofilo, Montjeu, and High Chaparral. And possibly the last son of Sadler's Wells himself to stand in a major breeding center is **Bullet Train**, a Group 3 winner in his own right but much better known as thereafter the regular workmate for his 3/4-brother by Galileo, Frankel. Any horse getting Frankel to break sweat must be worth a look at his \$7,500 fee, standing his second season this coming year at the McLean family's Crestwood Farm near Lexington.

CITYSCAPE TO OVERBURY

Juddmonte stalwart **Cityscape (GB)** (Selkirk--Tantina, by Distant View) has been retired to stand at Overbury Stud for the 2014 breeding season in a deal brokered by Blandford Bloodstock. Most notable for his authoritative success in the G1 Dubai Duty Free last March, the 7-year-old will join the likes of Delegator (GB) at the Gloucestershire-based establishment at a fee of £5,000 SLF. Highly consistent throughout his career, the half-brother to another Khalid Abdullah-Roger Charlton luminary in Bated Breath (GB) (Dansili {GB}), was also successful three times at Group 3 level and placed six times at the highest level. Those included runner-up finishes in the 2011 G1 Hong Kong Mile and last year's G1 Prix Jacques le Marois and G1 Queen Elizabeth II S., as well as, a third in that season's G1 Woodbine Mile. In total, he won six of his 23 starts and just shy of £3 million in prize money. Roger Charlton, who nurtured his career over five seasons, paid his own tribute yesterday. "Cityscape is a noble horse," Charlton said. "Bold, tough and brave. He's a good mover with a wonderful temperament and he had terrific speed." Overbury Stud's Simon Sweeting added, "He has the talent, looks and pedigree to be a top-class sire. Selkirk was a hugely influential stallion. I believe that Cityscape, who is a complete outcross to Northern Dancer and hails from the family of champions Redoute's Choice (Aus) and El Gran Senor, can pick up where Selkirk left off."


