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NOT EVEN 'CLOSE' IN MOTHER GOOSE

While the Belmont bettors had virtually handed yesterday's GI Mother Goose S. to 1-5 shot **Dreaming of Julia** (A.P. Indy), it was another **"TDN Rising Star"** in the form of Juddmonte colorbearer **Close Hatches** (First Defence) who would break through at the highest level with a resounding 7 1/4-length success from the dull favorite. Ground-saving **Marathon Lady** (Graeme Hall) was third. "She exploded nicely," Hall of Fame conditioner Bill Mott said of the winner, who was most recently second in this venue's GI Acorn S. May 27. "She was doing very well--she only ran 3 1/2 weeks ago, but she came out

of it extremely well. She looked good, her color was good, [and] I think she actually put on a little weight since then. It's one of those things that's hard to explain, why all of a sudden they start to really round into form. She was good before, but she really went into this one very nicely." Todd Pletcher offered of the beaten favorite, "She was never herself, it didn't look like. I don't know if she was kind of stuck in between horses, never really found a seam. I thought she ran very gutsy to get up for second when clearly she didn't run her race." **Cont. p3**

TOUR DE FORCE

Alan Craddock's **Lethal Force (Ire)** (Dark Angel {Ire}) may have gone largely unnoticed prior to yesterday's G1 Diamond Jubilee S., but all eyes were trained on him alone at the end of Royal Ascot's newest Group 1 race as he powered to a two-length success from **Society Rock (Ire)** (Rock of Gibraltar {Ire}). Sent off at 11-1 as a result of his second to that rival in the May 15 G2 Duke of York S., the grey was soon in front of the stand's-side group as Adam Kirby was keen to keep something in reserve. Pulling gradually clear from halfway, he was gone beyond recall by the time Society Rock emerged from rear. "He's special--we always hoped he was, and Adam is such a brilliant rider," trainer Clive Cox commented. "He was having a blow there in front and, when he sent him, he was explosive. This is what it's all about." **Cont. p4**

TRAGIC ENDING TO HARDWICKE

In a dramatic and ultimately tragic renewal of the G2 Hardwicke S. yesterday at Royal Ascot, the cruellest cut of all came when **Thomas Chippendale (Ire)** (Dansili {GB}) collapsed and died soon after crossing the line first. In a race already marred by the early-race slip of the leader 9-4 favorite **Ekhtihaam (Ire)** (Invincible Spirit {Ire}) to unseat Paul Hanagan, last year's G2 King Edward VII S. winner, who hails from the Warren Place stable already touched by immense sadness last week, had just completed his winning exploits when suffering a suspected heart attack. **Cont. p5**

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NOT EVEN 'CLOSE' cont. from p1

Close Hatches opened her account with a seven-length off-the-pace romp in an extended Gulfstream sprint Jan. 26, and followed with a facile gate-to-wire allowance tally when stretched out to this trip in Florida Mar. 10. She handed Princess of Sylmar (Majestic Warrior) a 3 1/4-length defeat in the Big A's GII Gazelle S., but simply never showed up when seventh behind that familiar foe in the May 3 GI Kentucky Oaks.

Dreaming of Julia, meanwhile, the Oaks winner's stablemate and the 3-2 favorite off an other-worldly 21 3/4-length romp in the GII Gulfstream Park Oaks, could only muster a fourth-place run after a rough start. Close Hatches bounced back mildly to finish a well-beaten second to fellow ☆ **"Rising Star"** ☆ Midnight Lucky (Midnight Lute) here last time May 27 and was getting an additional sixteenth of a mile to work with here.

Taken a strong hold of by Joel Rosario to sit in fourth of five in the early going, Close Hatches came alongside the favorite entering the turn. That foe came off the rail, allowing Marathon Lady to take a foothold inside of those two, at which point Rosario gave his mount her cue and she quickly picked off pressing Sister State (A.P. Indy) and set her sights on the leading Toasting (Congrats). Dreaming of Julia, meanwhile, came under a busy ride and failed to respond, dropping back to last. Close Hatches blew the race wide open leaving the bend, and cruised home unchallenged with the favorite only getting uncorked late to snag second.

"By the time we got to the middle of the turn, it looked like we got first run on [Dreaming of Julia]," Mott added. "At the three-eighths pole, we're breezing to the lead. It looked pretty good from there." Mott, whose trainee Royal Delta (Empire Maker) earned 2011 champion 3-year-old filly honors at the end of a year in which members of that division took turns beating each other, added, "It's way too early to start talking about [championships] right now. There are some good fillies out there. I think it will all probably come down to who beats the older girls later in the year. A lot is decided October-November time."

Of what could be next, Mott said, "Now, she's got the Grade I. There's no gun at our head to do anything. We'll wait until she's ready again. Right now, we'll try to keep her with her own age group, I suppose. [The GI Coaching Club American Oaks at Saratoga July 20] is something to consider. If she's doing as well as she was going into today, we'll have to give it strong consideration."

Close Hatches is the first Grade I winner for her second-crop sire (by Unbridled's Song), who stands at Khalid Abdullah's Lexington, KY farm. He took the 2008 GI Forego S. for Juddmonte and the late Bobby Frankel.

Rider John Velazquez said of Dreaming of Julia's run, "She was never comfortable, and I was between horses. I tried to keep my position. They go to the half-mile pole, and the hole is that big. I tried to get there before it closes, and she didn't take it. Sure enough, the hole closed and we're back to last. Nothing you can do. She wasn't comfortable between horses, and I think she got shy from the time before when she got squeezed in the Oaks. Now she's between horses and getting shy in there. It's hard for her to get in there, and she didn't want to take it at all. That was it."

Lethal Force had enough inherent ability at two to finish fourth in the G2 Coventry S. over this track and trip and at this meeting, and followed that with a same placing in the seven-furlong G2 Vintage S. at Goodwood a month later. Second in the Listed Carnarvon S. at Newbury last May and third in the Listed Sandy Lane S. at Haydock in June, he returned to this meeting to be fourth in the G3 Jersey S. upped to seven again before getting turned over in a seven-furlong conditions event back at Haydock in July. That preceded a career-best win in first-time blinkers in the G3 Hungerford S. at Newbury in August, where his all-the-way success was put down to having stolen the race, and he was unable to back that up when third in the G2 Park S. at Doncaster the following month. Only 10th in the G1 Prix de la Foret at Longchamp in October, the free-runner returned this term to be beaten a head by Society Rock when in receipt of five pounds from that rival in the Duke of York.

