HAPPY 80TH BIRTHDAY, D. WAYNE LUKAS

Hall of Fame trainer D. Wayne Lukas reaches another milestone Wednesday, this one very personal: his 80th birthday.

As he was preparing to leave Saratoga Springs to return to his home in Louisville Monday, Lukas said becoming an octogenarian is no big deal. He figures his non-celebration will consist of what he does every other day--get out of bed in the middle of the night and go to work.

"I don't feel any different," he said. "I think I've gotten a little bit smarter about training horses because I think it is a game of experience and there is no other way to learn it but by trial and error. Having been involved with so many horses--good, bad and indifferent--I think the experience factor is huge. Having said that, I don't feel any different than when I was 50.

"I still enjoy very much getting on my saddle horse and getting out there right next to the horses training. I don't know when the last time is that I've missed a day." **Cont. p3**

REGIS FARM TO DISPERSE

Nat Rea has announced he will completely disperse the Thoroughbred bloodstock holdings of his Regis Farms during the upcoming Keeneland November sale. The dispersal, which will be handled by Three Chimneys Farm, will be comprised of 41 horses, including 15 broodmares, six weanlings, and 20 horses of racing age. All will be offered without reserve.

"I have shifted all my business focus to oil," Rea explained. "I see great opportunity in that business today. I'm passionate about both industries, and love the horses, but I can't devote my time to both, so I had to make a choice."

Highlighting the dispersal are 2015 GI Kentucky Oaks runner-up and 'TDN Rising Star' **Shook Up** (Tapit), Canadian Horse of the Year **Sealy Hill** (Point Given), in foal to Medaglia d'Oro, graded stakes winner **Seduire** (Elusive Quality) and stakes winner and graded stakes placed **Donworth** (Tiznow). Also selling will be the unraced 3-year-old **Bijou** (Street Sense), a \$1.45-million Keeneland January yearling of 2013 and a half-sister to Grade I winners **Certify** and **Cry and Catch Me**. **Cont. p7**

GLENEAGLES TO BREEDERS' CUP CLASSIC

Trainer Aidan O'Brien confirmed Tuesday that his star 3-year-old miler **Gleneagles (Ire)** (Galileo {Ire}) will be aimed at the Oct. 31 GI Breeders' Cup Classic at Keeneland, adding further luster to a potentially mouth-watering lineup that could include Triple Crown winner American Pharoah (Pioneerof the Nile), this year's GI Whitney H. and GI Met Mile victor Honor Code (A.P.

Indy) and star mare Beholder (Henny Hughes).

Gleneagles is slated to run in the Sept. 12 G1 Irish Champion S., with the G1 Queen Elizabeth II S. on Champions Day Oct. 17 the backup plan if the ground comes up too soft

next weekend. The 1 1/4-mile Irish Champion S. would be Gleneagles's first time racing beyond a mile, which is also the distance of the QEII.

"Given suitable ground, Gleneagles will run in the Irish Champion S. on Saturday week and, failing that, he will be aimed at the Queen Elizabeth II S. at Ascot in October," said O'Brien. "His end-of-season target is the Breeders' Cup Classic at Keeneland, where he may face American Pharoah." **Cont. p10**

For years Lukas has joked that he will never retire, intends to die with his boots on, and figures he will fall off his horse on a track somewhere and be harrowed under.

“My health is very good and I just feel like it’s business as usual,” he said. “I don’t feel like 80 is any milestone at all or that anything should change. I want to stay competitive. There are a few things that I would like to do

yet. It’s been wonderful all this time training these horses and it’s still good.”

So it goes for the former teacher and basketball coach from Antigo, Wisconsin, who left his job in education after the 1968-69 school year and turned his summer job training racehorses into his full-time gig.

“I made a career change and it really worked out well,” he said, chuckling.

Yes it did. Lukas became a dominant player in Quarter Horse racing before making a complete switch to Thoroughbreds in the 1970s. In the years that followed, he set the standard in the sport for money won and wins at the highest levels. Among the records he holds is career wins in Triple Crown races, 14, as well as the most victories and money won in the Breeders’ Cup. He is a member of the Quarter Horse and Thoroughbred halls of fame.

Although Lukas certainly qualifies as a senior citizen, he’s not ready to settle in the rocking chair and spend time talking about the good old days.

“I’d still like to have another Derby winner or two,” he said, “or maybe some of the other Classic races and the Breeders’ Cup, races that are so important and milestones in a trainer’s career.” **cont. p4**

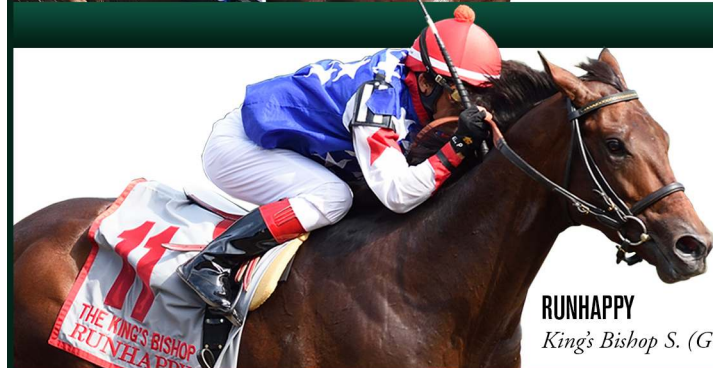

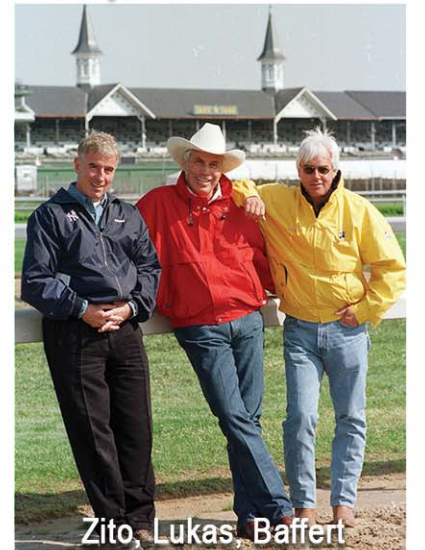

“I’ve been really blessed,” Lukas continued. “We’re not as competitive as we were in the ‘80s, the ‘90s and the early 2000’s, but we had a champion last year and we had a champion the year before. A lot of guys never have a champion. I feel really blessed in that respect. We’re still competitive. Not as much as I’d like to be, but we’re still competitive.”

Will Take Charge was the 3-year-old champ in 2013 and Take Charge Brandi was voted the 2-year-old filly titlist last year.

Lukas has never been afraid to aim high and that approach has not changed.

“I’d like to win the Triple Crown,” he said. “I was kidding Bob Baffert the other day. I congratulated him when he did that and I’m very proud and happy to be his friend. I told him, ‘Bob, I wanted to do that before you did.’ That’s hanging out there.”

While he’s as ambitious and confident as he ever was, Lukas acknowledges that he has mellowed in some areas and now savors the successes.

“I was telling some friends the other day that I wish in the ‘80s and ‘90s when we were winning five or six Grade 1’s on a weekend and running through the Triple Crown, that I had stepped back and enjoyed it a little bit more,” he said. “Now I enjoy it a little bit more, when we do win a Grade 1.”

Lukas won two last year with Take Charge Brandi and a total of four in 2013 with Preakness winner Oxbow, Will Take Charge and Strong Mandate.

It was part of a comeback from a tough stretch when he went three years between graded stakes victories.

Since making the move to Thoroughbreds, Lukas has developed 26 champions, three of whom were elected Horse of the Year. He is adept at stepping around the question of which one tops his personal list of stars.

“I’ve been asked that so many times,” he said. “The best Quarter Horse I ever had, and I had 23 champions, was Dash for Cash, who absolutely dominated the breed and the racing industry at that point of his career.

“The Thoroughbreds, it just depends on what era you point to. You look at Winning Colors then Serena’s Song and then Lady’s Secret. Down through the years, it’s hard for me to pinpoint which one was probably the best. Brilliance-wise, Landaluce was probably the most brilliant one that I ever had, but her career was so short. Year after year, I’ve come up with a horse that in a lot of ways was surprising and they become special, too. I don’t know if I’d pinpoint one.” *cont. p5*

With the racing world still buzzing about American Pharoah's loss in the GI Travers S., Lukas offered Thunder Gulch, the 1995 champion 3-year-old male, as a member of his elite group of standouts.

"One of the things that they talk about is the stress of trying to make it through the Triple Crown and then the Travers. We just had that story this week," he said. "But when you stop and talk about Thunder Gulch, it's unbelievable what he did. At that time nobody thought too much of it. You win the Fountain of Youth and Florida Derby. Then you run in the Blue Grass, you win the Derby, you're third in the Preakness and you win the Belmont. Then you go to California and win the Swaps. Then you come back and win the Travers.

"That's a pretty damn good run. I'd have to put that horse right up there with the best."

Thunder Gulch was a member of the crew that Lukas used to win six straight Triple Crown races--a feat that seems likely to stand forever--from the 1994 Preakness to the 1996 Derby.