Always traveling with purpose on the front end while keeping something important back for Kirby, he began to turn the screw before the quarter pole, which was too much for the Australian raider **Sea Siren (Aus)** (Fastnet Rock {Aus}) and, despite veering left when in the clear, was never in any danger of being reeled back.

"He did so well over the winter and has strengthened a lot," Clive Cox added. "That run at York blew the cobwebs away and Society Rock was better off today, but he really came forward from there. He was in a really good place and that was born out in the performance. He was a little bit of a slow-learner to start with, so we included the blinkers. He's more mature now, so we've taken those off and we have a few things to think about. He doesn't like the ground really soft and he's in the G1 July Cup [at Newmarket July 13], but although he's never run there I'm not sure it will be his strongest course."

Trainer James Fanshawe was not too despondent after Society Rock had finished second again in the race he also won two years ago. "I'm delighted with the horse, because he's really behaving well in the stalls now and ran a very good race. He's so consistent now and I hope we meet up a few more times this year. He doesn't seem to take so much out of himself now, so hopefully he'll be right for the July Cup in three weeks' time."

Sea Siren will join Aidan O'Brien after her eighth-place finish. Trainer John O'Shea commented, "She got a bit tired up the run-in. It is a learning experience, as she is probably saying she has had enough--she had a hard run in Brisbane and then the trip up here. It has been worthwhile coming and we are happy with the way that she has done since she has been here. I think it is a very doable thing if you get your horse to the right stage of his preparation. It would be wonderful to win here. We have just got to find five or six lengths. She is going to Aidan on Monday night, so I just had a chat with him to help him get a feel for her."

Nurtured by his late trainer to win at this meeting on just his fifth start in 2012, the dark bay had failed to build on that effort thereafter, but had come into this contest on the back of second placings to Al Kazeem (GB) (Dubawi {Ire}) in the 10-furlong G3 Gordon Richards S. at Sandown Apr. 27, and to Ektihaam in the Listed Buckhounds S. over this track and trip

May 11. Keen early towards the rear as the latter set off in isolation, he was able to move onto the heels of Universal--who had been left in front when Hanagan lost touch with the leader as he slipped on the rain-slicked surface just under

a mile from home--soon after turning for home. In front with Noble Mission (GB) (Galileo {Ire}) in closest pursuit with 1 1/2 furlongs remaining, he stayed on strongly as that stable companion faded late on and was able to hold Dandino's spirited challenge before his shocking demise. For jockey Johnny Murtagh, the outcome came as a blow and he was quick to express his sadness. "It's heartbreaking for everyone involved," he said. "I got a lovely run and my horse has won well, but I'm devastated at the way it's finished. Pulling up by the line I just felt him give a little shimmy, so I jumped off him and he lost his balance and collapsed."

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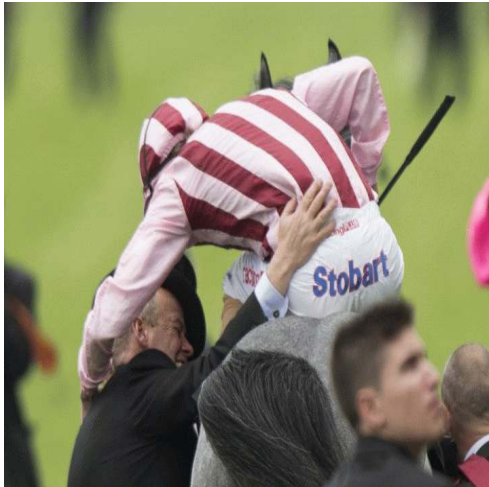

Owner Sir Robert Ogden's Racing Manager Barry Simpson paid tribute to the career of the stricken winner afterwards. "He was such a consistent horse, his form was in the book, and although I was disappointed when he was beaten by Al Kazeem, that horse has won two big races since," he told *PA Sport*. Lady Cecil paid tribute as well, adding, "Leading up to the race he was in such good form and really enjoying himself. When [groom] Luis [Villarreal] took him out for a pick of grass he was always the last one who wanted to come back in. He was doing what he enjoyed and loved doing and so it's heartbreaking. We couldn't have been happier with him beforehand and he could not have won like that if he had not been a happy, sound horse. We're devastated for Luis and very sad for Sir Robert, who was looking forward to this day very much. It's so awful to go from one emotion to another, from a high to a low. It's puts such a dampener on the day. My heart is pounding, but we have to carry on." His groom summed up the general mood among the team when saying, "It has been so emotional for us, with Riposte winning the Ribblesdale the other day and it's very hard for us and the whole team, but we are still strong and we are going to keep working. These things happen in the sport but we have to carry on, keep fighting and do our best. That's what we are here for."

Winless--and out of the top three--since a Delaware optional claiming score last July 4, London Lane picked a good time to return to winning ways, especially for those who managed to smoke him out at 50-1. Or, perhaps more realistically, decided to hit the 'all' button. Fourth in a pair of stakes at Delaware last July and September, respectively, the homebred was eighth in the Laurel Turf Cup in October and sent to the bench following a distant last-place run in the Jennings H. for Maryland-breds on the Laurel main track in December. His lone run this year was a very late-on-the-scene, but close enough, sixth in a grassy one-mile allowance at Pimlico Apr. 28. Dropping back to caboose the field at the start, the rank outsider stalked in second-to-last as Hyper was yanked back into the first turn. London Lane did not appear to be firing approaching the straight as he was relegated again to the back, but pilot Horacio Karamanos was persistent and swung his mount out into the center of the course for a bid. The chestnut responded, and out-kicked Hyper and pacesetter Swift Warrior late to blow up the tote.