"We never have won the Triple Crown, but sometimes I wonder if it is a bit more difficult to win them all in a row with different horses," he said. "That means that at least you are

developing different horses for your clientele.

"Having one horse like American Pharoah or a Seattle Slew or Affirmed is wonderful. I'm so happy for Bob Baffert and the Zayat family. When I look back, we were reaching into the talent pool that we had and were able to win one for one client and then come up and win another one. Thunder Gulch wins the Derby, Timber Country wins the Preakness and then you come back with another one from Thunder Gulch. Serena's Song wins the Haskell. That's a pretty good run, too."

Lukas said he is grateful for having had terrific relationships with owners like William T. Young and Bob Lewis. Now on his roster of owners are Ahmed Zayat, Willis Horton, Robert Baker and Bill Mack. When Cat Thief won the 1999 Breeders' Cup Classic, Lukas gushed about being able to deliver such an important victory to Young, the master of Overbrook Farm.

"You right away turn to your clientele that has supported you and been so loyal," Lukas said. "To win it for Bill Young and then win the Derby for him, those are great highlights. Absolutely. As a trainer you win one for Bill Young, you win one for Bob Lewis. You've had that experience over and over, but they only get that opportunity once in a while.

"For example, with Will Take Charge, when Willis Horton won the Travers, that was a very special day. Why? Because we won it for him. I've won it before. I've been there. I've stood there before. I've seen that. It takes on a new meaning with your clientele." **cont. p6**

Though they compete with him for owners, horses and victories, Lukas said he is happy that his former assistants, a group that includes Todd Pletcher, Kieran McLaughlin, Mark Hennig and Dallas Stewart, have become very successful running their own stables.

“One of the things that has been so satisfying in an 80-year run here is the fact that my proteges, the guys who have been with me and have been so good, are doing so well,” he said. “I sit over there at Saratoga and see Todd win three in one afternoon, Kieran win two more and Dallas win one, I think ‘Geez, they only ran nine races and my guys won six or seven of them.’ That’s a great feeling.”

During the midst of the best years of his career, which was a very long time, Lukas was driven to the point that he could be difficult to deal with and often feuded with the media covering the sport. Fiery when he wants to be, in the last decade or so, a gentler Lukas has emerged and he has become something of a senior statesman or spokesman of the sport.

“What happen is that I think you inherit that mantle,” he said. “You owe it a little bit. I don’t even have a horse in a race and the media still wants my opinion, which is very flattering. I think what is part of the case is that after you’ve been around for 70 years or 60 years, you get to the point where people think you know more than the young ones, but that’s probably not true.”

Lukas remarried in 2013 and he credits his wife, Laurie, for helping to make this a happy time in his life.

“I finally got it right,” he said. “Laurie has been just a wonderful companion for the last couple of years. It’s really been special. She’s an accomplished horsewoman in her own right. I tell people now that I am the second-best horseman in the house. She’s an accomplished horsewoman and judge all over the world. She relates to what we’re doing, but she’s got a great feel for what it takes to be a companion to a horse trainer. That’s not easy.”

“I would say that being a wife of a football or basketball coach is very, very stressful, but I think that being the wife of any horse trainer is very, very tough, too. I think those women are special that stay in there because the mood swings, the pressure and the ups and downs are so intense. It’s been a joy to be with her because she really gets it. She rides out and back [to the track for training] with me every day, which is amazing at our age. For us to go out and share the whole morning, that’s pretty special, too.”

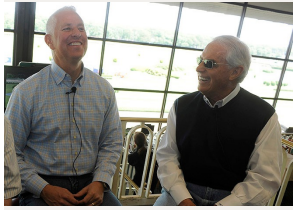
The lowest point in Lukas’s career came in December 1993, just before that run of six consecutive Triple Crown wins, when his only child, Jeff, his chief assistant, was run over by a loose horse at Santa Anita Park. Jeff Lukas was critically injured and was near death. He survived, but was never able to return to training horses and now works in a bank in Oklahoma.

“I reflect a lot on what might have been without Jeff’s injury,” Lukas said. “In fact, just this last week Laurie and I sat here and talked about it and reminisced about what happened and what led up to it because she wasn’t part of that.”

“It’s something we’ve been dealt and Jeff always says, ‘These are the cards I’m dealt and I’ll deal with them.’ He’s got a great attitude. It’s been amazing probably what could have been because his career was taking off, too. I think about that a lot. But he’s happy and he’s living through his two children. One graduated from the Air Force Academy and the other is going into medical school. We’re solid. We’re OK.” **cont. p7**

Everything he does is top class. If he had a retail store, he'd be on Rodeo Drive in Beverly Hills. If he would have stayed in coaching, he would have won a few Final Fours. He would have been successful in any business he would have gotten into.

He has so much confidence in himself and what he does. This game will make you a little bit bitter at times if you let it, and it happens to me. He doesn't let that happen to him. He's just that way. Very positive.

He represents Thoroughbred racing like it should be represented. In horse racing, we cannot give up the class part of it. In that way, he's sort of like the last of the Mohicans. Back in his Quarter Horse days, I saw him take a horse to the gate on his pony wearing a suit. That's something I'll never forget.

I met him within the first two years of his Thoroughbred racing career. We became quick friends and we were even roommates during the winter for a few years in California. He was like a father to me. Like a father, he read me books before I went to bed to

make me a better person. He read me a chapter every night. He was very strict and he taught me a lot of good habits about hard work. He said I don't give money away to people but I will give you the opportunity to make a lot of money.

He did something I had never seen before. His barn was perfect. There was not a piece of straw or hay on the ground. His pony was beautiful. His horses looked perfect. Everything was immaculate. One day I came by his barn at Santa Anita and he had to take a phone call. He said 'take a look around, I'll be right back.' I see this horse, in a stall big enough for two horses and he was knee deep in straw. He had a shiny coat, looked perfect in every way. I said to him I'd like to ride this one. He said to me, 'You've got bad taste. That's my pony.' It was a Quarter Horse pony. I felt so silly. Here I was leading rider in New York and I couldn't tell his pony apart from his horses.

When I look at him, it is like looking at Michael Jordan, Muhammad Ali, someone who is an idol, someone you admire. He is a very talented man and a very positive thinker and I am proud to call him my friend.

Meanwhile Grandpa D. Wayne, who was honored by the industry with an Eclipse Award of Merit in January 2014, is turning 80. He will do it as quietly as possible at Churchill Downs while following the usual routine.

"I'll get up at 3:30 and I'll go out and train my horses," he said. "We're shipping so I'll have to settle the barn. It might be a long day. At some point Laurie and I will run through Wendy's and we'll get some chili and that will do it."

Lukas laughed at the suggestion that he was still going strong because he goes for chili at fast food restaurants. He noted that he has no medical issues and that he comes from a family with a history of reaching old ages. His mother died at 94.

"The thing is I never drank at any time in my life and I've never smoked at all. I think that a good work ethic keeps you active and keeps the juices flowing," he said, before offering less-than serious advice.

"Don't take any vitamins, don't see any doctors, eat a lot of junk food and you'll be great."

SHORT BUT SWEET FIELD OF 2YOs SET AT SPA

A compact field of six juvenile turfners is set to kick off closing week at Saratoga with an intriguing match-up in Wednesday's GII With Anticipation S. Headlined by flashy maiden graduate **Site Read** (Tizdejavu) and newly minted 'TDN Rising Star' **Unbridled Daddy** (Scat Daddy), the race contains no shortage of apparent talent. Owned in partnership by trainer Bill Mott along with Jake Ballis and Rashard Lewis, Site Read made up 12 lengths to win going

away by 4 1/2 in his course-and-distance unveiling July 25. Although the bay was aided by unusually fast early fractions in that maiden event, he closed the final 5/16 of a mile in an impressive :28.82--a turn-of-foot that earned him 2-1 favoritism in this stakes debut. Red Oak Stable homebred Unbridled Daddy, who displayed a similar late-running style to his favored counterpart, draws the outside post in this event. Fourth in his six-panel bow over the Belmont lawn July 19, the colt encountered trouble around the opening bend and uncorked a prolonged rally to get up in deep stretch in a local maiden event going this same distance Aug. 16. The Todd Pletcher trainee retains the services of Irad Ortiz Jr., who holds a 10-win lead in the jockey's standings at the meet. Pletcher saddles another Scat Daddy colt in Alto Racing's **Azar**, who remains a maiden after setting the pace and holding on for place honors behind his stablemate in the common Aug. 16 race. Gary Barber's **Monster Bea** (Hat Trick {Jpn}) has been installed as the 5-2 second choice on the morning line, but the gelding was arguably the longest shot to make it to this event in the first place. Purchased for a meager \$2,000 at Fasig-Tipton October Sale, the bay pulled off an 11-1 trip-and-course shocker for owner and trainer Adam Rice Aug. 8 and was subsequently purchased privately by Barber. Monster Bea recently posted a bullet five-panel breeze in 1:02.02 over the Oklahoma turf course Aug. 26 and figures to make use of his speed from the rail post in this initial start for trainer Mark Casse. Completing the field are Delaware Park maiden graduate **Runaway King** (Run Away and Hide) and Ellis Park shipper **Next Shares** (Archarcharch), who was also purchased by Barber, in partnership with Brous Stable and Wachtel Stable, after a hard-fought runner-up effort in his Aug. 1 career debut.