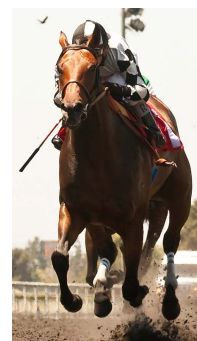

There was no hard time to be done here, as the odds-on chalk controlled things from the outset and never looked back. Never off the board in four starts as a juvenile, Doinghardtimeagain capped off her 2012 season with a first black-type success in this venue's restricted seven-panel Soviet Problem S. in December. The Tommy Town Thoroughbreds homebred disappointed when fourth as the favorite in Santa Anita's California Breeders' Champion S. in January, but handled the switch to turf and open company to be second in the Sweet Life S. down the hill Feb. 16. She returned to the main track and Cal-bred ranks to annex the Evening Jewel S. going 6 1/2 panels in Arcadia Mar. 30, and hadn't been seen since a track-and-trip score in the restricted Apr. 27 Melair S. Well-backed on the tote with four straight bullet works on display, the dark bay seized command early from her rail draw, posting splits of :23.93, :47.78 and 1:11.77 with Ondine providing only token pressure. lotapa ranged up three wide with an ominous bid on the turn for home, but the pacesetter found another gear, and cruised home to win decisively. "We thought we had the best horse and so we used our speed," said winning trainer Jerry Hollendorfer, who took this race in 2006 with Hystericalady (Distorted Humor). "When they came to us, fortunately she was able to hold them off. She does everything on her own. We don't urge her to do anything in the morning. I don't bullet work my horses, so whenever anyone sees any of our horses with bullet works, they did it on their own." As for what could be next for the winner, Hollendorfer said he would consider the July 13 GII Delaware Oaks, which he annexed three years ago with Blind Luck (Pollard's Vision). Tom and Debi Stull's Tommy Town Thoroughbreds stands the winners sire at their Santa Ynez, CA farm.

CIRRUS RETURNS

It has been a long time coming, with much water under the bridge since his last racecourse appearance, but Jean-Claude-Alain Dupouy's **Cirrus des Aigles (Fr)** (Even Top {Ire}) is back to remind all who is boss in today's G1 Grand Prix de Saint-Cloud, a "Win and You're In" event for the G1 Breeders' Cup Turf. His last outing resulted in a defeat, but ironically may have been his finest hour as he pushed Frankel (GB) (Galileo {Ire}) further out of his comfort zone than any other in Ascot's G1 Champion S. in October. Having announced his presence on the international stage when annexing the inaugural renewal of that prize, Corine Barande-Barbe's beloved veteran also added the G1 Dubai Sheema Classic and G1 Prix Ganay to his tally last term, and provided he is near that type of shape he will be tough to live with here. "It's his first time out this year, but he's well enough for his first run," his trainer told *PA Sport*. "I think he will come on for the race and get better and better. He went to Hong Kong in December and twisted something when he put his leg in a hole. We have had a lot of rain this week. The going will be soft and he likes that." While likely to offer no serious threat to the favorite, the German raider **Novellist (Ire)** (Monsun {Ger}) commands respect coming into this test having won the G1 Gran Premio del Jockey Club Italiano at the San Siro in October, and the May 12 G2 Grosser Preis der Badischen Unternehmer over 11 furlongs on his return. Pearl Bloodstock's admirable **Dunaden (Fr)** (Nicobar {GB}) has yet to win at the top level in Europe, but has been knocking on the door for a while, and chased home the unstoppable **St Nicholas Abbey (Ire)** (Montjeu {Ire}) in that horse's favorite race, the G1 Coronation Cup at Epsom June 1.

CLASH OF THE TITANS

Today's G1 Takarazuka Kinen, a Breeders' Cup "Win and You're In" qualifier for the G1 Breeders' Cup Turf, lost some of its luster with the withdrawal of 2011 Japanese Triple Crown winner Orfevre (Jpn) (Stay Gold {Jpn}) last week, but still maintains plenty of appeal as the highly anticipated showdown of reigning Horse of the Year **Gentildonna (Jpn)** (Deep Impact {Jpn}) and three-time Group 1 winner **Gold Ship (Jpn)** (Stay Gold {Jpn}). Gentildonna kicked off a five-race win streak--including a clean sweep of her country's Triple Tiara--in last year's G1 Japanese 1000 Guineas over this track, and capped her championship season with a gritty nose victory over Orfevre in the G1 Japan Cup over that same distance. She was last seen finishing a respectable second as the favorite in the G1 Dubai Sheema Classic in her seasonal debut Mar. 30. Trainer Sei Ishizaka noted that the 4-year-old exited that effort in good form. "She's come along according to plan and I have no worries whatsoever about her condition," he said. No matter what the conditions are, she always puts in a good race. She really has her act together." Last year's G1 Japanese 2000 Guineas winner Gold Ship could manage only fifth in the G1 Japanese Derby, but proved longer distances to be well within his scope when winning the 1 1/2-mile G2 Kobe Shimbun Hai next out, followed by the 1 7/8-mile G1 Japanese St. Leger and the 1 9/16 mile-G1 Arima Kinen to wrap up the season. He took the G2 Hanshin Daishoten here in his season debut Mar. 17, and was most recently fifth in the G1 Tenno Sho Spring Apr. 28. His trainer, Naosuke Sugai, chalked that defeat down to a fast track and a wide trip. "We gave him a short rest after his last race just to refresh him and then brought him back into training May 23," Sugai noted. "We did some gate practice, and one week out we worked him up the hill and checked his responses in the finish. On the weekend, we worked him on the flat. I have no complaints about his work and I think I can say his condition is perfect." **Fenomeno (Jpn)** (Stay Gold {Jpn}) and **Tosen Ra (Jpn)** (Deep Impact {Jpn}) also command respect off their 1-2 finish in the Tenno Sho Spring.

Her performance in that May 31 Classic represented an improvement on her prior third in Newbury's Listed Swettenham Stud Fillies' Trial May 17, and Lady Bamford's homebred is on the upgrade. "She's got her ground, her optimum trip, and we think the track will suit her as well, so hopefully she should run well," trainer Michael Bell told *PA Sport*. Recently acquired by Sheikh Mohammed bin Khalifa Al Thani, the Apr. 16 G3 Prix Penelope scorer **Ferevia (Ire)** (Motivator {GB}) was third in the G1 Prix Saint-Alary at Longchamp last time May 26, and sets the form standard while Philippe Demercastel's **Eleuthera (Fr)** (Spirit One {Fr}) is another who boasts solid winning form. She registered a first Pattern-race success in Chantilly's G2 Prix de Royaumont last time June 2, where **Orion Love (GB)** (Zamindar) was 1 1/2 lengths back in second. One who is unexposed at this level is the Wildenstein homebred **Pacific Rim (Ire)** (Singspiel {Ire}), but she looked a promising type when taking conditions event at Longchamp last time June 10.