SEPTEMBER SIRES

There are 249 sires represented by 4,164 yearlings catalogued at Keeneland September, an average of 16.7 per sire. However, 102 sires have fewer than four yearlings catalogued, including 68 sires with just one each. The 147 sires with four or more catalogued average 27 yearlings each and constitute 96% of the catalogue. So those are the names you'll see most. In fact, no fewer than 66 sires have 30 or more yearlings catalogued; they are the sires of 73% of the catalogue, a total of 3,038 yearlings, or an average of 46 per sire.

Young sires attract the numbers; four of the six sires with 60 or more catalogued in the sale are first-crop yearling sires. WinStar's GI Arkansas Derby winner and GI Kentucky Derby and GI Preakness runner-up **Bodemeister** (Empire Maker) has 83 yearlings catalogued, the highest by any sire. Proven sire **Harlan's Holiday**, who also stood at WinStar in 2013 before he

died later that year in Argentina, has 82 catalogued from his final crop of yearlings; and Spendthrift's veteran **Malibu Moon** ranks third by number catalogued throughout the sale, with 71. The three have 85 among them in Book 1, and

151 thereafter, so you'll see plenty by these three sires throughout the sale.

WinStar and Lane's End between them stand all four of the first-year sires with 60+ catalogued. WinStar stands Bodemeister and 2012 GI Wood Memorial winner **Gemologist** (Tiznow), who has 60 catalogued--one in Book 1, and 59 in the 'back books' (Books 2-6). Lane's End stands **The Factor** (65), a dual seven-furlong Grade I winner from War Front's first crop, and **Union Rags** (63), winner of the 2011 GI Champagne S. and the 2012 GI Belmont S. He is by Dixie Union, who has a freshman sire son at Florida's Northwest Stud who is making some noise, Gone Astray. Bodemeister has averaged \$242,333 at the sales so far this year, just ahead of The Factor (\$238,256); Union Rags is number three so far among first-crop yearling sires, with a \$177,454 average (per Instatistics). **cont. p9**

A total of 47 first-year sires have 826 yearlings catalogued--that's 20% of the total--including 14 stallions with 30+ catalogued. Gainesway's **To Honor And Serve** (Bernardini) has 55, and **Tapizar** (Tapit) has 46; Darby Dan's **Shackleford** (Forestry) has 53; and **Hansen** (Tapit) also has 46 catalogued from his season at Ashford before he was sold to stand in South Korea--about which we learned considerably more than we knew before, thanks to Lucas Marquardt's terrific on-the-scene coverage from Seoul last week.

Nine 'freshman' sires with their first 2-year-olds racing, and their second crop of yearlings coming to market, have 30+ yearlings catalogued. In total, 38 F2013 (first foals 2013) sires have a total of 551 yearlings (13% of the catalogue) in the sale. Tops by representation is Castleton Lyons's two-time Eclipse Turf champion **Gio Ponti**, by Tale of the Cat, with 53 catalogued. Spendthrift's GI Secretariat S. winner and GI Kentucky Derby third **Paddy O'Prado**, by El Prado (sire also of Medaglia d'Oro and Kitten's Joy), has 48 in the sale. They don't figure to be particularly early, but he has five winners and is showing some of the right signs at this early stage.

Ashford's champion 2-year-old **Uncle Mo** (Indian Charlie) is North America's leading freshman sire by progeny earnings at this point, with seven winners and two graded black-type winners; he has 46 yearlings catalogued--about half the number he had in this sale last year. The leading North American freshman sire by number of winners is actually Darley's Lonhro, who has been champion sire in Australia, with nine. There are 30 yearlings catalogued from his second North American crop, and you would definitely be encouraged by the results of his first so far to be buying in the second.