Mile Approach for Dawn...

Jim Bolger yesterday outlined immediate targets for **Dawn Approach (Ire)** (New Approach {Ire}), with the colt set to stay at a mile for either the G1 Sussex S. or G1 Prix Jacques la Marois. Following the hard-fought success of the ☆ **"TDN Rising Star"** ☆ in Tuesday's G1 St James's Palace S. at Royal Ascot, he is reported to have emerged with no issues and is likely to be seen again at Goodwood July 31. "He's very well and I'm told this morning he's bucking and squealing, so he'll pick up quickly," his trainer said. "He's entered in Goodwood, there'll be the Jacques le Marois [at Deauville Aug. 11] as well and then there's back here [at Ascot] for the [Oct. 19] G1 Queen Elizabeth II S., so we'll be picking from them."

Wise Dan Works for Firecracker...

Morton Fink's defending Horse of the Year **Wise Dan** (Wiseman's Ferry) fired a four-furlong bullet in :46.20 at Keeneland yesterday as he eyes a tilt at next Saturday's GII Firecracker H. on the Churchill Downs turf. "He worked really easily and went in hand without being asked to do too much," trainer Charlie LoPresti said. "He's doing as well as I could ask." Wise Dan was assigned 128-pound highweight for the Firecracker--eight pounds more than the next-highest likely starter--by Churchill's racing secretary Ben Huffman. "The plan is still to go to the Firecracker, but I'll need to discuss the weights with Mr. Fink," LoPresti noted.

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ASCOT REFLECT ON EMOTIVE WEEK

Charles Barnett, Chief Executive at Ascot, gave his own summation of a meeting that was marked by dramatic highs and lows, with The Queen's G1 Gold Cup victory and that of the Lady Cecil representative Riposte (GB) (Dansili {GB}) in the G2 Ribblesdale S. marred by yesterday's death of Thomas Chippendale (GB) (Dansili {GB}) after the G2 Hardwicke S. "It has been a remarkable, memorable and truly emotional week at Royal Ascot," he said. "Those here on Thursday to witness The Queen's win with Estimate (Ire) (Monsun {Ger}) in the Gold Cup, which directly followed Riposte's win for Lady Cecil, were present at one of the most special days British sport has seen. The quality of racing over the week is always unsurpassed, as illustrated by both Guineas winners following up in the St James's Palace S. and Coronation S. As ever, this has been an international week with a third win for American trainer Wesley Ward the high point, through No Nay Never (Scat Daddy) in the [G2] Norfolk S. Shea Shea (SAf) (National Emblem {SAf}) came very close to a first for South Africa in the [G1] King's Stand S. To have Kentucky Derby winner Animal Kingdom (Leroidesanimaux {Brz}) at the meeting was very exciting, even if he was unable to show his form on his final run before retirement." He continued, "Attendances have been very pleasing over the week, with increases every day apart from today primarily because the Silver Ring capacity has been reduced from 24,000 to 20,000 with comfort in mind. Even with the Silver Ring capped we have still broadly matched last year's attendance. Royal Ascot is always Flat racing's showcase event and I hope that everyone who has visited or watched Channel 4's excellent first production of the meeting, or indeed listened to BBC Radio Five Live's extensive coverage, has enjoyed this unique week."

Irish Pair Rule of the Roost...

After a meeting in which Irish-trained runners equaled the country's previous record of eight successes, Aidan O'Brien and Johnny Murtagh added to the honor roll by securing the leading trainer and jockey titles with four winners each. The latter, who has recently taken out a trainer's licence, took the QIPCO Top Jockey Award from Joseph O'Brien, Ryan Moore and James Doyle on three apiece. "It's absolutely terrific and I didn't think it would happen at the start of the week," Murtagh said. "I had a few nice rides, but not enough of them, although things fell into place. Getting a double on day one gave me a great start, and then to complete it today with a winner for Lady Cecil, made it all very special. It's very competitive out there and the races are very fast and very true--the best horse will always win and I was on some nice horses. It's the biggest meeting of all, so to win the title is wonderful. As a jockey I'm as hungry as ever--I'm really enjoying it and perhaps a bit more relaxed. Maybe the horses sense that. I would never doubt myself--I know what I can do, my record is there and I never try to do anything special. It might be a big day and some people might try and do a bit more, but no, the simpler I keep it the better the results. Maybe I'm getting a bit wiser as I get older." Reflecting on the impact his new role might have on his riding, he added, "I'll be traveling over [to Britain] when I'm needed. People may be looking from the outside thinking 'He's lost the hunger,' but I haven't. I'm still Johnny Murtagh the jockey, and the training career is there when the jockey's career dries up. At the start of the week I had two rides the first day and one for the rest of the week, and I was thinking maybe they have forgotten me, but things got going and, after this week maybe they will realize I'm still as keen as ever. The highlight has to be Sole Power for Eddie Lynam in the G1 King's Stand S. and, I don't like saying it, finishing second in the Gold Cup [on Simenon behind The Queen's Estimate] was devastating, but a great result."

SINGING AROUND THE BANDSTAND

Apart from having a picnic, the other favorite pastime of the English is singing. Every village seems to have at least a choir, an amateur operatic group or a musical society, and one only needs to watch Britain's Got Talent to see just how popular singing in its various forms is. Royal Ascot is no different. Every evening at 6 p.m., after the last race has been run and winning bets have been collected, thousands of racegoers gather around the Bandstand to belt out popular tunes.

The tradition of singing around the Bandstand dates back to 1970, when Jinny Beaumont, the late wife of then Clerk of the Course Sir Nicholas Beaumont, decided that a singalong will be a great way to end a wonderful day's racing. Interestingly, Mrs Beaumont was deaf, but she simply loved singing despite not being able to hold a tune. The medley of British favorites played that day was an instant hit, and soon the event became a regular occurrence. The much-loved singalong grew each year, with much flag waving and lusty singing as the crowd belted out tune after tune. Nowadays, thousands of racegoers in the Royal Enclosure and the Grandstand Admission Area stay behind to join in. Making life easier for those of us who are not quite familiar with all the tunes, songbooks and Union Jack flags are handed out on a first come, first served basis. For the unlucky ones who arrive late, though, modern technology has come to the rescue, as the words of the songs are prominently displayed on the large screens

around the course. Classics such as *Rule Britannia*, *You'll Never Walk Alone*, *Daisy Daisy* and *We'll Meet Again* are yearly favorites of the assembled crowd. The beautifully dressed Band of the Welsh Guards in their red and black uniforms with striking gold braid provide the music.

Lt. Colonel Stephen Barnwell is the director.

Ok, so now you have the background and the public relations spiel. It all sounded rather mundane and twee, so I decided to stop frantically filing stories after the last and to attend the Singalong for the first time. The reality was far from mundane and actually rather extraordinary.

The weather had been extremely dreary all day, with brief patches of sun followed by heavy downpours, while an icy wind blew throughout. It was certainly not singing weather, and with the temperature having dropped into single digits, I was fully expecting to see only a handful of people huddled around the bandstand. The sensible thing was, of course, to hurry home to that warm log fire.

I should have remembered, that this is a nation that wears skimpy, frilly dresses when it is five degrees, a nation made of sterner stuff.

The bandstand area was packed to the rafters with flag waving, top hat wearing gentlemen and ladies in summer frocks. There literally wasn't room for a mouse. With every available place taken, the crowd spilled over into the stairwells, standing three deep along the railings and even climbing the Betfair Tower for a better view. I had

to follow suit. There simply was no other way to get a photo of this extraordinary event. Having climbed to the sixth floor landing, I finally secured a spot with a good view. The sight that greeted me was unreal; a sea of flag waving, dancing people stretching out as far as the eye can see. In the center, on a raised bandstand, the Band of the Welsh Guards is playing tune after popular tune.

Rule Britannia stirs the blood of the crowd, and the volume increases in decibels. With the crowd in full cry, the band changes tack and *Daydream Believer* comes floating over the crowd, together with some hats that the by now howling gale has sent flying. *Auld Lang Syne* is up next, and the reaction is universal. Despite being tightly packed, the crowd still manage to link arms, form squashed little circles and sway from side to side as they belt out the old classic.

Each time the band reaches a chorus, the volume increases again as the stragglers, who may not know all the words, certainly know the choruses. The signing is infectious and before long, I find myself joining in, standing in a stairwell, six stories high, on the last day of Royal Ascot belting out *Hey Jude*. All too soon, though, it is over. The crowd thins, with only the diehards remaining, determined to finish that last drink before heading to the station. As I leave my windswept stairwell and make my way down to the warmer climates of the pressroom, I find myself quietly humming *Hey Jude*. The singalong is catching, it is extraordinary, and I for one will most certainly be there next year, packed in like a sardine, dressed like an Eskimo and belting out those favorite tunes to my heart's content.

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'RACE HORSE IS NOT A DIAGNOSIS': THE PATH FORWARD

It takes a lot to shock a regulatory veterinarian of 25 years. But that's how Dr. Mary Scollay felt last October after Kentucky switched from private vets to state-employed ones for the administration of Lasix on race day. Scollay, the equine medical director of the Bluegrass State, said she soon learned that something as simple as giving a routine shot with the authorized dosage had been regularly abused by trainers and their vets.

After the change, the concentration of Lasix in post-race samples dropped 30 percent – a significant difference, Scollay said. This meant that private vets had been giving Lasix “darn near an hour closer to the race” previously, she said. “The rule was not being consistently followed.” And these were the tests of winners – knowing that Lasix moves up a horse, had they gained an extra advantage?

The samples were not the only evidence of deeply-rooted misconduct Scollay said she found. On their rounds, state vets received other illegitimate requests. “We’d have trainers ask if we could give it in the muscle,” said Scollay, even though administration is only allowed jugular. “We’d also have trainers ask for other drugs. That is not permitted.”

“It raised questions as to what degree of compliance there had been with the rules prior to state regulation,” she concluded. “It opened my eyes.”

Many in the industry believe the path to a cleaner sport begins here: getting private-practicing vets out of the stalls on race day.

Besides the volume of Lasix, murkier drugs largely disappeared from post-race tests. Scollay said she had seen evidence that a drug called GABA, short for gamma-

aminobutyric acid, was commonplace in Kentucky. The amino acid, which is present in the supplement “Carolina Gold,” is endogenous to horses as well as humans – it’s the

predominant receptor blocker in the central nervous system. It has a pain-mitigating and calming effect that can conserve a horse’s energy prior to a race. However, because it’s naturally occurring and leaves a horse’s system within three to four hours, finding suspicious levels in post-race tests is difficult.

Its use in Kentucky was apparently curtailed once regulatory vets came in. The “noise” in post-

race samples all but departed. Lasix is administered within four hours of a race; private vets were apparently giving GABA at the same time. There was no trace. GABA doesn’t specifically appear in the Uniform Classification Guidelines for Foreign substances, which means that, under RCI guidelines, it should be treated as a Class 1 violation unless otherwise advised.

Kentucky horsemen had bitterly contested the change to state regulation. It only came into practice

after an overriding vote from Governor Steve Beshear. Scollay now believes the reasons for the fight are clear. "It really wasn't about Lasix," but all this other stuff," she said. (The president of the Kentucky HBPA did not return several messages seeking comment.)

Many in the industry believe the path to a cleaner sport begins here: getting private-practicing vets out of the stalls on race day. "When you look at it honestly, it's a bit of an indictment of the veterinary profession," said Dr. Ken Quirk, the equine medical director of the Texas Racing Commission.

New York and Delaware also have state administration of Lasix; Minnesota has a state official supervise, Penn National has an association veterinarian administer it, and Monmouth Park recently hired a private company to do so. California and Maryland are in the process of joining them. The rest of the country lags, according to a

survey of state racing commissions.

That trainers and vets were eager to get ever more substances into a horse hours prior to a race counters the idea that permissive medication is intended to provide therapy to a horse. It only reinforces the belief that a win-at-all-costs mentality has turned this exquisite animal into something like a breathing Petri dish atop four brittle legs.

"It's what the game has become," says Jerry Brown, the founder of Thoro-Graph, echoing a familiar sentiment.