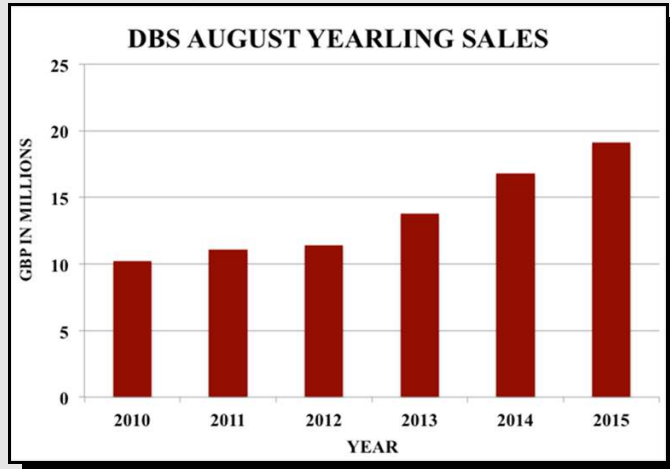
Of the F2012 sires with their first 3-year-olds racing in 2015 and their third crop of yearlings selling, just 24 are represented throughout the catalogue, with a total of 397 yearlings (9.5% of the total). Compare that to 47 F2014 sires with 20% of the yearlings and 38 F2013 sires with 13% of the yearlings and you can see the market gets less and less forgiving as sires have runners. Interesting, though: for the whole sale, 17% of the yearlings (724/4164) are in Book 1. By first-crop yearling sires (F2014), 11% of their yearlings are in Book 1. Only 2% of the yearlings by the 38 sires with their first 2-year-olds (F2013) are in Book 1; that is only 13 yearlings, and seven of those are by Uncle Mo. For sires with their first 3-year-olds (F2012), the percentage is in Book 1 is back up to 8%. The Book 1 emphasis is still squarely on proven sires. **cont. p10**

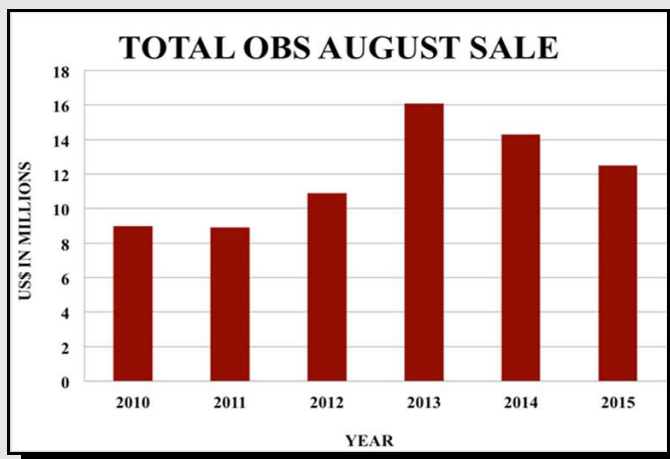

WinStar's **Super Saver**, who had his second Grade I winner of the month in the ultra-impressive Runhappy (Beyer 111) in last Saturday's G1 King's Bishop on a power-packed Saratoga card, now has three Grade I winners and two Grade II winners in his first crop and must be just about the hottest sire in America right now. The next stop for the 9-year-old after Ireland--in what will be the globetrotter's first visit to that country--is likely to be a fifth tilt at the G1 Champion S. at Ascot Oct. 17.

"After Ireland, there's a possibility he could go for the Prix Dollar [at Longchamp Oct. 3], but it's only a Group 2 and he'd have a lot of weight so we may just go straight to Ascot," Barande-Barbe explained. "After that, we'll be going to Dubai in March again and we'll see about Hong Kong, as he's had a long break this year, it might be the time to go."

SUMBAL OUT OF ST LEGER

Qatar Racing's **Sumbal (Ire)** (Danehill Dancer {Ire}), a leading contender for the G1 St Leger Sept. 12 after winning his first three starts earlier this year, has been ruled out of that Doncaster Classic due to injury. Sumbal beat just one home when sixth in Sunday's G2 Grand Prix de Deauville, and trainer Francis Graffard said the colt emerged from that effort with sore withers.

"He probably took a bad step at some stage, which meant when he was in the straight he couldn't stride out," Graffard explained. "It wasn't his true running, which was very disappointing as he's a very nice horse and was in good form going into it. At least something came up that we could blame."

Sumbal's defection leaves 12--six of which are trained by Aidan O'Brien--left in the Leger entries.

AUSTRALIA TIGHTENS INJECTION RULES

Australian racehorses will no longer be permitted to be injected with hypodermic needles "one clear day" before racing, Racing Australia announced Monday. One clear day refers to the 24 hours before the day the horse is scheduled to race, plus the hours preceding competition on raceday. The ban extends to anything requiring a hypodermic needle, from blood tests to vitamin injections.

A release from Racing Australia stated there is no scientific evidence to support the need to inject a horse for health or welfare reasons during this timeframe.

RETIREMENT AND AFTERCARE PROGRAMS EVOLVING, BUT STILL A WORK IN PROGRESS

For trainer Rick Violette, Jr., the realization that the racing industry had a significant problem with Thoroughbred aftercare was distilled in a single afternoon a few years ago in Washington, D.C.

In the aftermath of the Barbaro and Eight Belles tragedies, the United States Congress had convened equine welfare hearings, and the final question from the 20-member panel was “What are you doing about retired racehorses?”