Brown's view is a qualified one; in making his trademarked handicapping sheets over the years, he has monitored dramatic improvements in the performances

of horses and trainers and seen telltale signs of performance-enhancing drug use. After a lifetime handicapping countless races, he surmises few other explanations. Thoro-Graph's website also hosts a message board where tipsters offer leads for Brown's

pursuits.

So where does racing go from here? The first step, you might say, is acknowledging the problem. Knowing these stories, how can racing officials tell the public that theirs is a clean sport? Or, as Kent Stirling of the National HBPA told the U.S. Senate Committee on Commerce, Science and Transportation last year, that racing "should be the envy of every other sport that tests for drugs, like professional football, baseball, cycling..."

The reality is that those inside and out racing see it as beguiled by drugs and suffering dearly for it. Among those surveyed in The

Jockey Club-commissioned 2011 McKinsey study, only 22 percent have a positive impression of horse racing. In three out of every four stakeholder interviews, medication was highlighted as an issue adversely affecting racing.

Many believe even a casual look at state-by-state regulations shows a sport profoundly dependent on drugs, legal and otherwise. Reform should include a number of policies, but the whole approach to testing and enforcement and medication policy must change, rather than the piecemeal moves offered up in response. What's needed goes beyond slightly adjusting threshold levels and withdrawal times. An inexorable tide has washed more drugs onto the backstretch and with penalties the way they are – even for obvious doping – the incentives are aligned to encourage wrongdoing.

One place to start concerns the calculus for private vets, who profit from the volume of drugs

they prescribe. As has been well documented, most vets see their roles as answering to the trainers, not the horses. Several generations of trainers, too, have only practiced their trade in an age of permissive medication. “Because of this,” Team Valor president Barry Irwin testified to that Senate committee, “trainers to a much greater extent than at any time in the history of the sport rely on veterinarians.”

With this dependence, vets have

trouble saying no, but they can.

“If these horses are acutely unwell and in need of drug therapy, then on this basis alone, they should not be allowed to race,” said Dr. Sheila Lyons at the same hearing. “And if they are not unwell, they cannot be given medication under the law which regulates my profession. Race horse is not a diagnosis.”

Even if there has been support for reform in the last four decades, which is questionable, the logjam of state racing commissions and various representative groups makes action all but impossible. Uniformity has long been held up like a panacea, but this only touches upon the myriad issues. “Uniformity is a complex issue,” Scollay said. “Uniformity means uniform testing, regulation and enforcement.”

There is nothing remotely close to that now: one state allows a 24-hour free-for-all of permissible drugs and another acts more conservatively; one state uses outdated testing equipment and another state-of-the-art technology; one state fines a trainer a few hundred bucks for a clenbuterol positive and another state five-thousand; one racetrack uses its private-property rights to exclude a known cheater, next door he's welcomed.

Yes, regulation has made strides in recent years; in March, eight states agreed to participate in the Mid-Atlantic Uniform Medication

Program, which has agreed on 24 controlled therapeutic medications. Other states, like California, have signaled they'll join. But clearly the most significant proposal is the Horseracing Integrity and Safety Act of 2013, a bill introduced recently by U.S. Senator Tom Udall and four House of Representatives members, which would grant oversight to the U.S. Anti-Doping Agency (USADA).

The racing industry has long held onto its grip to regulate itself. But at what cost? In 1973, a House committee considered recommending a national commissioner for racing, but decided to leave it to the states. In 1980, the Corrupt Horseracing Practices Act, which called for regulation by the Drug Enforcement Administration, was defeated. Two years later, August Belmont IV told Congress that states could handle racing's problems and urged "that the industry be accorded more time to get its house in order..."

Similar arguments still circulate. An industry based on interstate wagering and interstate movement of horses and stables only widens the cracks in this fractured system. Change is glacial. For example, of the 16 laboratories which handle the nation's drug testing, just days ago the first two earned RMTC accreditation after all these years – the HFL Sport Science lab in Lexington and the Kenneth L. Maddy Equine Analytical Laboratory at the UC Davis School of Veterinary Medicine in California.

What happens at those labs is also part of the path forward.

"Transparency is the single most important thing," Brown said. "This information needs to be made public: who is tested, what they were tested for, what type of test was used, and what was the result of that test – not just pass/fail."

In the process of writing this series, we came upon regulators

who didn't know what the rules in their own states were, Brown pointed out.

"Everybody has an opinion on this subject, but nobody has the facts. Until you get the facts out there, there is no basis for figuring out what needs to be changed."

Vets, trainers and regulators know, but the betting public exists in the dark, other than recognizing

which barns get spectacular form reversals. Do they know that Florida uses Thin-Layer Chromatography (TLC) for its testing, a method seen as outdated since the 1980s? Or that New York uses only one step up – Enzyme-linked immunosorbent assay (ELISA) – a practice that, when used for general screening, has also been eclipsed by newer methods? Does a state test for clenbuterol in blood or urine, the latter being the most effective?

Brown offered two examples. In 2005, Pennsylvania announced it would begin testing for total carbon dioxide (TCO2), the byproduct of milkshaking. For five years bettors operated on this assertion. Then in 2010 the state finally started testing, without acknowledging its earlier claim. The same goes for Kentucky. In 1999, it came out that TCO2 was not illegal and guys could do it right in the paddock. State officials said they'd fix it in two weeks. "Six years later, they made a big announcement that they were now going to test for TCO2," Brown said. "Six years later. That is insane."

Making medication records public

is not such a longshot. The New York Racing Association released them for this year's Belmont Stakes entrants. (Only Orb and Giant Finish didn't get medication in the 72 hours before the Belmont, Lasix notwithstanding.) Such transparency could stop in its tracks excessive drug use. In Louisiana, for instance, where every medication classified as therapeutic (the state doesn't elaborate) is allowed within 24 hours of a race, how would the public, not to mention animal-welfare groups, react to seeing this information?

Still, must every handicapper then get a degree in chemistry?

To answer this gives a convincing argument for rolling back permissive medication. Brown, for his part, sees regulators as "unwilling to do what's necessary to protect their customers. There are weapons that can be used here which are not being used."