Violette, who serves as president of the New York Thoroughbred Horsemen’s Association, recalled the leaders of numerous racing industry organizations “tripping over themselves, trying to find an answer. And it was embarrassing, there was no question about it.”

After that, Violette concluded, “There was no place to go but up. We were now under a microscope and we were well-deservedly criticized for not

paying attention to what horses had in store for them after they finished racing...You always thought you attended to business well until people shined a light on it.”

At a day-long summit Tuesday on the issue of retired racehorses hosted in Saratoga by the New York State Gaming Commission, a number of other Thoroughbred stakeholders told similar stories about how the industry realized it had an ever-growing welfare problem.

Now, as that acknowledgement and awareness is transitioning through how to effectively address the need for proper racehorse retirement, horsemen, racetracks, regulators, and aftercare coordinators all seem to agree on three key components necessary for continued progress: 1) Sustainable funding; 2) The growth of accredited rehabilitation, retraining and re-homing facilities, and 3) The creation of demand in the general public for second-career Thoroughbreds.

“Start with the wellness of the horse. All the rest of it will fall into place. And I think the whole industry can take that as an example of really getting down to the nuts and bolts of it,” said trainer Richard Schosberg, who oversees the Take The Lead retirement program, which over the past several years has found new homes for nearly 150 horses retiring from New York Racing Association tracks.

Many speakers at Tuesday’s four panel discussions admitted that Thoroughbred aftercare has been a trial-and-error endeavor. There was also an acknowledgement of the need for national, regional, and local approaches to racehorse retirement, because a program that is effective at, for example, Finger Lakes in upstate New York might not work so well at Del Mar in southern California.

“I don’t want to say there is nothing but good news, because this is a moving target,” said Violette. “We try to get better every day, we know there’s a lot of work to do. But from where we were then to now, it’s an unrecognizable form of progress.”

Funding--referred at several points during the day as aftercare’s “F-word”--was, to no one’s surprise, the dominant theme.

Charitable donations from individuals and organizations. Per-start fees. Voluntary and mandatory “check off” fees collected at various points of a horse’s registration and an individual’s racing licensure. Micro-payments generated from horse auctions and stallion fees. Matching funds from horsemen’s groups and racetracks. All of these options are currently being used to pay for aftercare, but there was no clear consensus on which blend of funding should evolve as the industry standard.

“I do believe that as owners, we are the primary source to go to,” said Madeline Auerbach, a Thoroughbred owner and California Horse Racing Board commissioner. “I’m not saying we’re the only source, but if we aren’t willing to take care of the horses, then who do we expect to help us?”

Diana Pikulski, the director of external affairs for the Thoroughbred Retirement Foundation (TRF), said people from outside the racing industry often ask her, “Why do you have to have charity to take care of these horses? Why isn’t it just part of the industry?...Why, when you have so much going on in terms of your charitable efforts, [are there] still horses falling through the cracks and still so many Thoroughbreds going to slaughter?”

Violette offered a different take on charitable contributions.

“In this industry we tend to keep going to the same people for a handout, the same very philanthropic people,” said Violette. “And you wear out people. While we still have to go there, we [also] have to find some standardized funding.”

Violette and Auerbach agreed on the part about horsemen stepping to the forefront with money, but Violette stressed that racing associations also need to do their part, both in terms of instituting programs at their tracks and in contributing funds.

“Racetracks have been a little slow, they’re catching up. Keeneland and Churchill broke through and I think that will start a number of ‘dominoes,’” Violette said. “Frank Stronach’s been great. [The Stronach Group tracks] have been a little ahead of the curve with their retirement programs.”

Regardless of where the money comes from, one point was hammered home by the panelists: The success of aftercare programs has created a self-fulfilling cycle that is increasing the need for even more accredited retraining and placement organizations.

“As the pressure becomes more and more to do the right thing by these horses, a greater number of horses are coming into the program,” said Parx director of racing Sam Elliott. “It just keeps coming.” **Cont. p2**

But, as Elliott pointed out, there seems to be increasing recognition on the part of horsemen that they must proactively map out plans of retirement before there is a dire need to have horses rescued. The Turning For Home program at Parx, he said, retired 220 horses last year.

“We’ve raised the consciousness of the horsemen wanting to turn these horses over in better shape,” said Elliott. “They’re no good to anybody if they’re all broke down.”

Erin Crady, the executive director for Thoroughbred Charities of America, said she encourages potential new owners of racehorses to build retirement costs into their budgets, in part so that horses aren’t forced to race despite infirmities because the owners need the money.