For decades, state racing commissions have mostly rested on post-race tests alone. These are no longer the Great Wall of deterrence. Particularly when the nature of sophisticated doping, as evidenced by GABA or Erythropoietin (EPO), has changed in both horses and humans – from a substance that leaves a residue to one that mimics endogenous functions, switching on a gene, hormone or amino acid and then turning it off.

These are the weapons that Brown believes are collecting dust: out-of-competition testing and 24-hour surveillance of barns and checking treatment records. The latter is commonplace in Great Britain and France and is what caught Godolphin trainer Mahmood Al Zarooni. Al Zarooni told regulators that he believed the steroids he used – their presence was detected from out-of-competition testing – were legal. Why then, he was asked, did he not log the treatments in his record books?

Mangled Horses, Maimed Jockeys

The new economics of horse racing are making an always-dangerous game even more so, as lax oversight puts animal and rider at risk.

RUIDOSO, N.M. — At 2:11 p.m., as two ambulances waited with motors running, 10 horses burst from the starting gate at Ruidoso Downs Race Track 6,900 feet up in New Mexico's Sacramento Mountains.

Nineteen seconds later, under a brilliant blue sky, a national champion jockey named Jacky Martin lay sprawled in the furrowed dirt just past the finish line, paralyzed, his neck broken in three places. On the ground next to him, his frightened horse, leg broken and chest heaving, was minutes away from being euthanized on the track.

For finishing fourth on this early September day last year, Jacky Martin got about \$60 and possibly a lifetime tethered to a respirator.

The next day, it nearly happened again. At virtually the same spot, another horse broke a front leg, pitching his rider headfirst into the ground. The jockey escaped serious injury, but not the 2-year-old horse, Teller All Gone. He was euthanized, and then dumped near an old toilet in a junkyard a short walk from where he had been sold at auction the previous year.

In the next 24 hours, two fearful jockeys refused their assigned mounts. The track honored two other riders who had died racing. As doctors fought to save Mr. Martin's life, a sign went up next to the track tote board: "Hang in there, Jacky. We love you."

On average, 24 horses die each week at racetracks across America. Many are inexpensive horses racing with little regulatory protection in pursuit of bigger and bigger prizes. These deaths often go unexamined, the bodies shipped to rendering plants and landfills rather than to pathologists who might have discovered why the horses broke down.

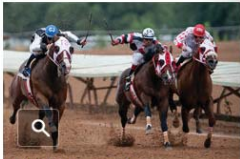
In 2008, after a Kentucky Derby horse, *Eight Belles*, broke two ankles on national television and was euthanized, Congress extracted promises from the racing industry to make its sport safer. While safety measures like bans on anabolic steroids have been enacted, assessing their impact has been difficult because many tracks do not keep accurate accident figures or will not release them.

But an investigation by The New York Times has found that industry practices continue to put animal and rider at risk. A computer analysis of data from more than 150,000 races, along with injury reports, drug test results and interviews, shows an industry still mired in a culture of drugs and lax regulation and a fatal breakdown rate that remains far worse than in most of the world.

New Mexico was the focus of several of the *New York Times's* series on drug problems in horse racing.

Stateside, it's clear that wanton cheating still exists; the presence of painkillers derived from South American frogs and sea snails illustrate this. Demorphen, the former, was found in a half-dozen states. At last year's Senate hearings, all eight industry panelists said the use of demorphen, which has no purpose other than to dope a horse, should merit a lifetime ban.

Except that didn't happen. In most cases, the suspensions meted out were five years and the fines not larger than \$10,000. States were legally powerless to go beyond that level. Nearly all of the accused trainers appealed

their suspensions, but racetracks in Oklahoma, California, New Mexico and Texas wielded their private-property rights to exclude them. Loopholes still existed, however, for the trainers to move their horses to assistants. Louisiana tracks Delta Downs and Evangeline Downs, which Boyd Gaming owns, allowed the trainers to continue racing as they appealed.

On April 11, Jess C. Meche, a 21-year-old exercise rider at Delta Downs, died in a training accident aboard a Quarter horse named Czech Revolution. The horse was conditioned by M. Heath Taylor, a leading Quarter horse trainer who,

in September, received a five-year suspension and \$10,000 fine for a demorphin positive. Delta Downs officials said they would name a race on May 18 in Meche's honor.

In New Mexico, the racetracks and racing commission set out to make sure a similar situation wouldn't occur there. No state suffered a harsher glare from The *New York Times* investigation of racing's runaway medication and breakdowns problems. In response to the demorphin positives, all five New Mexico tracks – Downs of Albuquerque, Ruidoso, Zia Park, Sunray Park and Sunland Park – decided to deny stalls or entries to any Class 1 or 2 violators. Letters were sent around the country.

"They knew that the racing commission was limited as far as what we could do," said Vince Mares, a former police chief who was named its executive director in January 2012. The demorphin trainers, for instance, had the right of due process to see out their appeals. "The tracks stepped up and said we don't want you here. I have to commend them."

Several years ago, New Mexico was not even associated with the RCI, said Ed Martin, its current president. "They couldn't pay the dues and so they couldn't see who was suspended in other states." A trainer could be suspended in Oklahoma and show up in New Mexico to race without the state or track aware.

Presently, the tracks and racing commission are harmonized in New Mexico, which is not the case everywhere. Urged by the racing commission, in April the state legislature removed the cap of \$10,000 on a Class 1 fine, setting a new ceiling at \$100,000. In a separate bill, the governor signed into law a nearly four-fold increase in the testing budget, accompanied by out-of-competition testing and a more aggressive necropsy program. New Mexico transferred its testing to the UC Davis lab, the most advanced in the U.S. "We are bound by law now to make sure our

of participants who are excluded. When Gural took over the lease of the Meadowlands in 2012, the first thing he did was boot Lou Pena, the leading trainer of the previous two years, who earned more than 1,700 drug violations in a two-year period. Pena challenged this in court but the judge reaffirmed the track's right of exclusion.

"I'm sort of amazed other people don't use it," Gural said in a recent interview at his Manhattan office. "On the other hand, you're judge and jury so you have to be careful and try to use your best judgment."

Most recently, the Meadowlands turned away Rene Allard, the second leading trainer by earnings in harness racing. Gural doesn't release his evidence.

Gural gathers this information in several ways and on his own dime. He hired a former state trooper named Brice Cote as his private investigator. Since Gural took over the Meadowlands, trainers who want to race there must sign an agreement which

allows his investigators to visit their farms at any time and test their horses. Standardbreds train away from the track, making out-of-competition testing imperative, in Gural's estimation. Those who don't sign don't get to race. Gural sends his samples to many different labs, some of them overseas, to keep cheaters guessing.

"I think that by the end of the year I'll have a pretty good idea of

labs stay up to par," Mares said.

The best example of using private-property rights to clean up the track comes from harness racing and , the principal owner of the Meadowlands and upstate New York's Tioga and Vernon Downs. Gural, the straight-talking chairman of commercial real-estate company Newmark Grubb Knight Frank, calls this their "number one weapon."

His three tracks keep a long list

whether or not you can catch these guys." Allard, he added, "could just be the tip of the iceberg."

"Let's face it, no vet is giving a horse something that they think is going to test positive," he continued. "So they're either giving it to them in a dosage that won't test positive or they know the state isn't testing for that particular drug."

Gural attributes increases in handle at the Meadowlands, in part, to his reforms. Bettors positively respond to a level playing field. But if he's carving out a template, so far there are no copy-cats. He has not been contacted by officials on the Thoroughbred side. And the trainers he's excluded have found a receptive audience elsewhere. None of the Meadowlands's competitors has reciprocated, pointing to limitations in using house rules. For example, NYRA would have trouble going this route since its tracks are state property.

Perhaps a regional compact, like the Mid-Atlantic consortium for nine states from Massachusetts to Virginia, can solve situations like this, although skepticism on the state-run apparatus runs deep. Alan Foreman, the chairman of the Thoroughbred Horsemen's Association and one of its architects, outlined its three-pronged approach: uniform testing for 24 controlled medications; testing done at fully-accredited labs; and a new penalty system. It also mandates third-party administration, not private, of race-day Lasix.

Though the list of medications appears settled, agreement on penalties is in flux. The states will retain their current frameworks to set fines, which, as they stand now, are widely seen as insufficient deterrents. However, one add-on with broad support is a points-based penalty system, similar to that of a

driver's license, which The Jockey Club first proposed in August 2011 as part of its Reformed Racing Medication Rules. The RMTC adopted a model based in large part on The Jockey Club's system, and the Mid-Atlantic states are moving forward with it. The RCI is scheduled to formally approve it in late July.

In this system, a trainer earns additional penalties after accumulating a certain number

of points. These penalties are superimposed on those fines and penalties already accrued. Foreman gave the example of trainer Rudy Rodriguez, who this year in New York has five positives for flunixin, a non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drug. "This would easily trip the system," Foreman said.

"If you are a flagrant violator, the industry is now ready to deal with that," he added.

To its credit, the Mid-Atlantic pact will allow states to take into consideration what happens

elsewhere in the region, and it will curb the practice of trainers shopping jurisdictions for relaxed medication policies and weak adjudication. For example, many trainers from outside New York quit shipping to Aqueduct last winter after NYRA extended its withdrawal times for clenbuterol and corticosteroids. Come January 1, this won't be possible.

Foreman said states outside the region have expressed interest in tagging along, such as Kentucky, California, Illinois, Arkansas, and Minnesota, which makes him believe that this is a basis for a national program. Some places, specifically Florida and Louisiana, are problems, he said, but if many states sign on, "Those not participating will be hard-pressed to explain why they aren't doing it."

Gural though, who's a lone crusader, sees promise in the effort to bring USADA on board. State racing commissions and their budgets tend to inadequately fund testing and enforcement. Plus, racetracks owned by casino companies "don't want to be bothered," he said, since racing revenue is a small portion of their business. New York stands alone in pledging a small percentage of casino revenue to pay for integrity measures.

"We need to have one super-duper lab, as opposed to labs all over the place," Gural said. "Because the states all have budgetary problems. Nobody is out there demanding that they catch the cheats in horse racing. The reality is that there are a handful of people demanding action. The vast majority of voters could care less; they don't go to the track, they don't bet on these things."

He paused for a moment. "I hate to say it, but I think the federal government is on the right track."

Paul Cole once enjoyed a status almost as prominent as Sir Henry Cecil in British racing, but it had been 10 years since the Whatcombe trainer had saddled a winner at this meeting, and when it came it was in a race he had won three times previously. The last of those was the future Group 1 winner Central Park (Ire) (In the Wings {GB}) in 1997, but the long wait was ended by the imposing Berkshire, who strode clear of overmatched rivals here to suggest a bright future. Third when attempting to make all in a decent six-furlong Newbury maiden May 17, the dark bay was restrained in rear this time by Jim Crowley and, after making a powerful mid-race move down the outside, struck the front with 1 1/2

"He did it all the wrong way at Newbury and got tired and ran a bit green, but Mr Cole always thought he was a lovely horse and he proved that today," jockey Jim Crowley commented. "I had a really bad draw to overcome and nothing to take me into the race, so I had to go sooner than I liked, but he's a serious horse. He's very smart and has the size, scope and pedigree to improve next year, so he's one to look forward to." Cole, who had a famed touch with his juveniles in his heyday, said: "He's always been good at home, but we haven't got that type of horse to work him with," he said. "It has been a long gap, and when you've had a lot of success here it's nice to have a few horses run with chances, and even that's not easy. I wouldn't think he'd do much more this season, as he's enormous. It depends on the Sultan, but I think one more run will do as he will be better next year." The trainer's son Ollie Cole, who is set to take over the reins from his father in the near future, added, "We were lucky to get him at the sales, and he was all class and has filled out a lot since then. At Newbury he pulled a bit, but from work at home we have learned that if you put him in behind he settles, and with a better draw he would have won better. Somebody asked me earlier if Whatcombe was going to get back on the map, and I said I hadn't been so happy with a horse for a very long time. We might put him away now until the G1 Dewhurst S. [at Newmarket Oct. 12], as dad thinks he's a very nice horse and wants to go straight there."

Opinion, who was third in a decent 12-furlong handicap at Newmarket on his seasonal return May 5, had appeared in the interim only when accompanying his much-vaunted stable companion Telescope (Ire) (Galileo {Ire}) in a pre-Derby gallop at Lingfield that resulted in a disappointing outcome for connections.