“If you make every effort to retire that horse when he’s sound, you’re going to give him the best chance for that second career,” Crady said.

Elliott said that although it is not fair to compare the scale of financing of the two jurisdictions, a noble goal for U.S. racing might be the Hong Kong Jockey Club model, in which owners are required to pay a substantial up-front fee when a horse begins racing. That money then gets escrowed for the Thoroughbred’s eventual retirement.

Several initiatives introduced over the past several years have been aimed at increasing the demand for Thoroughbreds in other equestrian disciplines. The TAKE2 program, for example, contributes prize money for Thoroughbred-only divisions at more than 200 horse shows nationwide as a way of creating an incentive for people to retrain ex-racehorses for other forms of competition.

Violette explained that for the previous several decades, Thoroughbreds had “a big red X against them” in the equestrian world, with a reputation for being too difficult to handle and/or retrain. Thanks to programs like TAKE2, he said, “once again the Thoroughbred is kind of on the wanted list in the horse show arena.”

Even horses whose physical limitations keep them confined to paddocks can have useful second careers in the ever-growing sector of equine therapy. Examples of this are inmate rehabilitation programs at prisons, like those pioneered by TRF.

Pikulski said TRF is planning on expanding its outreach to other types of equine therapy, like those that use horses to help physically and developmentally challenged children and adults.

“It’s great for horses that are not sound enough for riding that the conversation has changed from ‘Where are we going to turn him out for the rest of his life?’ to ‘Where are we going to put him so he can be a therapy horse?’” Pikulski said.

TEXAS RACING FACES SHUTDOWN

The three Thoroughbred racetracks in Texas received a directive to cease operations from the Texas Racing Commission overnight Monday after the Legislative Board of the state Senate did not authorize funds to the industry prior to a midnight deadline. The decision came on the heels of the Commission’s vote to permit historical race wagering machines, a hotly debated form of pari-mutuel wagering.

“After an entire summer with the cloud of a shutdown hanging over the industry’s head, I am bewildered that certain members of the Texas Senate appear to have blocked the release of essential funds to the Texas Racing Commission,” said Andrea B. Young, President of Sam Houston Race Park in a statement. “We thank our friends in the Legislature and

other branches of government who have fought to protect the Texas racing industry and the hard-working individuals it employs.”

Young highlighted the potential job loss associated with a prolonged closure of racing in the state, calling upon state legislators to take action.

“The legislature did not intend this result, which will now shutter Texas racing facilities, putting thousands of jobs at risk,” she continued. “We believe that this result is irresponsible. We urge the Lieutenant Governor to stand up for 36,000 jobs now before this goes any further. In the meantime, we will continue to examine our legal options. We plan to continue our fight for all the hardworking Texans that make up the Texas Horse industry.”

Retama Park, which is the only track in Texas currently conducting a race meet, remained open for training Tuesday morning with all impending live racing and simulcast events cancelled. Lone Star Park, scheduled to begin a Quarter Horse meet Sept. 18, likewise has put racing operations on hold.

CTT Pledge \$150,000 to Race Day Surveillance:

California Thoroughbred Trainers has voted to utilize \$150,000 from its reserves to put towards race-day camera surveillance and a new security program for tracks in California. “While CTT has supported proper third party or independently supervised race day administration of Lasix since 2011, and continues to do so, we have always pointed out that backstretch security must be tightened at the same time,” said CTT president James Cassidy. “Administering Lasix takes a few minutes, at most. What we really need is to take steps to be sure nothing improper happens with any horse during all the many hours the rest of race day, not only when Lasix is administered.”

“Any perception that the trainers’ governing organization is tolerant of misbehavior or outright cheating has to end,” stated Alan F. Balch, executive director of CTT. “Unfortunately, that perception has been fostered, whether or not intentionally, by some regulatory officials and others through gratuitous comments about Lasix and its administration. We want to put a stop to that by tackling the problem properly, not only as to Lasix administration itself, but even more important, by monitoring everything that goes on in the stalls of all horses entered on race day.”

Our tracks are proud to join the Coalition and we hope that our participation will help broaden these positive reforms to encompass Standardbred horseracing. The implementation of uniform policies throughout the U.S. and an industry-based, non-governmental solution will only help us grow the popularity and credibility of the sport and ultimately establish a level playing field across the board.”

EXTORTIONIST DIES

Sheikh Suhaim Al Thani's 4-year-old **Extortionist (Ire)** (Dandy Man {Ire}) has been euthanized after unsuccessful operations to repair an injury sustained in training. Extortionist became the first Royal Ascot winner for young trainer Olly Stevens--who recently announced his plans to retire at the end of the season--when he took the Listed Windsor Castle S. in 2013,
